**GENERAL NEWS.**

The Veterans of Texas and the Daughters of the Republic have held their annual meeting in Waco this week.

A branch of the International and Great Northern railroad has been built to Ardmore, the county seat of Grimes county.

The available school fund of the state has been somewhat augmented during the past month, on account of interest payment on county bonds held by the permanent school fund. Interest payments for the year will aggregate nearly \$225,000 of which about \$200,000 has been paid.

Attorney General Bell has filed application for an injunction to restrain the Banker's Union of Texas from doing business in Texas. The attorney general in his petition states that the defendant company has violated the Texas law by not paying three judgments given against it in Hopkins county. The defendant's headquarters are at Omaha, Neb.

Gip Stark, who sold out and went west last fall, has sold his ranch there and sent his family back to the old place last week. He will follow them with the cattle in a week or so. Matters were not as prosperous and pleasant there as were expected. We are glad to welcome them back and wish them prosperity in their old home in the Post Oak—San Saba Star.

Governor Baily and the members of the Kansas state live stock sanitary committee have agreed upon a plan to prevent the double inspection of cattle going into Kansas from Texas. The State inspector at Aransas City, has been ordered to go at once to Fort Worth, and will inspect cattle consigned to Kansas and will remain in Texas until the rush of spring shipping is over. Under the present system Texas cattle are inspected in Fort Worth by Federal inspectors and again in Kansas by State inspectors. This system has been the cause of much dissension.

The committee having in charge the arrangements for the Confederate reunion in New Orleans is having some difficulty in raising the \$100,000 fund necessary for the entertainment of the veterans. So far about \$28,000 has been raised, and it will be necessary for the members of the committee to do some hustling to raise the balance. No single railroad has contributed a cent up to this time, and it looks now as if it will be necessary to go after them with a club to make them come up with their just share. The committee has not the slightest doubt the entire fund needed will be raised in the end, but they are a bit sore over the backwardness of certain wealthy individuals and corporations in sending in their contributions.

Mr. Conner had to kill one of his cows and a dog Sunday, which was supposed to have been mad.


Misses Mary Isenhour and Nora Beck spent Sunday with Mrs. Isenhour and family.

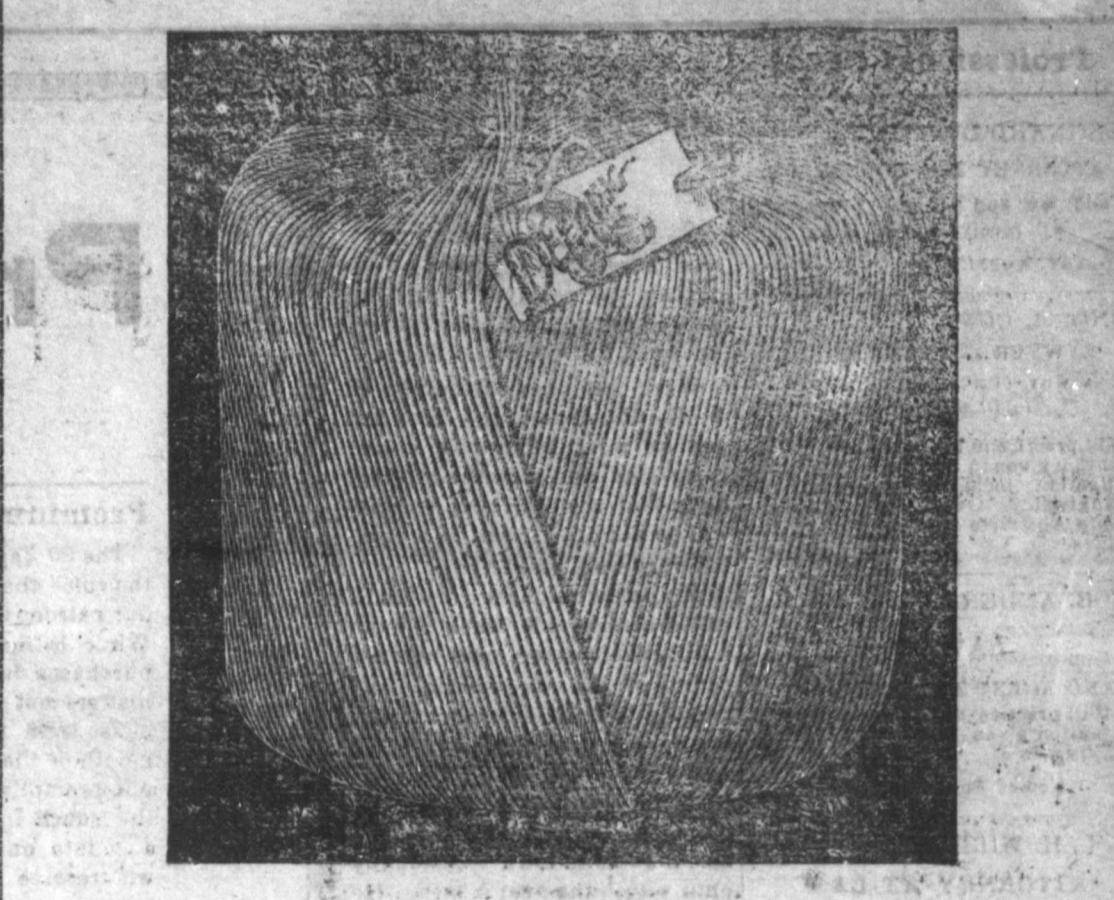

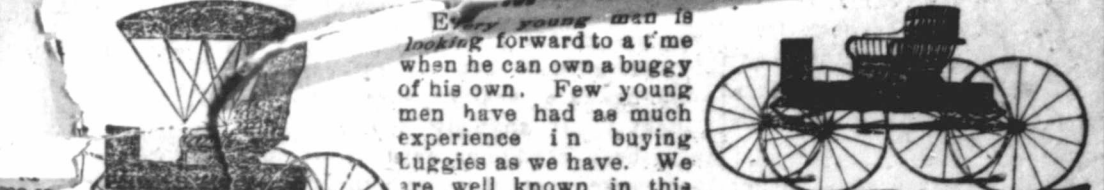

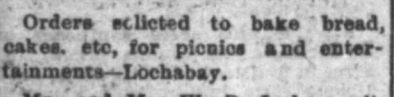
