



SOUTH WILL GET CHANCE TO WORK OUT PROBLEMS

WASHINGTON. - Fairly clear hints are being given by administration officials that, however high they may rate the south as an economic problem, the region will have to lead the way to its own improvement.

This means, these men say, that no effort will be made to thrust upon the southerners any readymade program of arbitrary readjust ment which might be worked out by persons who learned about the south from mammy songs.

Numerous signs have pointed to this course from the beginning. The report of a special committee which pictured the south as the nation's No. 1 economic problem bore no recommendations for a remeedy. It simply said, in effect: Here is the worst economic condition in the

Several southerners who worked over the report before it went to President Roosevelt argued that the committee's work ought not to stop there. They urged that another meeting of the committee be called to work out remedies.

They wanted Mr. Roosevelt to include definite legislative recommendations in his message to the new congress. No new meeting was called About that time came the formation of the southern conference for human welfare, which established headquarters at Birmingham, which had no official connection with the administration.

When it began its sessions this week, Mrs. Roosevelt was booked as one of its chief speakers, and the president sent a letter.

Southerners are of two minds about how to deal with their problem, but they are in fairly general agreement on such things as a demand for a new deal in freight rates and obtaining more federal money for schools.

SWEET POTATO RECIPES GIVEN BY MISS CRIPPEN

"The sweet potato is the most important vegetable crop in the south, according to R. E. Wright, of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. In Texas alone it has a farm value of three and one-half, million dollars annually. It is easily grown,

yields a high tonnage per acre. "Added impetus has been given to the sweet potato in the last decade with the discoveries that they are especially high in vitamin content. They are sources of vitamins A, B, C, and G, standing in about the same

rank as carrots. "They are fine in flavor, easily digested, and highly nutritious. The deep yellow varieties that are grown most abundantly in Texas are among the ones that are moist and juicy in texture, rich in color, and are of especial interest in food value. They have a high fuel value. They contain available proteins and carbohydrates, iron, potassium salts, which bring about a basic reaction in the body balancing the acid effects of breadstuffs, meat and eggs.
