Increased functioning of Mitchell county clubs through federation, enlarge and improved library facilities, and cooperation of all local clubs to make the Sixth district convention here next spring a success were outlined by Mrs. J. 'Fannie Kemble' Review By Mrs. Earl Powell Well Received Here Saturday

An audience which was apparently both pleased and pleasing gathered in the junior high school auditorium Saturday afternoon to hear Mrs. Earl Powell of Stanton review Margaret Armstrong's "Fannie Kemble" under the sponsorship of the women's auxiliary of All Saints' Episcopal church.

Mrs. Powell is also remembered here as Jane Bounds, sister of Mrs. Jack Smith and a teacher in Colorado City schools before and for a time after her marriage to Mr. Powell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lay Powell.

For the occasion she wore a street-length dress with black satin skirt and black silk lace waist. She had a shoulder corsage in yellow.

Introduced by Rev. H. H. Black, rector of All Saints' Episcopal church, Mrs. Powell outlined the life of Fannie Kemble, daughter of a long line of distinguished actors, "very modern in thought but very conventional in actuality." After great suc-

cesses on the stage in England, she came to America on tour and here met and married a "very correct" Philadelphian.

"Later," said Mrs. Powell, "for no reason except that he couldn't understand her inability to lie on a sofa and look pale, he divorced her. Her problems are really a history of the emancipation of women."

Fannie Kemble is said to have greatly influenced foreign opinion during the Civil war, as she was very anti-slavery. Her memoirs, Mrs. Powell pointed out, give a very vivid picture of American cities and people at that period. The book is factual, being based on letters written through a long period of time to a woman friend.

The review was the first public affair to be held in the new auditorium, and the audience was duly impressed by its modern beauty and comfort. Baskets of autumn flowers were arranged on the stage, along with tall vases of ornamental cane.

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Judges And Commissioners Seeking WPA Readjustments For This Area

In view of rapidly increasing WPA rolls in Mitchell county, coupled with decreased WPA allotments for this area and the approach of winter, resolutions adopted at a called meeting of the West Texas County Judges and Commissioners association in Lubbock last Friday were significant locally.

Attending the meeting from Mitchell county were Judge A. F. King and Commissioners Jim McCullough of Spade and Frank Crownover of Lorraine.

Resolutions adopted unanimously at the meeting for presentation to President Roosevelt and members of congress pointed out that five years of drought conditions have resulted in such a short harvest in West Texas this year that the need for WPA aid is greatly increased, even though the need for aid in eastern labor centers has been decreasing due to greater industrial activity.

They asked a careful analysis of "the economic conditions that now obtain in various sections of the country and in those areas where the burdens on WPA have been lessened; that such funds be redistributed and reallocated so as to increase the funds for drought stricken agricultural areas, such as West Texas, thereby increasing their quotas."

They closed thus:

"Be it further resolved that, in the event it be found impracticable to redistribute said funds, then new funds be made available for such areas; for the counties and cities, because of constitutional limits of tax levies are wholly unable to meet the emergencies brought about by such conditions, and unless the Federal Government does grant some added relief and raise the present quotas, wide-spread want and suffering will prevail throughout such areas."

Conoco Launching Building Program

PONCA CITY, Okla.—Continental Oil company will spend \$1,500,000 on a building program to improve quality and to increase the gasoline manufacturing capacity at its Ponca City refinery, it was announced recently by President Dan Moran.

Construction is scheduled to start about November 1, and the project should be completed next June, he said.

A contract for installation of one of the most modern thermal gasoline cracking processes yet developed has already been awarded to the M. W. Kellogg Company, New York. This contract involves approximately one and a quarter million dollars, said Moran, and Continental will spend an additional quarter million in revisions of equipment and rearrangement of the steam system, and in remodeling pumping units and electrical systems.

"In announcing this project, we should like to point out that there is ample labor now available in Ponca City to handle the work," said Moran. "Previously when we have announced large building programs there has been an influx of men whom we could not employ. This time we don't want to disappoint them, as we already have plenty of both skilled and common labor to complete this project."

Approximately 200 men will be employed in the construction project, the largest refinery building program undertaken in the Mid-Continent area in several years.

Unpredictable Wolves Stage 6-A Upset By Tying Roscoe, 12 To 12

The unpredictable Colorado City Wolves staged a pleasing upset for local fans Friday night by tying Roscoe's Plowboys 12-12 on Cantrill field.

It was the first time the Plowboys have failed to defeat the Wolves in conference play in several years. Although names on the lineup were practically unchanged, the Wolf team wasn't the same one which let the Loraine Bulldogs hold it to a scoreless tie the week before.

Roscoe tallied 16 first downs to 7 for Colorado City, but the Plowboys were also topheavy on the penalties, receiving four for a total of 50 yards while the Wolves received but one for five yards.

The Wolves scored first, Ballard going over in the first quarter after catching a 30-yard pass from Cox. Roscoe then took the ball and began stacking up first downs in a steady march down the field, Broadwell and Shelansky alternating in carrying the ball.

Roscoe's first score was made in the second quarter by Taylor who caught a 25-yard pass from Broadwell, practically repeating the play by which the Wolves had made their score.

The half was a life-saver for the Wolves, since it found Roscoe on Colorado City's 3-yard line with downs to spare.

Penalties, especially on clipping, cost Roscoe heavily in the third quarter, losing them a 70-yard gain made

by Broadwell from Roscoe's 15-yard line to within that distance of the Colorado City line. Broadwell, running with an open field ahead, was stopped by Neal who came from behind him and executed a tackle which was one of the highlights of the game.

The two teams went into another exchange of tactics in the third quarter when Grubbs intercepted a long pass from Shelansky, only to have his long pass intercepted by Broadwell a few minutes later. Shelansky lost the ball for Roscoe on a fumble in the next play, however.

A plunge over the line by Broadwell brought Roscoe its second touchdown early in the fourth quarter.

The Wolves trailed until late in the final quarter when Glover got loose around end and ran 65 yards for a thrilling score. The kick for extra point was left of the goal, leaving the score in a tie. No tries for extra points were good.

Biggest threat to the Wolves was the Broadwell to Taylor passing combination. Shelansky and Smith shared Roscoe's starring honors with Broadwell and Taylor. Outstanding for Colorado City were Neal, Ballard, Glover, Caffey, Smith, Cox and others.

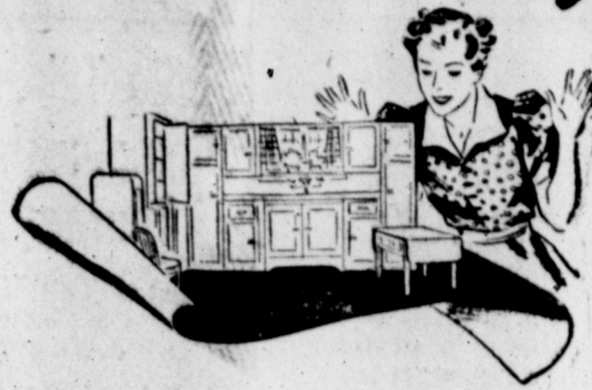
SENIOR NEWS
