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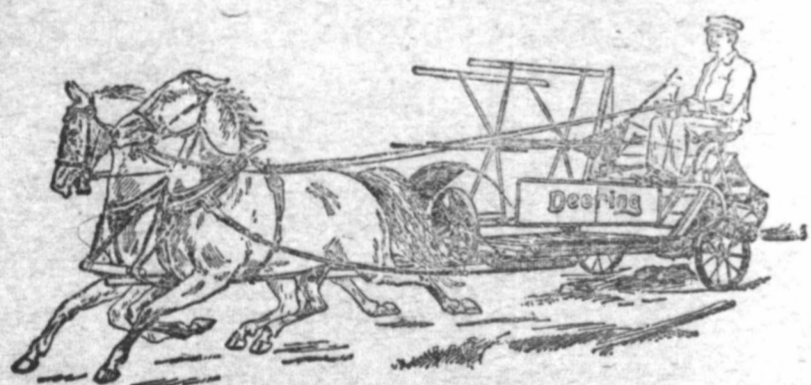

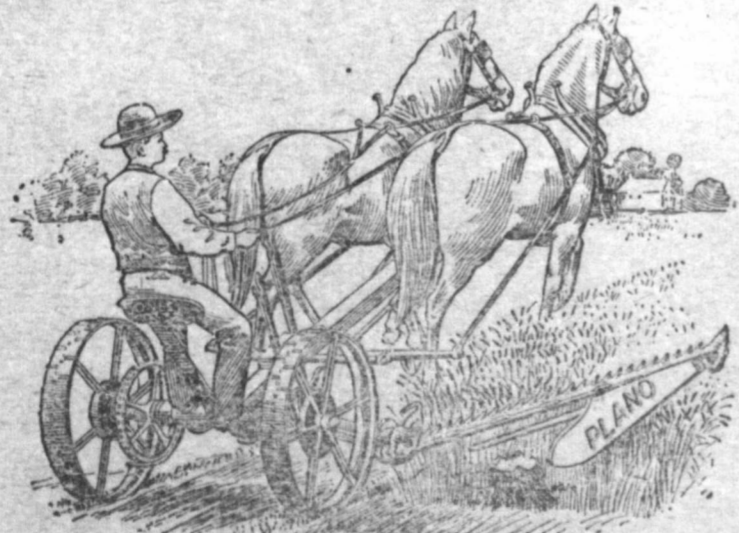

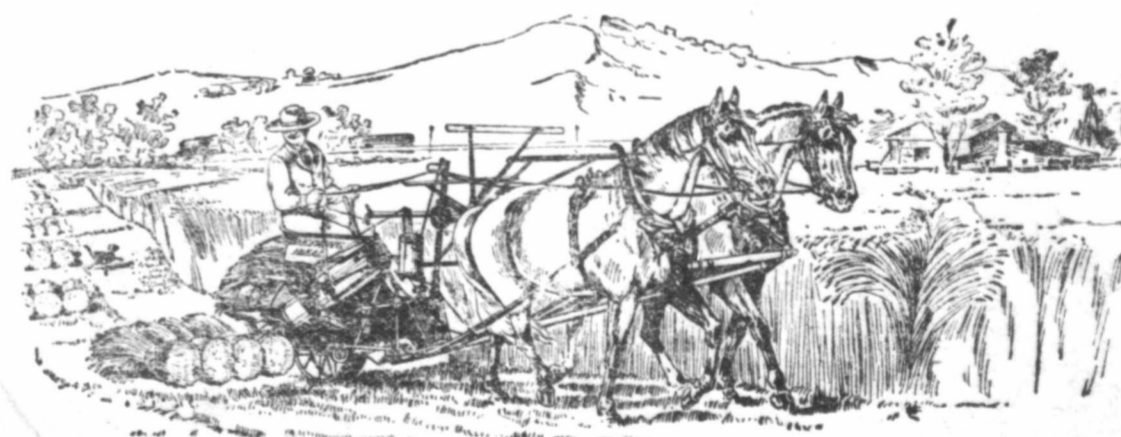

**VISIT TO SAN ANTONIO**  
The Eagle editor  
meeting of the State  
association which was held in  
Antonio last Thursday and Friday.  
There was a large gathering  
of the newspaper workers at  
this meeting and the business

D. T. Bueh et al. were allowed to open a third class road in the Shaw Bend country.

All of these changes are to be made without expense to the county.

The court granted a petition for widening the Goldthwaite and Newberg road to 30 feet and allowed Chas. Pfluger \$125 for the necessary land.

An order was entered opening a new road from Mr. Briley's place to the Reeves crossing on the Colorado river.

The tax rate was fixed at the

same as last year, except that the Brown county special was eliminated.

The court has under consideration the building of a bridge across Bennett Creek at Center City and one across Pompey Creek on the Mullin and Brownwood road. These bridges are needed badly and it is sincerely hoped that the court will decide to build them. Commissioners Henry, Cooke and Jones inspected the crossing on Pompey Creek Thursday and it is not necessary to inspect the Bennett Creek crossing, for everybody knows a bridge is needed at that place.

**CLAIMS SETTLED.**  
 When Mills county was formed out of parts of Lampasas, Hamilton, Brown and Comanche counties the three first named counties had outstanding indebtedness for public buildings and bridges. The territory taken from each county was held to be liable for its proportionate amount of the indebtedness and a special tax was levied upon the property in such territory. Lampasas and Hamilton counties were paid in full several years ago, but the Brown county claim being much larger than the others the claim of that county was not paid in full until the special tax of 1903 was collected. In fact, the Brown county officers made a miscalculation and claimed that this county still owed something near \$1000 to that county. Thursday of this week Judge L. E. Patterson and Commissioner M. C. Humphries went to Brownwood and assisted the court there in making the calculation of the amounts paid together with the interest and it was found that Brown county had been paid \$99 80 more than was due and the money was refunded by the commissioners court of that county.  
 This settlement puts the county entirely out of debt, save a bonded indebtedness of less than \$20,000, and this amount would not be nearly so large had it not been for the flood of 1900, when three steel bridges were almost destroyed and had to be re-built. The commissioners court is entitled to the greatest praise for the economical and careful management of the county's affairs and the splendid condition in which we find the county's business.

The young lady had been a sufferer with enlargement of the heart for a long time, although paralysis was the immediate cause of her death. **MRS. MAYO.**

Mrs. Mayo, wife of Mr. S. E. Mayo, died at the family home in the Trigger Mountain community Monday night. She had been sick for a long time, but at times her condition became such as to give hope of her ultimate recovery. She was a daughter of Mrs. H. J. Crockett of this city and a great many relatives and friends in this county mourn her death. She left six small children and the greatest sympathy expressed for these as well as for the husband, mother and other relatives.

The funeral at North Brown cemetery Tuesday afternoon was largely attended.

**BABY LITTLE.**

George Lindsey Little, the baby son of Mr. L. H. Little, died at the family home in this city Monday night at 1:15 o'clock, and the little body was interred in the Odd Fellows cemetery Tuesday afternoon. The little one was only two and one-half years old and extremely bright and lovable and the neighbors and friends of the family who knew the child are grieved as though they were related to him. The parents and other members of the family have the sincere sympathy of us all.

**MRS. KEESE.**

Mrs. W. F. Keese died at the family home four miles west of this city Tuesday night, after an illness of several weeks. Funeral services were held at the residence Wednesday afternoon and the remains were carried on Wednesday night's train to Lookhart to be interred in the family burying ground Thursday. Mrs. Keese came here with her husband and family a few years ago and located on what is known as the old Murray place. She was a Christian woman whose influence for good was felt among her associates and friends.

The bereaved husband and other members of the family have the assurance that they have the sympathy of many friends in their great sorrow.

**STORM AFTERMATH.**

**A SUMMARY OF THE DESTRUCTION BROUGHT.**

The cyclone that passed through the center of Mills county last Thursday night, leaving death and destruction in its wake, is still the paramount subject of interest in this county. Every day new details reach the town and new names are added to the list of sufferers.

The cyclone struck this county about four miles northwest from Goldthwaite, between Rock Springs and Williams' Ranch and moved in an easterly direction, finally ending its destructive work a short distance northeast of the town of Star.

The first damage was wrought at the home of David Morris then the mighty current of wind and electricity moved on to Allen Dennis's place, the residence was wrecked and Mrs. Dennis was killed; Mrs. Weason's home was totally destroyed, considerable damage was done at Mr. A. McPherson's farm, Luther Ridd's house was destroyed and likewise Joe Griffith's home was left in ruins. It was at first reported that Mr. Griffith's leg was broken, but this report proved to be untrue. J. G. Simms lost his house, while considerable damage was done at the home of John M. Carroll and J. M. Costley. At the farm known as the "Price place, where W. S. Hetherly lives, a considerable loss was sustained, the shed room having been blown from the house and the large barn being twisted and damaged considerably, and John Clapp's house was partly destroyed. The old Hopkins place, owned by Wm. Taylor, was in the edge of the storm and the windmill was injured and some small damage was done, while the loss at Johnnie Welch's place was slight. Striking at Center City J. S. Livingston's residence was damaged some, W. R. Adams' store was shifted on the foundation and the Hawkins' store building was turned around; J. C. Fulton's barn was blown down and his dwelling was injured. The homes of Rufa and Al Langford were both in the path of the cyclone and were damaged considerably. The residence at the A. V. Patterson place was turned around and the barn blown down. Jas. Mason's home, the Hodnett place, was torn to pieces and Mrs. Mason was hurt, J. P. Hutchinson's new addition to his house was torn to pieces and the roof was taken from the old portion of the residence. S. F. Reborn's residence and barn were both totally demolished and the lumber carried away. Mr. Harper was badly bruised and his 2-year-old son died from injuries received. The child was in Mrs. Harper's arms when struck by the falling timber. Geo. Mason was killed by a piece of timber striking him in the breast and tearing his way across his abdomen, lacerating his intestines and cutting some of them in two. John Mason's house was dragged for some distance before it went to pieces and Mr. and Mrs. Mason were badly hurt. W. D. Reborn's house was destroyed and he and his two daughters hurt. W. L. Campbell's place was the last on the route. After tearing away the new portion of the house the cyclone appeared to rise and no more damage was done by it.

Some of those who saw the cyclone moving say that it looked like a monster black cloud and moved like a wave of the sea. At times it would appear to be upon the ground and then it would rise high and the sky could be seen beneath it.

There are others besides those named who suffered losses, but this list is given to show the extent and the path of the cyclone. Saturday subscription lists were circulated in Goldthwaite to secure aid for those who had lost their property and their homes. A considerable amount was realized by these lists, while the neighbors and friends of those who were in the path of the cyclone have contributed very liberally.

It is estimated that the loss from Center City to Star amounted to from \$10,000 to \$15,000. The people of that section have taken hold of the work of securing donations for the sufferers and the plan inaugurated is the best that could be thought of for rightly dividing the contributions. A number of citizens are collecting subscriptions and a distribution will be made according to the loss and necessities of the sufferers.
