BIG VALLEY SCHOOL.
 Last Friday, Jan. 22, closed our second month at Big Valley. The attendance for this month was exceptionally good. We have enrolled 73 to date, 7 of which are over, 5 under, and 66 scholastics. This is much better than we expected. The average attendance for the entire month is 75 per cent but if the measles had not struck us it would have been at least 95. The work is excellent all round for this month, and especially those of seventh, eighth and ninth grades. A majority of the pupils seem to be interested in their work and should be encouraged to do their work well, at home. The time is fast coming when the home will be used as a study room or preparation place for the pupil, and the school room as recitation room. In our judgment this would be better. Pupils cannot study to the same advantage in the school room, where noisy recitations are continually taking place, that they can in their quiet homes when the rest of the family are asleep or at their ordinary work about the place; and besides that they learn at their homes by hard study and penetration; when they are not helped by desk-mate or teacher, is more likely to stay with them and it certainly brings about more intellectual development than where there is less effort of the mind.

AN APPEAL TO TEACHERS.
 On Friday night and Saturday, the 5th and 6th of February, the first County Institute for this session is called to meet. The Institute of this county, heretofore have been failures, so far as any lasting results are concerned, and the first expression that found utterance from most of the teachers and others concerned, upon the announcement of the first meeting was "we can't have an institute in this county." This is why we have never had an Institute of any value. We start in with the idea and determination that it must be a failure and it is. Fellow teachers, we are sleeping on our rights and privileges when we allow this state of affairs to exist. Our neighboring counties make this an important as well as a very interesting part of their work, and every teacher looks forward to "Institute Day" with a feeling of pleasure. Not only do they derive a great amount of pleasure from having come together and talked over their work and the monotony of school-room drill, but many important things are discussed, ideas and experiences are exchanged and everyone goes home better able to take up his school duties than they were before. There is no reason why Mills county's teachers should not avail themselves of these privileges. There is as good talent here as in any of our neighboring counties and if we lag behind it is our own fault. This we will do if the Institute interest is not revived.
 The people of Goldthwaite feel it an honor to have the teachers meet with them and are ready to offer any encouragement possible. To this end they have opened their homes with a welcome and invite you to come and share their hospitality. No teacher need stay away because of the fact that he dislikes to go to a hotel for his lodging. The people are willing to take you into their homes and share with you the best they have. They do this because of their interest in the teachers and schools of the county, and because of their appreciation of your work. Teachers ought then all to show their appreciation of these favors by responding with a full attendance at our first meeting.
 A program has been arranged, which if carried out, would benefit any teacher and pay him well for his time and trouble of attendance. The crowning feature of Friday night's program is the "Fifty Year's Development in the Scholastic" by our old time school teacher, Hon. Phil Clement. He has actually witnessed fifty years of development in school life in Texas and will no doubt show some real pictures of our painful day school life that will be as comical as true. You can't afford to miss it.
 Now, fellow teachers, we are earnest about this matter and are determined to have it for and institute, but we cannot do a good thing without you. It is your program it is your responsibility on the ground with your very best efforts. If you are not expected of you, then come and join in the program and discuss with us the benefit from your fellow teachers and encourage him by your presence.

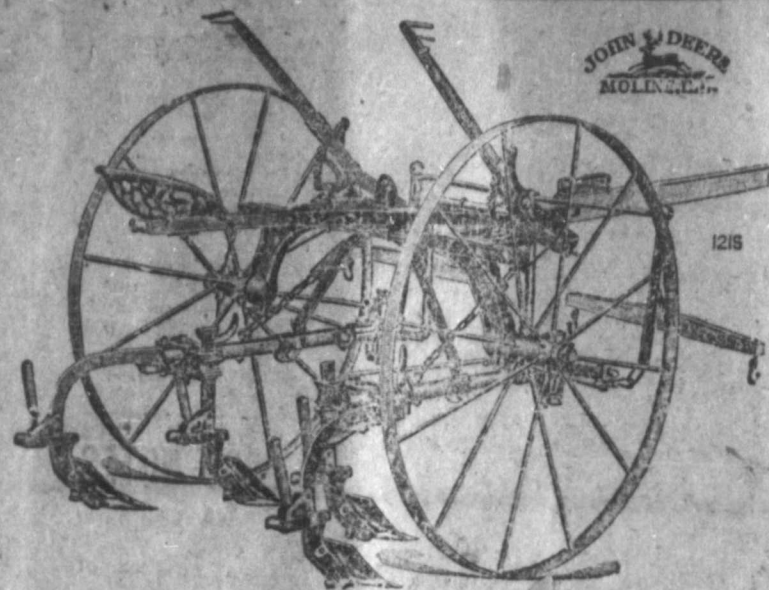

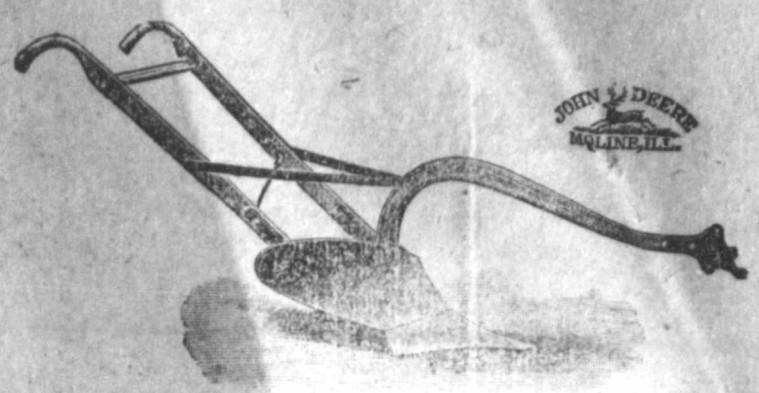

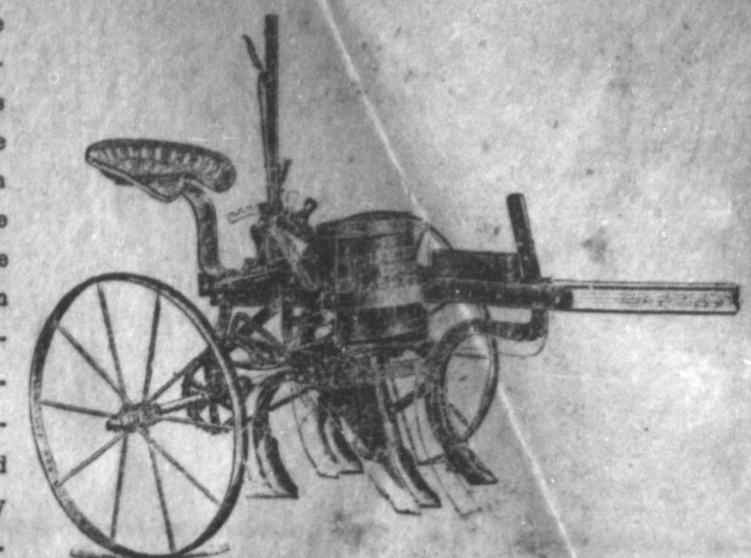
