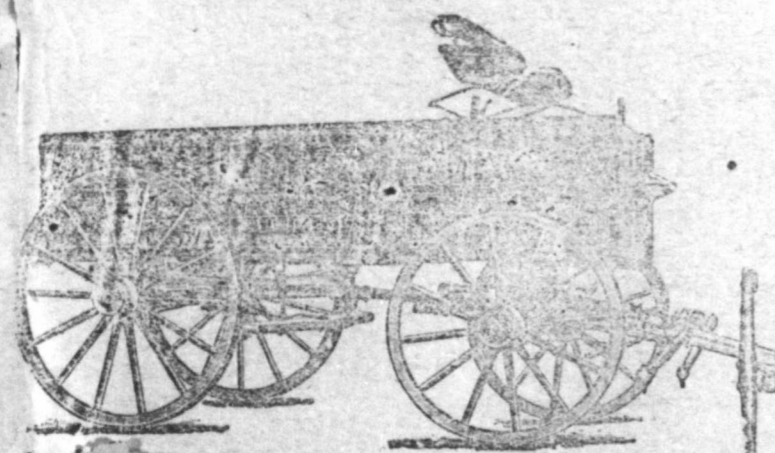

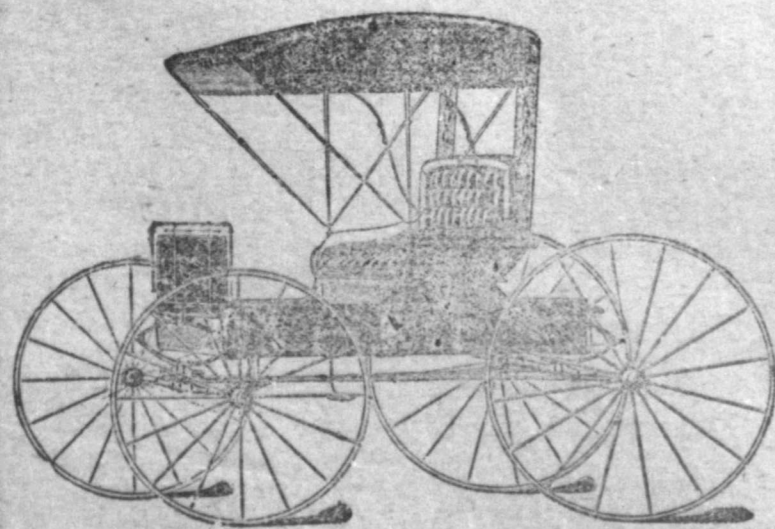

**OBITUARY.**

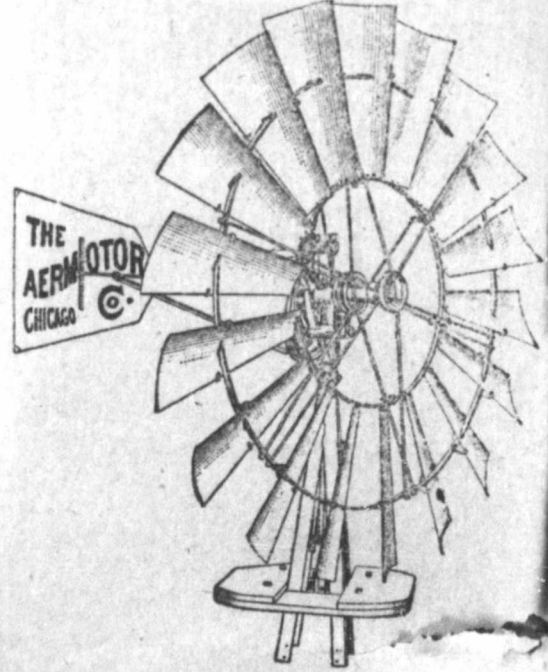
