This bill would allow nine-tenths of the farmers in any given territory to create a soil conservation district, wherein the state could specify certain soil conservation practices to be followed by everyone in the district. PYRAMIDED SALES TAX

A paradox of the debate over the advisability of levying a trans. action tax for raising revenue with which to pay old-age pensions is that some citizens who say they are strongly opposed to a sales tax urgently favor a transaction tax.

It is clear that those who take this position are not familiar with

the transaction tax, or else have allowed themselves to be deluded into assuming that the various payers of the transaction tax will not pass the tax along until it ultimately is paid by the consumer. The transaction tax, it is said, has a broad base. Everybody practically will have to pay the proposed 1.6 per cent tax on every transaction. That is true. It is also true that every time someone pays the transaction tax the price of the article sold will go up another 1.6 per cent.

An ordinary necessity of life may pass through half a dozen hands before it reaches the ultimate consumer. Every time the article, changes hands the buyer will pay the tax, not the seller. Thus, a pyramided or multiple sales tax is achieved.

The last man, the consumer, who gets the article, can't pass it on, and he gets the hot end of the poker.

Well, to put it simply, which would you rather pay, a simple sales tax of perhaps two or three per cent, or a transaction tax that by the time it reached you has multiplied until it amounts to four, six or maybe eight per cent?



SELF-SUPPORTING PRISON

A penitentiary is, primarily, a penal institution, where a criminal offender is punished by being deprived of his liberty. Sometimes, protection is thereby afforded society. A third purpose is to reclaim or redeem the convict so that he will be a useful citizen when he regains his freedom. If every convict emerged from the penitentiary a good citizen, the sum of \$1,500,000 would be a cheap price to pay for maintaining the State prison system.

These are all major considerations to be weighed by the Governor and Legislature before they go too far on the road to prison industrialization. Practical business men, labor unions and others stand as sentinels of opposition on that road.

Morevover, in a time when additional millions are demanded from the taxpayer for old age pensions, economy must not be a catchword to impede essential governmental undertakings. One angle of prison inquiry, which the Governor did not mention, was to determine whether the State system does not need modernizing further in accordance with findings of science on the care and cure of the criminal element .- Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

NOT A MARTIAL LAW CASE

The Governor of Texas may invoke martial law to enforce laws passed by the Legislature, but not to suspend the operations of such laws.

That is the gist of an opinion Attorney General Mann gave O'Daniel at the latter's request. The Governor requested the opinion upon the solicitation of State Agriculture Commissioner McDonald and Rio Grande Valley legislators who wanted him to declare martial law to permit truckers hauling the Valley citrus crop to disregard the 7,000-pound load limit law. Governor O'Daniel did not indicate whether he intended to suspend the load limit law if the opinion were favorable

Attorney General Mann quoted the constitutional provision that "no power of suspending the laws of this State shall be exercised except by the Legislature." The authors of the constitution were wise in thus guarding against executive usurpation of legislative power. It is obvious that executive power to suspend laws, nnder pretext of an emergency, could be used virtually to nullify repre-sentative government. Governors should be sparing in the use of martial law, even when their authority to invoke it is unquestionable.
