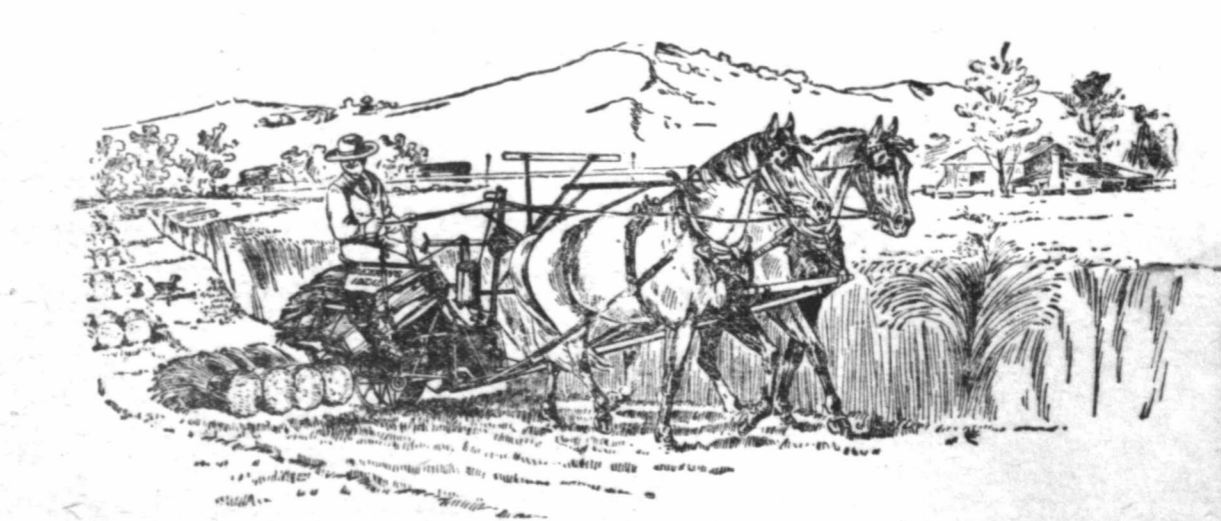

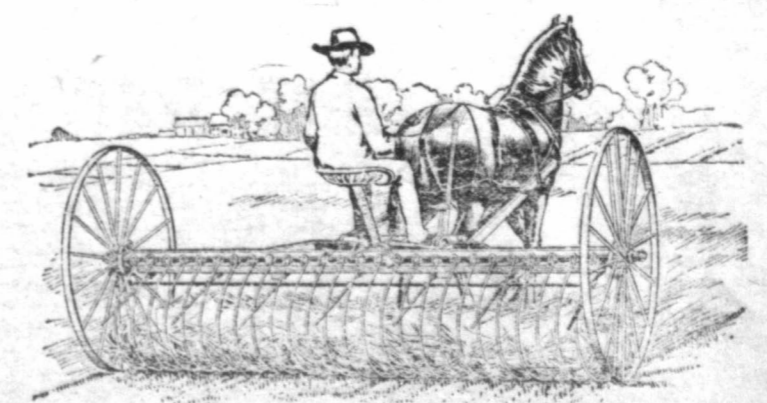

In sympathy for re thus bereaved thinking of Texas, the part round Gold- now the people were ersed with rain, and in anon I could see her green hills and valleys covered the blue, fragrant buffalo over. I could almost smell the wild plum blossoms, but then it was night, dark heavy clouds obscured the starry sky, but the cruel winds had torn and dis- figured the fair scene. We are blessed here in that we never have those awful storms. Nothing but sand storms. These are winds that blow straight and seldom do more damage than to move the little sand hills from place to place and fill the house with dust.

Though we had no storm last week, yet an awful tragedy oc- curred. We are now living in La Heurta, a suburb of Carlsbad. And really the most beautiful residence portion of the town. The houses are large and com- fortable, surrounded by green, grassy lawns and alfalfa fields. It was Monday morning I wa- out in the yard just drinking in the beauty and fragrance of the fresh young morning, wonder- ing how there could be so much sickness and sadness in so beau- tiful a world. I saw a horse dash by and heard a scream. In the lane, just north of our house, Hugh Freeman had been thrown from his buggy, and I found on reaching his side, been mortally wounded. The base of his skull was crushed. I assisted the Mexican servant, as well as I could, to get him in the house. He lived two days and nights and died. Hugh was the bright- est and one of the best young men in the town. I never saw a people mourn more for any one, than Carlsbad did for Hugh the day he was buried. All business houses closed during the funeral and every man, woman and child who could, followed Hugh to his last resting place. We have had so many deaths and accidents that...

...could not refrain from mention- ing this one instance, knowing that "sorrow makes the whole world kin" and feeling sure this melancholy event would stir the deepest, tenderest feelings in the hearts of the people of Gold- thwaite.

With the coming of spring and all her attendant leaves and flowers, the farmers have begun the sowing of seed. The land here does not require so much plowing, but as I heard a man remark, "because a fellow could raise a garden back east is no sign he can do so here." There they plow and plant in the ridges, here they plant down be- tween the ridges as it were. All the land has to be fixed so that the water may be turned on and so that it will stay on. Look- ing at a field ready to be planted, it is covered in ridges that run both ways across the field, leav- ing a smooth place between. Usually an irrigating ditch runs through or by the field, but a flood gate is put in the ditch by each section. And all the farmer has to do is to order the water and take his flood gates out, and lo! his thirsty land is watered, yet it requires quite a time to learn to irrigate properly. An expert irrigator gets \$3 per day. The Mexicans take their shoes off and wade into it bare foot. There have been 2,500 acres of cotton planted here this year. The first bales ginned in New Mexico will be on exhibition at the world's fair. And it was pro- duced near, and ginned in Carls- bad.

Alfalfa is up and covered with purple blooms, been cut and up again before one knows it. We are getting all sorts of vegeta- bles now. And the fruit crop bids fair to be a record breaker. And it is raining today. Such glorious news. You people who have had the refreshing show- er all spring cannot begin to under- stand how sweet it sounds to our dusty ears. No music could be sweeter than the patter of the rain on my roof. Susa's bird would not be nearly so melodious to the people of Carlsbad as this blessed, refreshing rain. All the birds in the country have as- sembled on my lawn and are singing most joyously the "do- dology," but I suspect all the poor old, bony cows out in the parched pastures are holding praise ser-

...vions today. It will be such a joy now to don a clean white waist and rally forth and meet smiling clean faces, instead of sour doury ones. I used to say back home, when we were going to have a picnic, and had all our pies, cakes, etc., cooked and want to bed thinking of the good day before us, then wake up early in the morning and hear the patter, patter of the rain. How disappointed and inconsol- able we were. And I often said I wished I lived in a country where it never rained. And I do live in a country where it seldom rains. And the thought comes to me, how foolish I used to be. Like many other things we wish for, and getting these same de- sired things, find how unwise we were to want such. I do trust this is the beginning of a long, continued rain. It is so much needed here. The cattle men have been shipping hundreds and hundreds of cattle to Kansas the last few weeks. And they were discouraged over the hard year. But there is a brighter day ahead for them. And I trust that when I get to Goldthwaite in June that the rain will have washed all the dust away. And that every farmer in the whole county will have a fine crop. And that every one in town will have a yard full of pretty flow- ers. And that all of you good people will be as glad to see me as I will be to see you.
