Prof. W. B. Woodruff, who is teaching at Zephyr, has purchased the T. Hugh Smith residence and moved his family here to make their home.

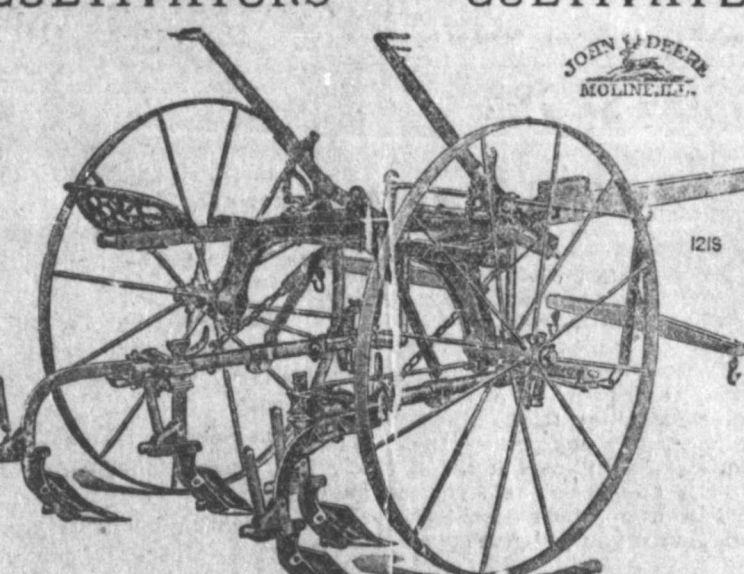

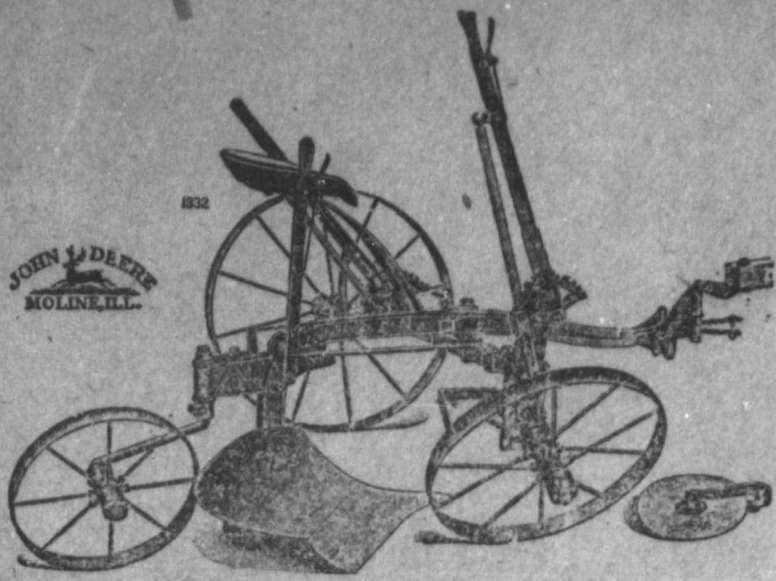

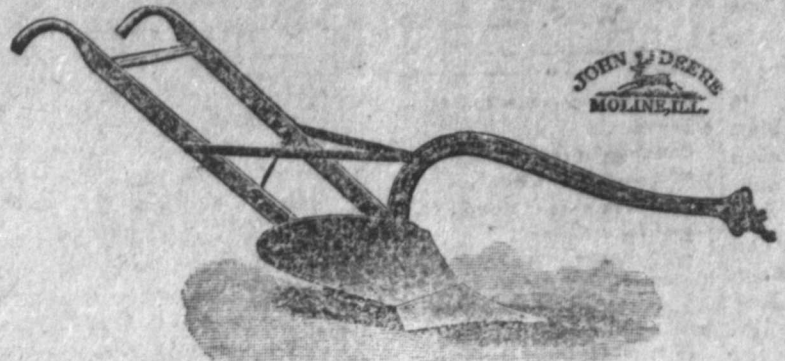

Court met in extra session

The treasurer was instructed  
to take up court house bond No.  
2, of the denomination of \$1000.

\$650 interest on outstanding  
court house bonds.  
It was ordered that \$385.60 be  
set aside out of the road and  
bridge fund for a sinking fund  
to pay outstanding bridge bonds  
and \$385.60 be credited to pay  
interest on these bonds, which  
are held by the permanent school  
fund, the interest to be at once  
placed in the available school  
fund.  
S. D. Lochaby was awarded  
the contract for building the  
rock foundation for the fence  
around the court house. The  
foundation is to be in the ground  
6 inches and to be 2 feet high at  
the highest point and 18 inches  
in diameter at the top and 24  
inches at the base. The steps
