PENSIONS

Our observations on pensions from the State Observer:

PENSION REPAYMENT MADE AFTER COURT BATTLE: Ready for mailing to Texas old folks last week were the smallest pension checks since the old age assistance program went into effect

But the checks were ready for mailing only after a heetic week In that week the Federal government okayed a grant of \$510,368 for October pensions, which would mean an average payment of \$8.50 for Texas pensioners as contrasted with a \$14 average last

In that week the state made its first repayment on an old debta payment of \$138,000 on a debt of \$2,230,000 owed to Dallas banks. The money was borrowed in the past to tide pension payments over when the Legislature refused to pass tax bills.

But these two acts came only after District Judge Ralph Yarborough refused to grant a temporary injunction against the repayment to the Dallas banks.

of October pension checks with their \$6 cuts be prohibited.

Hill's petition, filed on behalf of six old age pensioners cut off the pension rolls by the \$6 slash, charged that the Texas Old Age Assistance Commission on November 28, 1936, contracted with Republic National Bank to purchase warrants outstanding against the pension fund for \$1,300,000. This contract, the petition alleged, is unconstitutional.

The \$6 cut was due chiefly to the repayment of this loan, which was required by a recent act of the Legislature.

In court Hill boiled the case down to one issue-an effort to enjoin repayments to the bank on the ground that it was a debt which the Legislature was not authorized to incur.

After argument Yarborough refused to interfere with the first repayment, set the case for trial on its merits October 30. The next repayment installment is not due until November 10.

WAS HAMLET INSANE?

As an invited guest we visited this week the Shakespeare club and when called on for our talk we said:

O, what a noble mind is here o'erthrown . . Now see that noble and most sovereign reason, Like sweet bells jangled, out of tune and harsh. -Hamlet (Act III, Scene I).

It is not the purpose here to discuss that perennial subject for debate by students of psychology and ladies' Shakespeare Clubs, "Was Hamlet insane?" This subject has been argued so long and so much that one would think it had become passe as a subject for discussion, but not so. The continued discussion of it is the more remarkable for the reason that there is no way of arriving at a positive decision that is supported by affirmative evidence, one way

Ophelia's expression above quoted to the effect that Hamlet's mind was like jangled bells simply voiced her opinion, just as Shakespeare students of today voice theirs. Of course Ophelia had the advantage of having a more intimate acquaintance with Hamlet than the students have. The same can be said of Polonius' confirmation of Ophelia's decision in this unique phraseology spoken to the Queen:

"That he is mad, 'tis true: 'tis true, 'tis pity; and pity 'tis 'tis true.' It was to be expected that Hamlet himself would deny that he was mad, as he did when he said to his Queen Mother: "My pulse, as yours, doth temperately keep time, and makes as healthful music: it is not madness that I have uttered."

Hamlet, like St. Paul, denied being mad. One of the most dramatic seenes pictured in the Bible was Paul's trial before Agrippa. We are told that "as he thus spake for himself, Fesus said with a loud voice, 'Paul, thou art beside thyself; much learning bath made thee mad.' But he said, 'I am not mad, most noble Festus, but speak forth the words of truth and soberness.""

Shakespeare was the only person who could testify decisively as to Hamlet's mental condition, and he did not do so. This being true, we had as well let poor Hamlet rest, except in so far as he may be helpful as a subject of debate.

One added thought just here is that Shakespeare's Hamlet has perhaps been the subject of more writings and discussions than all the real madmen in history, not excepting the Kings, Emperors and Princes of all the nations, including the several mad Emperors of Rome. Also it is doubtless true that, as has been asserted by men capable of judging, more has been written about Hamlet, Prince of Denmark, than about all the real princes of Denmark, or perhaps about Denmark itself.
