Favorable response to Colorado City's proposal to launch a Permian basin anniversary celebration in June or July was made by West Texas chamber of commerce managers during their convention at Marfa last week, according to H. B. Spence, manager of the local chamber.

Each chamber manager contacted by Spence agreed to name three directors from all vicinity to attend the celebration and help form a permanent organization. One of the three is to be a landowner, one a business man and one an oil man.

Colorado City has taken the lead in launching such an organization and annual celebration. THE 'BIRD WITH THE BROKEN PINION'

Not every adage that has been looked upon as a truism is true and not every one that is true in one sense may be in another. There are those which may be correct in their application to practical THERE WAS NO STRANGE GOD WITH HIM.' material things which are altogether wrong when applied symbolically to spiritual and moral things. The analogy is altogether lacking.

An example of this is found in the saying, "The bird with the broken pinion can never fly so high again." This may be true generally speaking as to the physical flight of birds, although even in this there doubtless are numerous exceptions. But when it is attempted to apply it figuratively to the spiritual and moral status of men and women, there is no analogy.

In the one instance the bird's wing has to depend upon the usual processes of nature for restoration to its former strength and usefulness. In the other renewal of strength and usefulness is accomplished by the interposition of God; and is therefore perfect and life, new strength and new pinions. complete. If the bird's pinion were to be repaired by Divine agencies. Whereas you at your best only fl it might be made even better than before, even as he who "dead in trespasses and sins" is made "every whit whole" when he seeks his restoration at the hand of Him who alone can make him so.

Cannot He who made the bird restore its strength and usefulness? Cannot He who made the man who sins make him anew? He not only can, but He does. Were it not so, only chaos, blackness and toward the light and love eternal. despair would wait upon us all.

He could transform a crippled and vile carrion crow into a bird of paradise, just as He can and does transform the sinner into a

It takes a very little while for the saving power of his God to translate him "out of the power of darkness . . . into the kingdom of

He may still retain the scars and marks of his struggles to overcome the wicked one alone. He may recall when his wounds pained and weakened him. He may still from time to time tremble with anguish when he takes a retrospective glance at some of his terrible experiences. But he realizes that he has not merely been restored. but has been "born again," and is therefore very much higher from every standpoint than ever before.

More often than otherwise it requires misfortune, sorrow and affliction to bring about this wonderful transformation in man. In things spiritual, it is often "the bird with the broken pinion

that ultimately soars the highest.

VICTORY FROM DEFEAT

Marvelous it is that man not only rises higher in a spiritual sense after his broken pinion, but it frequently happens that he attains to greater heights in world affairs because he begins life with a "broken pinion, but it frequently happens that he attains to completed, it will be worth the money. greater heights in world affairs because he begins life with a "broken pinion" physically. This challenges his greatest powers and impels his greatest efforts. There are innumerable men and women who publication: have distinguished themselves in various walks of life who began badly handicapped by some physical defect.

One might begin with Fanny J. Crosby, blind sacred song writer Shepherd; Steinmetz, the electrical wizard, hunchbacked and other-1 time poem, which compares almost everything you can think of: wise physically unattractive, but who nevertheless has been a boon to humanity; Alexander H. Stephens, Georgia statesman who weighed less than a hundred pounds, who who though a midget in stature was a giant in legislative halls; Dwight L. Moody, great evangelist, whose "broken pinion" consisted of poverty, ignorance and awkwardness.

Helen Keller, of whom it may be said that she began life with both wings broken, but who by fortitude, perseverance and faith in God, supplemented by the wonderful faithfulness, patience and kindness of her companion and teacher, Miss Sullivan, has set an example to the world that should cause any one with burdens less heavy to be ashamed to complain.

This short list should be sufficient to hush the utterance of such so-called proverbs as that hereinbefore quoted.

It is for such as these, as well as those whose pinions have been broken since they began to use them, that the statue, "Winged Victory," should have been carved. It might be said of these that theirs were wingless victories, but

victories nevertheless. "Some think of God in the sight of difficulties, and some think of difficulties in the sight of God. Those who desire to overcome difficulties need to look at them

"in the sight of God." The achievement of one victory under difficulties gives courage

and strength, faith and hope, for another. Reward for one triumph gives hope and expectation of another.

HOPELESSNESS WOULD EASTE in the sense that many construe it, when a man failed in business he would not have the courage to undertake to rebuild his lost

If it were true in such sense the convict who has finished his term in prison, whether he was guilty of the crime with which he was charged or not, would never undertake to overcome the odium which we publish because of its oddity: attaching to his name, but would, with the anarchist, say, "Oh,

what's the use?" If it were so, the man who suffers shame whether justifiably or not, would not feel like seeking to "live it down" by building himself up in the future.

Sometimes it is necessary that we be blinded by tears in order that we may be made to see.

The process of refining our gold and separating it from the dross requires the fire of suffering. After it is over we can see its necessity It is sometimes necessary to have surgeons break the arms or legs of certain ones in order that they may reset them in a way that will make them much more useful and look as they should.

So it is in spiritual things. Our spiritual limbs have to be reset; indeed, we have to have a new life, "be born again," before we shall be willing to fly to heights hitherto unknown by us!

Indeed it is He who fights the battle. "The Lord fought against the enemies of Israel."

Over and over does this statement appear in the history of Israel, but nowhere did He fight for Israel when Israel was in the wrong, nor when Israel failed to fight for itself.

So it is these victories over great handicaps and difficulties which give new pinions to those whose wings are broken. They no longer flutter in the mire of material earthly things. They no more lie popeless and defeated in the muck and filth of Godless thought and

He who suffers realizes that "Your iniquities have separated between you and your God."

It is he who is most sure to become conscious of his own weaknesses and sins. This always happens when the light of the glory from God's throne falls upon us. And so it is that the higher we
