Then the school building was repaired, and its not completed either, but when the people get time they will finish it. Yes, we ordered a large school bell (30 inches in diameter at the mouth), and we are going to put it up, too. Then the new residences were Messrs. Nowell, Sikes, Walker (S. G. Jr.), Tallos and W. E. Egger; just up on the river bank at the Warren crossing in San Saba county. We would like to congratulate Mr. Egger in regard to his fine house, for we never saw many in the country that was finer than his. And the finishing and additions to houses are: Messrs. Starks, Hartman, Robertson (T.), Heshaw, Smith (Ben), Johnston, Long (Dan), Stacy and Brooks. And besides all this you ought to look around and see the new farm implements the farmers have bought.
