to his decease.

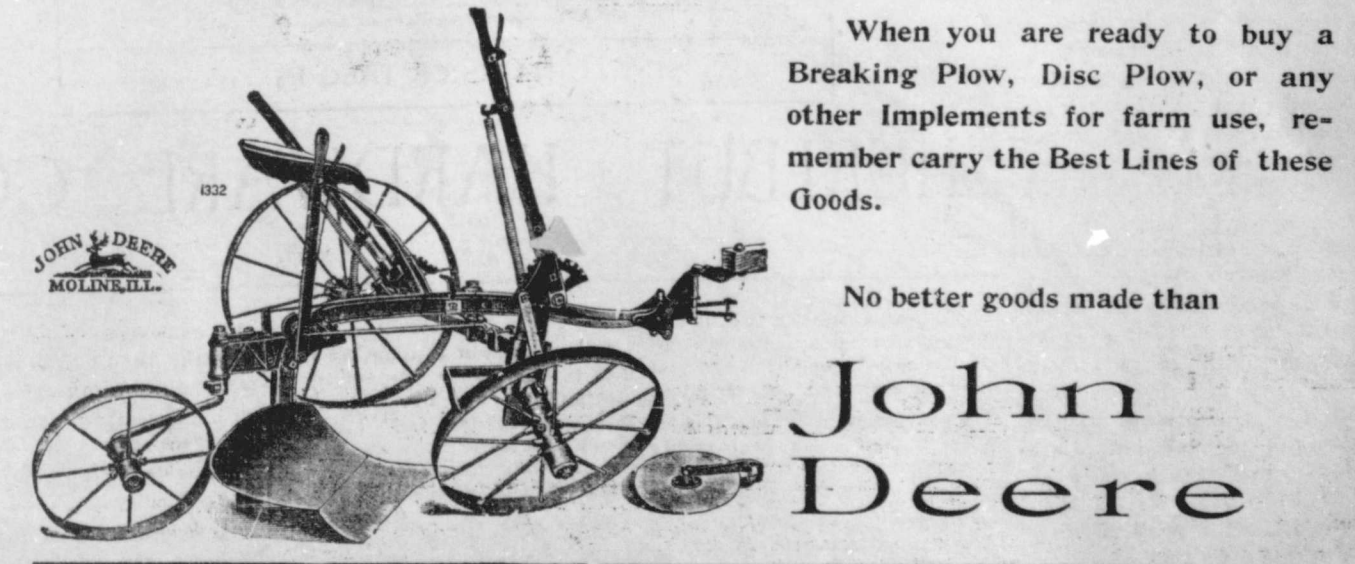

The grand jury adjourned last Saturday, after returning 50 indictments for misdemeanors and one for a felony.

A large surface tank has been dug at the Confederate camp ground to provide stock water during relocations.

A merchant at Manor has recently collected an account for \$35.36 that was due him since 1877. The debtor is now 83 years old and paid the account voluntarily.

County Clerk Crawford has issued marriage licenses to H. Y. Meyers and Miss Sallie Gentry, John Johnson and Miss Lucy Taylor, G. H. Boyd and Miss Carrie Reed.

A. J. Weathers has purchased S. T. Wells' residence in this city and expects to move here at once from his farm east of the city. Mr. Wells will probably build another residence.

President Roosevelt has announced that he will make a trip through the South in the future to explain his "trust policy."

District court called in Mills county the other day with a single criminal case on the docket. The grand jury was adjourned after returning one indictment and that for a misdemeanor.

Capt. J. D. Sexton, commander of the Confederate camp at this place, requests all members to be present at the meeting next Saturday. They are requested to come in time to lock over the camp grounds and make suggestions as to improvements needed.

Judge Terrell, the framer of the election law of Texas, was one of the first to violate the provisions of the law. Candidates are required to file an itemized statement of their campaign expenses within ten days after election. This is the portion Judge Terrell, who was elected to the legislature, failed to comply with and he is liable to a fine.

The Hurlbut Hardware Company of Brownwood and this city will incorporate on Jan 1 under the name of the Hurlbut-Jackson-Hughes Company, with a capital stock of \$100,000. 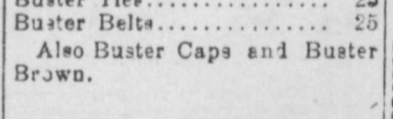

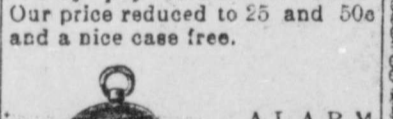

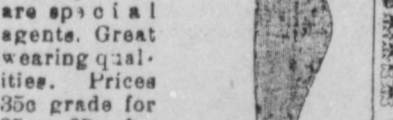
