MACHINERY SET IN **MOTION FOR HOPPER** CONTROL IN COUNTY

NEWLY FORMED COMMITTEE ASKS AT LEAST ONE CAR OF POISON FOR USE ON MITCHELL FARMS


Machinery has been set in motion for Mitchell county to join in the current fight against a possible grasshopper invasion this summer, according to B. J. Baskin, county farm agent, who has been made county grasshopper control leader.

Members of the county commissioner's court and the county committee of the Mitchell County Agricultural Conservation association have set up a grasshopper control committee composed of J. E. Skelton of Westbrook, J. S. Boyd of Hyman, and A. B. Erwin of Colorado.

The county committee has notified the state committee on grasshopper control that the county will meet all conditions set forth in order to receive free government poison. At least one car of poison has been requested for use in Mitchell county.

Each farmer is to furnish 50% DR. W. S. RHODE IS of the bran necessary for poisoning on his farm. The government will furnish 50% of the bran and all the poison. The bran and poison will be mixed for the farmer at specified

places and the farmer will pay a small fee to cover the expense of
