BROWNWOOD.
Dr. Cross, county physician,

Brownwood.

At 9 o'clock Tuesday night at
the home of Mr. and Mrs. L. W.
Sanders, in Coggins Addition, Mr.
Return Davitt and Miss Yrma
Pinson were quietly married.
The city council has let the
contract for 3000 feet of six-inch
water main to be laid on Austin
Avenue from the Santa Fe tract to
Daniel Baker College.

Rev. Catt Smith, general
evangelist for the Baptists in this
district, who was here during
the Missionary conference, an-
nounces that he will in future
be located at Brownwood.

The Fort Worth Record writes
to their agent, E. C. Seitz, of
this city, that the new train ser-
vice from Fort Worth to Brown-
wood will be put on either the
14th or 16th of this month unless
some unforeseen accident should
occur to prevent operations of
their present plans.

The old church building on
Fisk street, recently used by the
Protestant Methodists, is being
torn down and removed from the
lot on which it has stood for the
past few years. This building
was erected by the Baptist de-
nomination years ago, at which
time it was one of the finest
church buildings in the city.

The election of aldermen Tues-
day was the quietest election
ever pulled off in Brownwood.
But one of the present aldermen
had an opposing candidate. C.
L. Giddens was elected over W.
T. Hoskinson in ward 3. W. C.
Harrison and Frank Crumb
were re-elected in wards 1 and 2.

\$110 in cash and a large number
of stamps were made way with
by daring robbers. Nitro gly-

COMANCHE.

J. H. Bryson has bought the old oil mill property which he intends to utilize for a gin.

J. M. Thurman and J. H. Cooper have sold their farms near Sibley and will move to Jones county.

The Presbyterians have arranged to have Rev. Gaines B. Hall preach for them the second and fourth Sundays in each month.

The stockholders of the new oil mill company met in the rear of the Farmers & Merchants National Bank Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock and organized. The name of the institution is to be the Comanche Oil Co., with a capital of \$50,000.

Cards are out announcing the marriage of Miss Tillie Kelley and Mr. Harvey Aikin, at Medina City on the 17th inst. The bride-to-be is the daughter of O. H. Kelley, who last year moved to South Texas for his health, while the groom is a ranchman, being the owner of several large goat ranches.

Postmaster Atterbury has received official notice from the postoffice department that a rural free delivery line running out of Comanche to Dinger and return by Hesse, as outlined here before, by the Chief, has been allowed and the service will begin on May 2. He further says that petitions for a route to Merzer Gap and Democrat have been sent in to the department and he has no doubt been acted on favorably.—Chief.

SAN SABA.

Wesley Cook, the thirteen year old son of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Cook of Wallaces Creek, died at 5 o'clock Monday morning.

T. A. and N. R. Sloan have leased the 8000 acre pasture in the Otse Reservoir, Oklahoma,

heretofore occupied by Walker Bros., and expect to stock it with about 2000 cattle from their San Saba county ranches.

W. T. Moore of Beed has bought the 25 acre tract and residence of his brother, D. F. Moore, on the river below town, for \$1100 and a bill payable May 1.

D. H. Meek of Mason was in San Saba this week attending court. Mr. Meek's many friends in San Saba extend to him their tenderest sympathy on the death of his wife.

The Baptist meeting is now in progress. Rev. C. Smith is doing the preaching. Rev. C. V. Carroll of Brownwood is here with his colored wagon filled with good books and expects to do a good work during his stay. Wylie Harris of Brownwood is conducting the singing.

Ben Barber committed suicide by shooting himself in the forehead with a 32-target about 7:30 o'clock Tuesday evening at his home near Pontotoc. He is said to have not been normal for a month. About ten days ago he had a spell and wanted to kill himself. Just before the act he told his wife that he was going to kill himself. She tried to take the gun from him but failed. He went about 100 yards from the house and in sight of his wife fired the fatal shot. He lived only a short while. His widow and several children survive him. The widow is a daughter of W. L. Hayes.—News.

Comanche county will have a prohibition election today and the outcome will be awaited with interest by the Goldthwaite people.

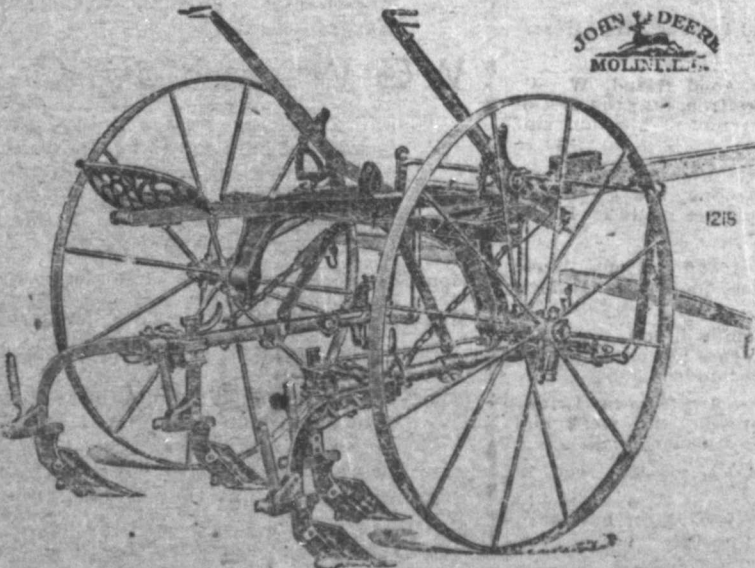

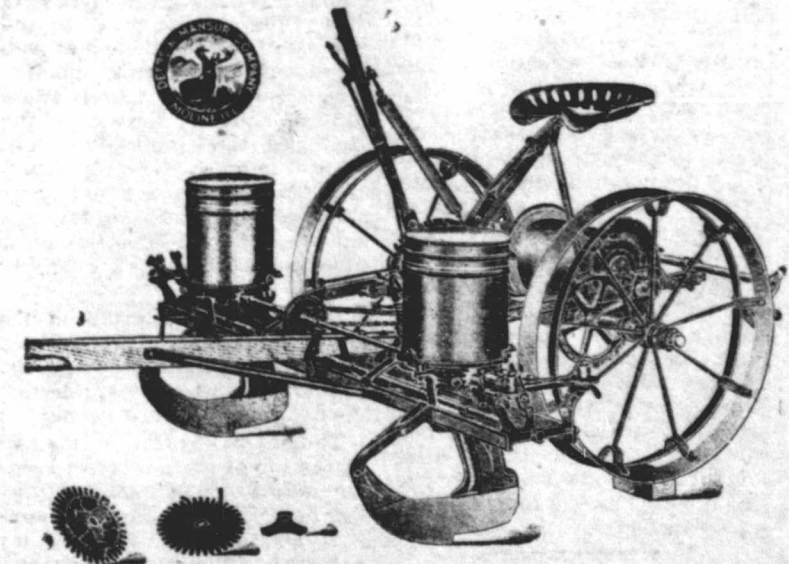

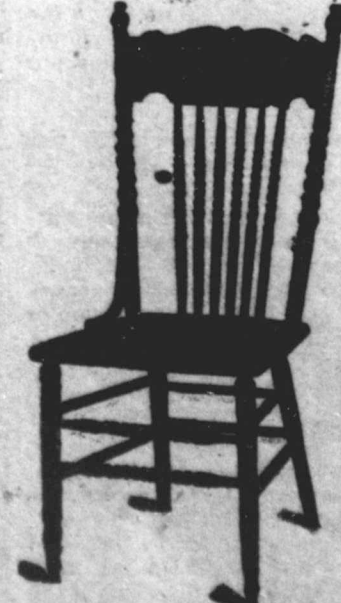

An anti-high rent society is being organized by the laboring people of New York City.

The Fort Worth Record has put on a special train to run from Fort Worth to Santa Fe trains. By this arrangement the Record will reach Goldthwaite each morning on the 9 o'clock train the same day it is published. To do this the special train leaves Fort Worth at 2 o'clock each morning and arrives in Brownwood at 7 o'clock. This not only gives us a morning paper ten or twelve hours early, but greatly facilitates the mail service, generally. The Record is a first class paper in every respect and the enterprise of its management should certainly be appreciated by the public.

Miss Mildred Baird of Big Valley has accepted a position in the D. H. Trent bank.

The explosion of a lot of powder in the handling room of the United States battleship Missouri off the coast of Florida Tuesday resulted in the death of 32 men and \$50,000 damage to the vessel.

If the reports that are being sent out from political authorities in the different states prove correct, Judge Parker will have no opposition for the Democratic nomination for president by the time the national convention meets in St. Louis.

There was a social gathering at the residence of Mr. F. M. House at Center City last Friday night in honor of the birth of Misses Luisa Carter and Ethel Cherry and Messrs. Thos. and James House. The young people entertained a great many of their friends who wish for them many happy returns of the anniversary.

News was received here early in the week of the assassination of D. Edmondson Saturday night at his home near Vuca, McCurtain county. Mr. Edmondson and several other men were at supper and he was in the act of taking some dishes from a cupboard when the assassin fired through the open doorway and eight bullets struck Mr. Edmondson in the head. The men in the house did not see the murderer and he escaped. The sheriff was notified and he hurried to the scene with bloodhounds, but no arrests had been made at the last report received.

DEMOCRATIC MEETING. In obedience to the call of Judge Dalton, chairman of the Democratic executive committee of Mills county, several members of the executive committee met here Saturday afternoon to consider matters of interest to the party. A number of appointments were made to represent the members who were not present, these appointments being from the neighborhood represented, where it was possible to secure the attendance of one of the citizens of such community. It was decided by the committee to hold a primary election on the second Saturday in July, in conformity with the Terrell election law. Some members favored allowing all candidates to run to the general election without nominations, but a large majority of those present thought it to the interest of the candidates as well as the party to make nominations, since it is not likely there will be another ticket in the field and the nominations will amount to an election. The primary will make a short campaign and the unsuccessful candidates will not lose so much time and will be saved a considerable expense.

It was decided to print on the top of the primary ticket the test prescribed, which is: "I agree to support in the general election the nominees of this primary." The object of printing this test on the top of the ticket is to give notice to all voters that they will be in honor bound to support all the nominees if they participate in the primary. Voters who do not desire to put their ballots in the box with the test on it can cut or scratch it off, but their moral obligation will not be lessened by the act, for the placing of the test on the ticket is merely for the information of the voter and is not put there for him to vote for or against.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted by the committee. Resolved, that our representative in the state legislature, at the next meeting of that body, be requested to have Mills county exempted from the operation of the wolf scalp law. The committee then adjourned subject to the call of the chairman.

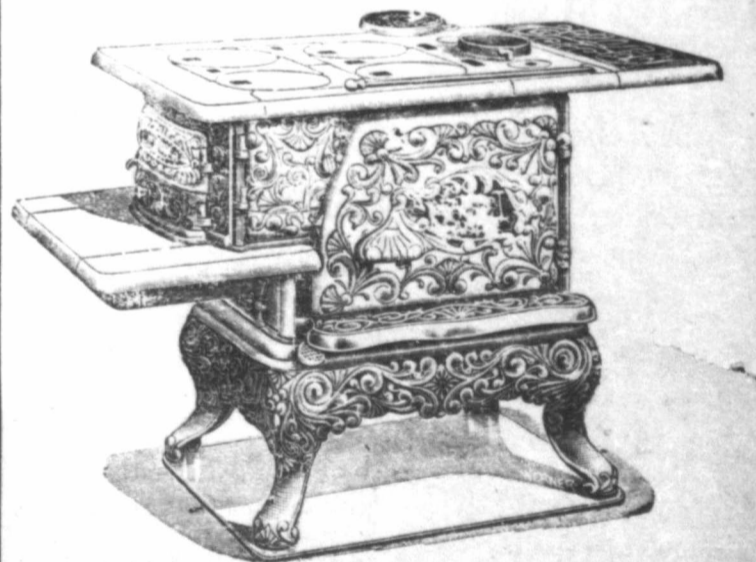

THE BOOK AGENT.

COTTON STALKS.

M. W. Marsden of Philadelphia and Joseph Wile of Kentucky, who several months since had a lot of cotton stalks shipped to Philadelphia to have them analyzed to find if there was something valuable in them, returned to Gonzales recently with samples of what was found in them, and exhibited same to a meeting of citizens. The stalks were found to contain from two to four dollars' worth of sugar to the ton, to make fine samples of paper superior to wood pulp, two pieces of material resembling celluloid, smokeless powder composition, alcohol and a valuable fertilizer. Mr. Marsden thought that an acre of average stalks would amount to about three tons, and that in the South 70,000,000 tons of stalks were going to waste that were capable of producing that many hundred millions of dollars.

These gentlemen show their faith in their investigation by offering to erect a plant at Gonzales for the conversion of the stalks into the various articles shown, at a cost of \$75,000, with a possible increase to \$250,000, if the citizens would take \$25,000 preferred stock. There is no such plant or industry yet in operation.—Platonia Argus.

Two white prisoners confined in the Jefferson county jail on a charge of murder against each, had a knockout fight in their cell Tuesday morning and the scrape created some excitement in the jail. The men became involved in a dispute over the comparative worth of the Hardin and Jefferson county jails.

A citizen of Perry, Okla., has filed a suit in Austin against the International and Great Northern and the Santa Fe railroad companies for \$1500 damages. He claims that his boy's toes were frostbitten while he was waiting at Milano for a delayed train.

Senator Dietrich of Nebraska has been declared by a special committee of congress to be not guilty of any violation of the statutes of the United States or of any corrupt or unworthy conduct relating either to the appointment of Jacob Fisher as postmaster at Hastings, Neb., or the leasing of a building in that city for a postoffice.

The court of criminal appeals has affirmed the judgment of the district court in the Ashley case, appealed from Brown county. In this case it was charged that the man ordered a jug of whisky from Rallinger and that four jugs were shipped to him. After taking one jug from the express office he gave a friend an order of the express agent for one of the three remaining jugs. This was held to constitute the sale of the liquor by the man giving the order.

STATE COMMITTEE.

The state Democratic executive committee held a meeting in Austin this week. The committee fixed June 4 as the date for county primaries to elect delegates to the State delegate convention, which is to be held at San Antonio June 21. This is the convention to send delegates to the national convention to nominate a president.

Primaries for State offices are to be held July 9, and the nominating convention is to be held at Houston August 2.

Candidates for the United States senate must submit their names to the primaries.

Where a candidate for a State office fails to get a majority in any county, the delegated votes of that county are to be prorated according to the votes cast in the primary in that county.

District committees are given authority to apply the blanket primary system and to decide whether majority or plurality shall control in congressional, senatorial and other campaigns.

It is recommended that all white democrats (the term including all races except negroes) be permitted to participate in the primaries if they will give a pledge to "vote for the nominee of the democracy, from constable to presidential electors."

Counties failing to observe rules and dates prescribed by the committee are to have no representation in the temporary organization of the convention; they are recommended that they be given no representation after permanent organization.
