NEIGHBORING NEWS.
The general rain fell over county Monday night and Tuesday morning.
Beveridge wound up his for this season last Friday with 112 bales.
J. J. Cox of Goldthwaite was in San Saba on professional business Friday of last week.
S. B. Howard and son, Carroll, are here now from their saw mill at Seal, La., to spend a week or ten days at home.
Annie, the five-month-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Walker, died Sunday evening after eight weeks severe suffering.
H. W. Atkinson of the southern part of the county was in town last Friday and reported that his cattle are doing fairly well.
Messrs. Creasy and Moore returned the first of the week from their prospecting trip to different towns in the northern part of the state.
W. D. Cowan, who bought the Joe H. Foster printing plant, and his brother, George Cowan, are here putting up the plant preparatory to printing a paper.
San Saba county is now a sea of small pox. Within the last two years this loathsome disease has broken out four times and each time at a different place in this county. No death occurred, but the expense to the county amounted to about \$2000.
The shaft in the White Eagle copper mine in Burnet county, is down 100 feet and the vein of ore is still well defined. The assays range from \$3 to \$200 per ton, and yet it is said the returns are not satisfactory.
W. R. Tow of Tow Valley was in San Saba Thursday of last week and reported that he and his family are feeding six or seven hundred cattle on pear. He said he had lost 20 cows, and that if another heavy freeze comes he will lose 100 cows.

THINGS IN GENERAL.
A strong vein of oil of good quality has been found near Lockhart.
The three-year-old daughter of the section foreman at McDade was burned to death Sunday.
Ex-Governor Hogg has issued a manifesto to the democracy of Texas protesting against early primaries.
W. M. Davis was convicted at Decatur this week of blowing the safe of a bank and was given a three years' sentence. He is about 65 years old.
The Texas Fuel and Coal Company of Strawn contemplates the establishment of a Strawn of the largest cotton factory west of the New England states.
J. P. Withers, the Beaumont banker who was arrested in Kansas City last week charged with forgery, was released Saturday on \$5000 bond.
Bela E. Brown, aged 65, a prominent dealer in diamonds and manufacturer of jewelry, was found murdered in his store in Rochester, New York, Monday morning.
The boiler of a locomotive pulling a passenger train exploded as the train was passing through Victor, Iowa, last evening. Only two or three were killed.

The report was published throughout America and Europe last week that the death of Pope Leo was hourly expected. The pope's physicians deny the rumor and say he is doing well for one of his age.
According to the Chicago Tribune, there were 118 legal executions during the past year and 135 lynchings, a decrease of one execution and an increase of twenty lynchings over the previous year.
The passenger agents of the roads leading into Dallas say they will not announce an excursion rate for the Confederate reunion until they are informed of the course which the Dallas people intend to pursue in regard to ticket scalpers. If the roads are given protection in this matter it is likely a very low rate will be made but if no protection is given it is not likely that tickets will be sold much below regular rates.

A young man about 22 of age, while oiling machinery at the oil mill in Marlin Friday night, had the misfortune to get his right arm caught in the cogs of the rolls and that member was mashed from the body.
It has been claimed by several who have tested its virtues that Beaumont oil will cure consumption. L. A. Reynolds, a resident of Cuero, is one who believes the dreadful disease can be cured by the use of the oil.
A special from Glendive, Montana, says: Robbers secured between \$10,000 and \$20,000 worth of unset and set diamonds Monday by stealing two trunks from the baggage room of the Northern Pacific station and breaking them open. Nothing is missing from the trunks except a bag of unset diamonds and three or four hundred diamond rings.

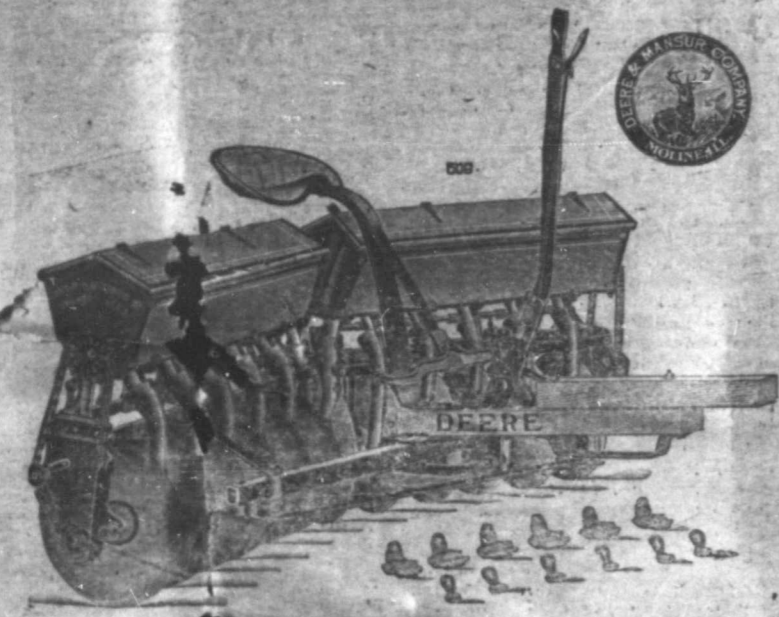
