The TAP is asking authority to discontinue the eastbound pas-senger train which originates in Big Spring and reaches Colorado at 1:57 p.m. and the westbound passenger which originates in Fort Worth and reaches Colorado shortly after 3 p.m., stopping in Big Spring. The schedules between Sweetwater and Fort Worth would remain the same. Proposal of the railroad is to substitute truck mail and express service between Big Spring and Sweetwater. The company is claiming heavy losses on operating expenses for the passenger trains between the two towns.

J. H. Greene, manager of the Big Spring chamber of commerce and former manager of the Colorado chamber, spoke for a number of Big Spring business men and outlined their wishes to keep the train service.

Business men from Big Spring, Loraine, and Colorado offered testimony to show that the trains are not only a convenience but also a necessity without which citizens would be handicapped.

Oil men of the entire Permian basin will be invited to come to Colorado this summer and join in a Permian basin well in Mitchell county 19 years ago.

Plans for the celebration are now being shaped by the Colorado chamber of commerce. The date will be announced soon by a special committee to be named by Dr. W. S. Bhode, chamber president.

Known as the Underwriters' T. & P. No. 1, the well destined to become the first in the vast and prolific Permian basin was drilled on Earl Morrison land northwest of Westbrook by the Underwriters' Producing & Refining company of Tulsa, Oklahoma, and New York. Steve S Owen of Tulsa, who is now headquartering in Colorado while drilling a deep wildcat in northwestern Howard county, was vice-president and general manager of the Underwriters and as such superintended the drill-DIES IN SHERMAN and as such superintended the drilling of the well. W. J. Thompson and Dan Lewis were drilling contractors.

First commercial pay in the well was struck the week of June 25, 1920. The shooting, delayed several days by various factors. took place on July 16, 1920. It was a red letter day in Mitchell county history. The Morrison No. 2, completed in February, 1922, was due to be a bigger well but not a more famous one.

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EDITORIAL

ST. PATRICK'S DAY

Friday of last week was St. Patrick's day. But little attention

was paid in Colorado to that Patrick saint.

The patron saint of Ireland, he lived about 396-469. The name is Latin, signifying patrician. According to one tradition he was born near the present town of Dumbarton, Scotland, where his father was evidently a man of some standing, a deacon in tht Roman garrison. Patrick was captured by a maranding expedition of Irish Piets and sold into slavery in Ireland. Here he led a hard life, but succeeded after a time in escaping. He then, according to the popular account, fitted himself for the priesthood in France and at Rome, where he obtained permission from Pope Celestine to return to Ireland to convert the natives to Christianity. He left two pieces of writing, one was a so-called confession, is a defense of his work in Ireland and is in a way autobiographical. In reality, beyond the fact that he was one of the earliest, if not the first priest to preach Christianity to the Irish, little is known regarding the details of his life. The popular saying that St. Patrick drove the snakes out of Ireland is peculiar, as snakes never existed in that island. All accounts seem to imply that St. Patrick was not an Irishman at all, but a man of Roman ancestry, born in Scotland, a Christian missionary to the Irish. The 17th of March is observed by the Irish as Saint Patrick's day.

THE SHAMROCK

It is recorded in history that St. Patrick had a good deal to do with establishing the Shamrock as the national emblem of Ireland corresponding to the rose of England and the thistle of Scotland. Shamrock is an old Irish name for clover. St. Patrick is said to have used the three leaves to teach the doctrine of the Trinity. To avoid confusion it may be well remembered that English writers frequently speak of the clover as trefoil. A small yellow hop clover sold on the streets of Dublin is the genuine shamrock.

County Agent TREATMENT OF GRAIN AND SWEET SORGHUMS FOR

In treating grain sorghums for mut we suggest that powdered Copper Carbonate dust be used. This is available at your favorite drug store. Use two ounces of the copper carconate to one bushel of seed getting all seed well coated with the dust. The treatment is only as effective as to your ability to get all of the seed coated with the dust. In treating it is important that the nose and mouth be protected by tying handkerchief

or cloth over the nose and mouth to

ed seed as it is poisonous to them. Seed well treated will mean that the crop will be practically free of smuts

Mr. Fred Keating of the Big Spring experiment station stated that if the seed is carried to the station that they will furnish the copper carbonate and treat the seed free of charge to those who are interested.
