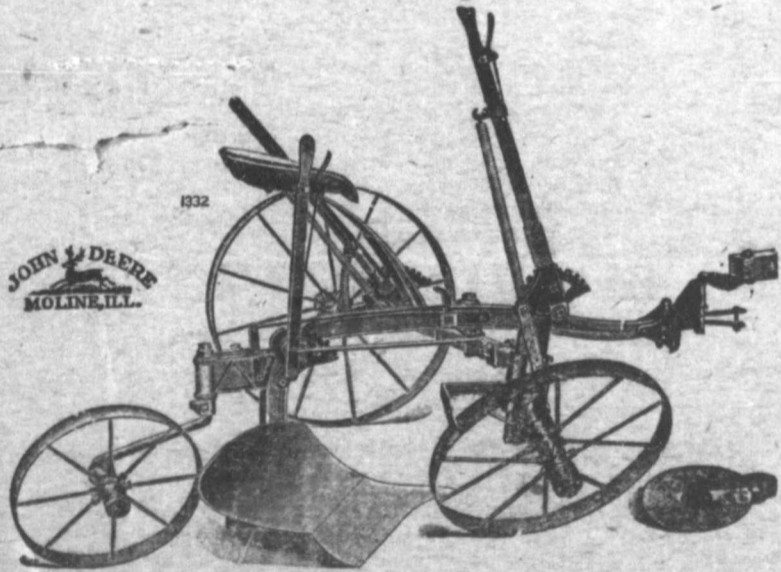

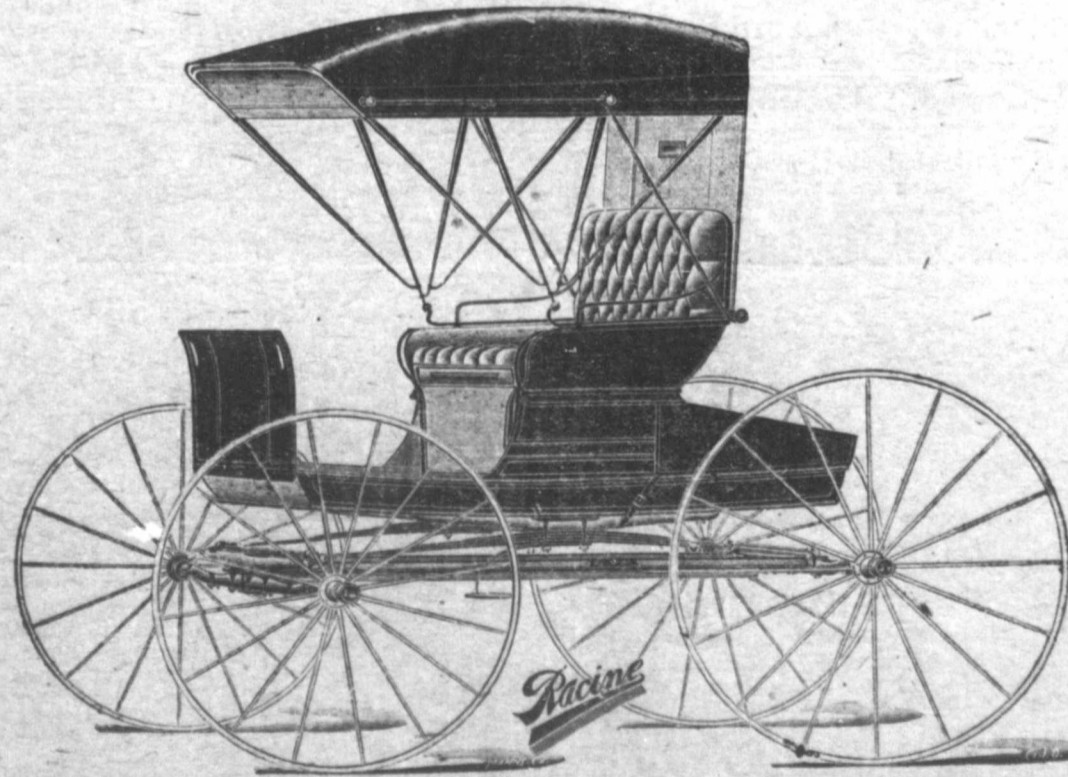

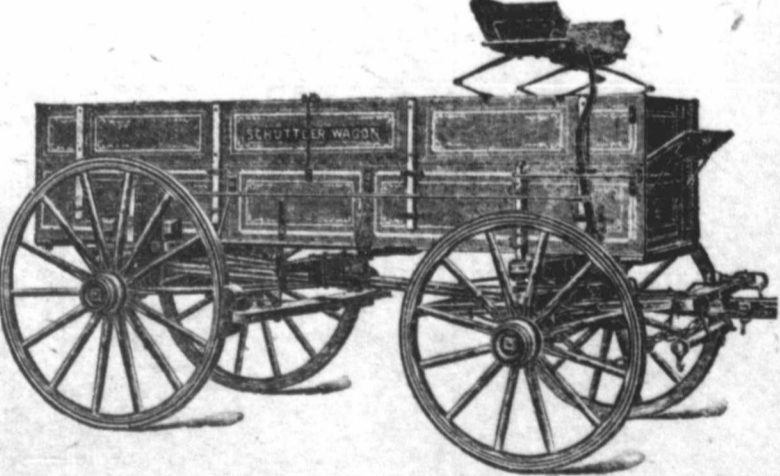

DEATH'S VISITS.
Again has death invaded our community and left sorrow and anguish in its wake.

MR W F CARTER
Last Saturday the announcement reached the city that W. F. Carter was dead. He was a prosperous and industrious farmer of the North Brown community and had a large circle of acquaintances in this city and many were the expressions of sorrow when his death was known.

Mr. Carter was 42 years of age and had lived in the North Brown community about 3 years, having moved there from Big Valley. He owned a good farm and was a hard working and honest man. He was only sick about a week and pneumonia was pronounced to be the cause of his death. He leaves a wife and three small children and one brother, Mr. C. H. Carter of Center City, besides other relatives and many friends who mourn his death.

The funeral was conducted Sunday afternoon by Rev. G. W. Gartman and his remains were laid to rest beside his mother in the Big Valley cemetery.

MR. JOHN EVANS, SR.
The spirit of Mr. John Evans, Sr., took his flight Monday night and his body was laid to rest in the Old Fellows cemetery Tuesday afternoon with Masonic honors.

Mr. Evans was in his eighty-third year and had become very feeble and when he contracted a cold a few weeks ago it took a firm hold on his frail constitution and he gradually grew weaker until the end came, and old age can really be assigned as the cause of his death.

Mr. Evans was universally loved and honored by the people of Goldthwaite, among whom he had lived for fourteen years. He came here from Grimes county, to which place he immigrated from Florida after the civil war. We who knew him well feel that we have lost a friend whose place it will be hard to fill. He was a man of wide experience and it was indeed interesting to hear him tell of events of long ago. He leaves a widow and three sons, Messrs. I. H. J. C. and W. A. Evans, and one daughter, Mrs. Blake. To all of them the Eagle extends sincere sympathy.

H. D. GARDNER.
Mr. H. D. Gardner died yesterday morning at his home one mile west of this city. He suffered some time with the measles and it was a relapse of that disease that caused his death.





Quarterly report of H. J. Crockett, County Treasurer of Mills county, Texas, of receipts and expenditure from Nov. 1, 1903, to Jan. 31, 1904. We, the undersigned, commissioners of Mills county, Tex., and L. E. PREACHERS BEATEN.

On last Sunday night Revs. Tunnage of Holland and Spradley of Belton were severely beaten by five incensed men just over the Williamson county line. The preachers left the church house where Rev. Tunnage was pastor, but at which place Rev. Spradley, the missionary for the Salado Association had just preached and were returning home when accosted by five men. Spradley was knocked down four times, being severely hurt and Tunnage was terribly beaten so much so that he is still confined to his bed. As it was very dark Rev. Spradley did not recognize his assailants, but one of the number it is said is supposed to have been a person who was dismissed from the church during a session when Rev. Spradley acted as moderator.—Belton Journal.

UNUSUAL OPERATION.

An associated press special from Philadelphia under date of March 5, gives an account of an operation that is almost unbelievable. It says:

"Thomas Emerson, a colored man, who was stabbed in the heart, Monday by his sweetheart, has been the subject of an unusual operation. His heart was lifted out of the body and six stitches were taken to close the big gash made by the negro's knife. The organ was replaced and Emerson is recovering. After the assault Emerson walked without assistance to the hospital, a distance of five blocks, and was put under the influence of ether as soon as the wound had been examined. On the operating table the heart was exposed by a long incision, which necessitated the breaking of several ribs.

The operating surgeons inserted two fingers and lifted out the heart. It was drawn clean out of the trunk, yet it went on with its work with almost normal steadiness and regularity. The out was a large one and required six stitches. The pleura was opened and a gathering of blood removed. After the wound had been dressed Emerson was extremely weak, but is rallying slowly and the surgeons believe he will recover.
