their home.


The members of the First Baptist

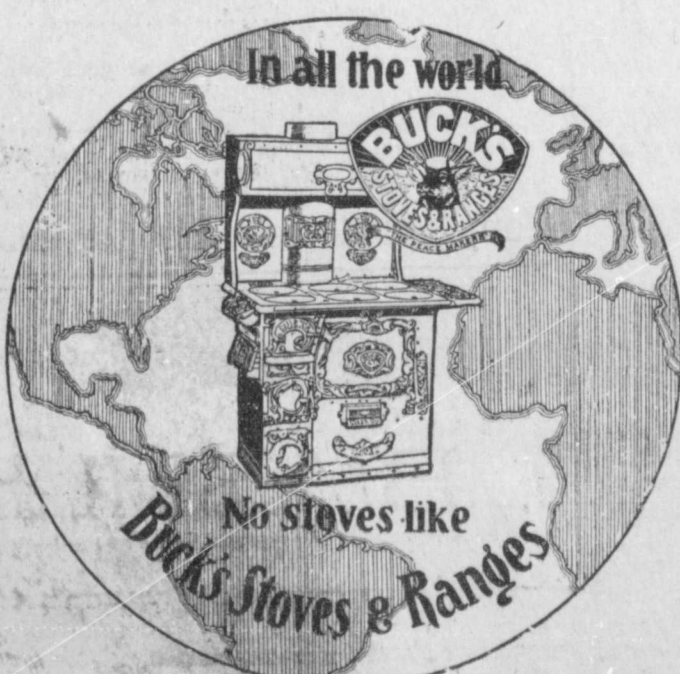

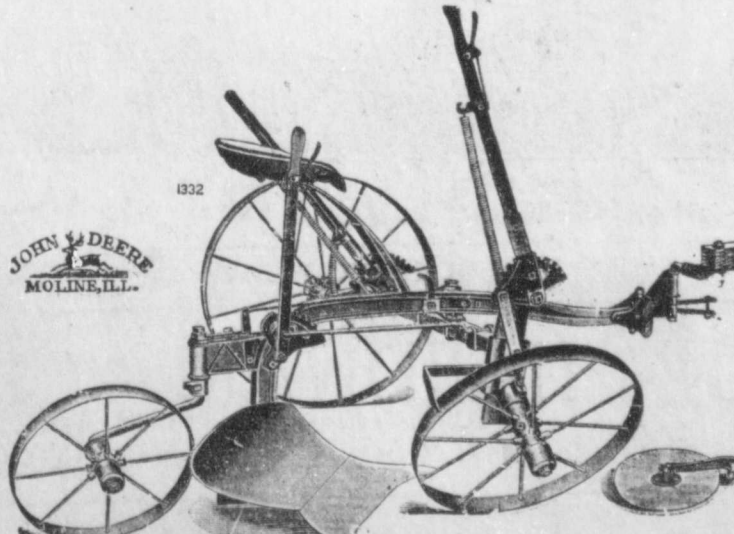

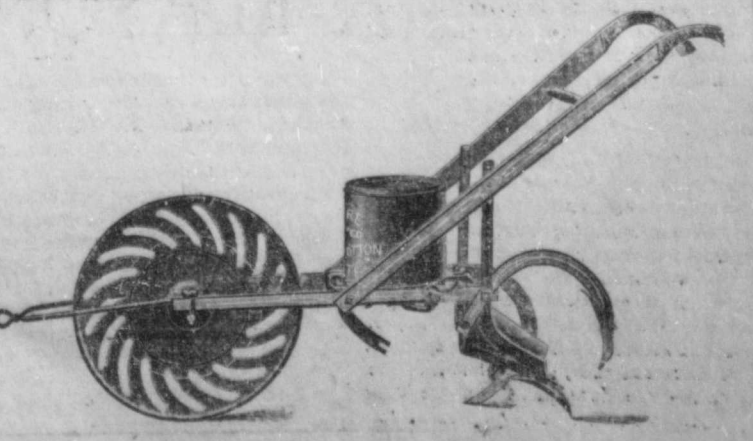
