SCHOOL TAXES NOW!

AN EDITORIAL

An appeal to tax pavers of the Colorado Independent School district to pay up some \$18,000 in delinquent school taxes has been issued by the Colorado school

The fact that such an appeal is necessary is not anything for the town to be proud of. Probably the school board would hide this Lipse on the part of Colorado's taxpaying citizens if it could, just as a matter of civic pride.

But the truth is that the schools need that money, and need it badly. The truth is also that 80% of the citizens have been paying for the schooling of Colorado children during the past five years. while the remaining 20% have been just letting them carry the load.

The appeal that the school board is making is fair. Property owners are asked to pay weekly or taxes, making their payments in any amount which they can manage. Arrangements have been made to accept partial payments and give receipts for all payment-

ere not a thing which can be exaded forever, and that payment where somehow the board's offer to accept partial payments in any amounts would seem to be a boon to those who have allowed, or been forced to allow, their taxes to go delinquent.

If you have delinquent school taxes, see it you can't pay at least a few dollars a month on the total. It will melt away faster than you imagine, and think what the school will gain if even a hundred people begin making small pryments each month!

PUBLIC SCHOOL SYSTEM

So few people have any idea about the cost of our public schools we submit some figures:

The Texas Tax Journal, of Austin, edited by John T. Smith, at one time a member of the legislature and a recognized authority on tax matters, has the following to say about the finances of the school system of Texas:

The number of scholastics in Texas for the year 1936-37 was 1.556,654 and the apportionment was \$22 per capita and amounted to \$34,466.388. The amount of taxes collected by independent school districts was \$48,956,023. The amount collected by common school districts amounted to \$2,466,362; making a total of \$85,888,773 collected rom the state, independent and common school districts! This money was spent as follows: To pay school teachers \$48,765,846; to pay for transporting children to and from school \$3,001,958, this cost and maidens. This vast difference of \$17,790,950 in receipts and disbursements is also conclusive evidence that the \$5,500,000 appropriated out of general revenue for the present year should have been appropriated out of the school fund.

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




