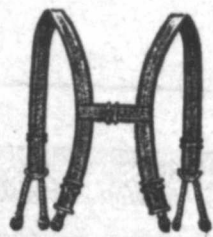
HAMILTON.

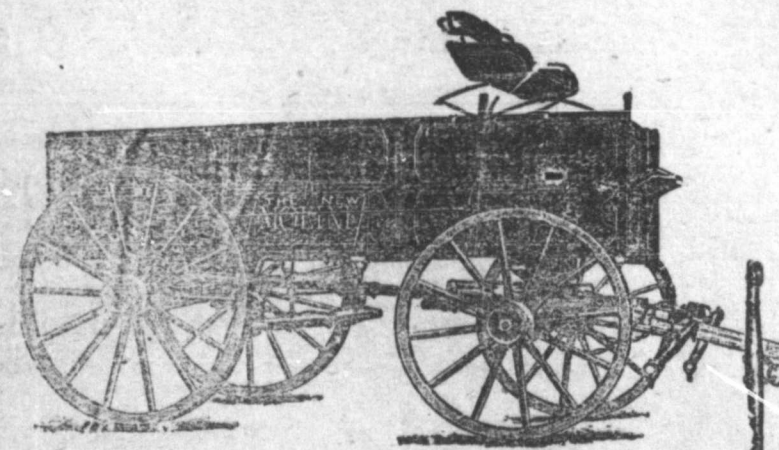

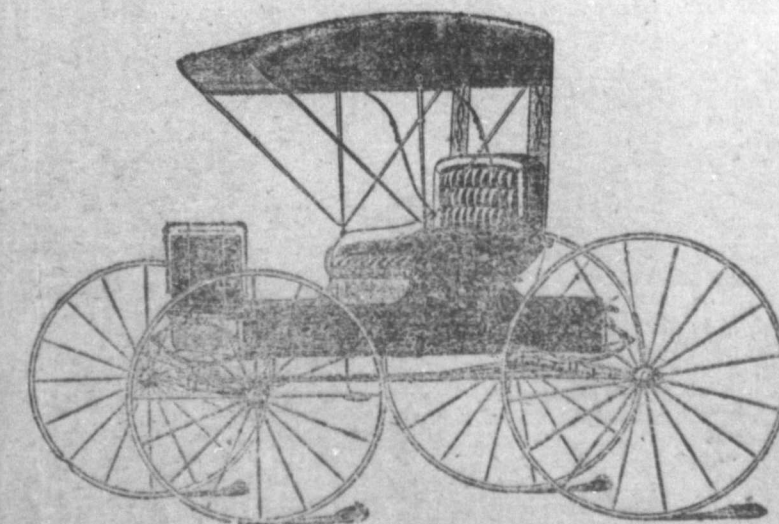

KILLED BY A SNAKE.

The little 5-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Cochrum of the Caradan neighborhood, was bitten on the foot last Saturday afternoon by a snake and succumbed to the poison in about three hours afterward.
The little fellow was playing some distance from the house in a brush and weed patch and when bitten started to the house but only went a short distance when he fell. He made an effort to rise and succeeded in doing so, but was only able to take a few more steps when he fell the second time. Just after he fell the last time his mother reached his side and picked him up, finding him unconscious, in which state he remained until his death about three hours later.
Medical aid was summoned from Goldthwaite at once, and everything that could be done for the little boy was done while waiting for the physician. But nothing seemed to stay the effects of the fatal poison and when the physician arrived he found he was too late to be of any material assistance to the little sufferer.



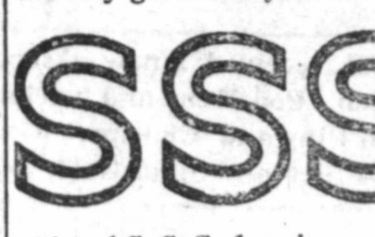
