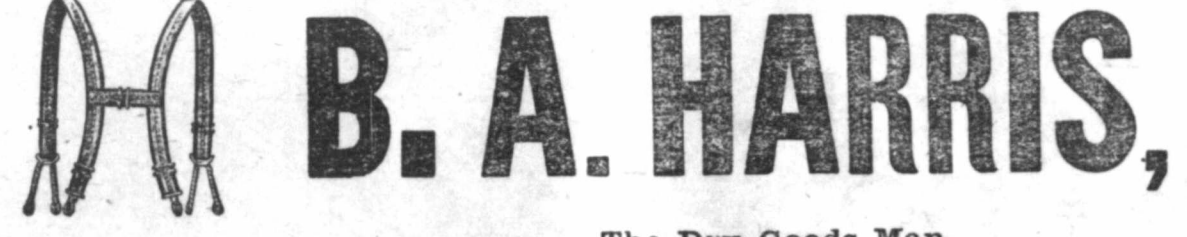

### GREAT DAY AT MULLIN.

The Mullin camp No. 543 of Woodmen of the World is going to have a basket picnic on May 5, and request me to invite you and the readers of your excellent paper. The picnic will be one-half mile from Mullin and those of your town will have no trouble reaching the ground from the train or with vehicles.

Our ground will be ideal with just a little work for a great assemblage. We are certainly going to have a grand day, for you know our generous Woodmen don't do things by halves. Everything will be in first class order. Some of the state's best speakers will be with us. You will certainly not lose anything by closing up your business or dropping your work and spending the day with us. We insure you a pleasant day if you will come up and let us show you what Woodmen can do. Don't fear there will be such a crowd that you cannot get on the ground. The ground is large. We extend a special invitation to the Woodmen of Goldthwaite. We want everybody to be with us. Come and don't forget to bring your basket. It will play an important part in the program.

Four persons were hurt and a number of houses destroyed by a tornado at Mount Vernon Sunday.

The anniversary of the birth of Miguel Hidalgo, who initiated the movement of Mexico's independence from Spain, will be celebrated throughout Mexico on May 8.

The United States geological survey is investigating the occurrence of radium in this county and seeking public co-operation in gathering details regarding localities of radio-active minerals.

When the case of Ed Kelly, charged with looting the Rawlins county treasury, was called at Atwood, Kas., last Saturday, Kelly failed to appear. His cash bond of \$2500 was forfeited. The officers have since discovered that the whole amount was counterfeited, in bills of large denominations.

It has been decided by the World's Fair management to install electrical devices instead of having ticket sellers and ordinary turnstiles during the exposition period. The Lindell entrance will be the main gate to the exposition. There are thirty-two turnstiles being installed, and through this entrance alone it is estimated that at least five hundred persons can pass every sixty seconds. To gain admission to the grounds a person must approach the turnstile and place a half dollar in a slot. This half dollar as it descends is still visible and releases a lever which unlocks the turnstile. The person then can pass through the gates and the minute he is inside the turnstile is locked. Individual gates are being installed for children. At these turnstiles a special boy will operate the machine.

A special note: A telegram was received in Nelson Sunday announcing the death at Washington city of Mrs. Martha McWhirter. Many years ago Mrs. McWhirter became a leader in a society known as the Sanctificationists, which caused a great deal of trouble and resulted in the separation of a number of women from their husbands and the breaking up of many homes, leading finally to the whipping of the Daw brothers, which came near becoming an international affair as they were Scotchmen. The society under her leadership had most wonderful financial prosperity. They built and still own the Central hotel property here. After accumulating several hundred thousand dollars, seven years ago she went to Washington city, taking the entire society with her, investing their means in that city. They have an elegant home there, where the entire society lives together.

### SCHOOL CONCERT.

The closing exercises of the Bull Springs school took place last Friday night and were attended by an immense audience. The program had been arranged on the outside of the school building and seats were arranged so that the audience could sit in the open air. These seats were filled early and by the time the program was rolled back there was a perfect throng of people sitting in vehicles and standing as far out as a view of the stage could be had.

### OIL MILL PROPOSED.

Editor Eagle:

Why not Goldthwaite have an oil mill. She needs it. Why? Because the farmers would get a better price for their cotton and the townsmen would get feed cheaper, and better feed for old sook.

One sack of seed meal for..... \$1.25  
20 lbs. bulls at 55c per cwt..... 1.00  
..... \$2.25

Will feed old sook one month. Feed her any cheaper if you can. An oil mill will give employment for two firemen, two rag sewers, an engineer, three men in meal room, two men in cake room, four men in tent room, two men in seed house, two oilers and two roustabouts, besides twelve men to run press room, where the meal is cooked, which is usually run by negroes. That would give seventeen hands employment at least five months in the year. Then during that time there would be at least five men feeding cattle. Of course, some folks say, oh, well there is a 100 ton mill at Brownwood, and Goldthwaite is too close to Brownwood for an oil mill. But there is a 90 ton mill at Dublin, and on down the line twenty miles at Hico is a 60 ton mill, which three years ago, run from September until either the first of May or June, I don't remember which.

But you say, "Oh well, we wouldn't have enough seed here to run a mill," so we wouldn't, and they don't have at Brownwood, Stephenville, Dublin or Hico, but they get seed from Louisiana, Georgia, Arkansas, Oklahoma and other states and run the mill just the same. And they could do the same by Goldthwaite. Put a few hundred in an oil mill and see how it will help your town. There are lots of us wanting employment. Build an oil mill, so we can go to work. Look at Comanche she's getting one. Hamilton is getting an electric light plant. Citizens of Goldthwaite and Mills counties come alive, shed off the old rascal, build up the quarters and we'll all feel better. HAS FOX.
