Jim Wilson was arrested last week by a U. S. deputy marshal on a charge of "shooting into and injuring a rural delivery mail box" several miles northwest of Comanche Christmas week. He was taken to Fort Worth Saturday where he was given an examining trial and released on a \$200 appearance bond.

Hon. J. M. Rieger spent from Sunday to Tuesday night in the city. He said that legislation at Austin was yet in the embryonic state and that very little had been done outside of the committee. He said that Rising Star had quite a large force of workers at the capital and that they were making a supreme effort this year to secure the new county.

There were 3525 polls paid to Collector Robt. B. Lee up to the first of February, as against 3740 last year, a difference of 200 less, but a splendid showing for a non-election year. Mr. Lee received \$4005 in taxes Tuesday January 31 and \$4300 the previous day, the largest amount ever paid to the collector in a single day.—Chief.

A corps of Santa Fe surveyors arrived in the city Monday night from Temple for the purpose of making a survey with a view to straightening that road where it crosses the Pecan Bayou east of town. Rev. Arthur Jones, evangelist

for the Christian church, was here last night on his way home from a week's stay at Brady where he preached a number of times and then went on a hunting trip. Rev. Jones has been called to the pastorate of the Brady church and he informs a Bulletin reporter that in all probability he will accept the work.

There seems to be some unnecessary apprehension about smallpox and the danger of its spreading in Brownwood. There are seven cases in town. Four of these are in the Baker family just beyond the Frisco crossing on Fisk street, one is in Esau McGill's family in Farmers addition, and two in Wirt Small's family in the burnt mill district. These cases are all isolated, and very precaution is taken against the spread of the disease.—Bulletin.

John C. Crews last week sold 151 head of steer cattle, mostly one and two, to A. J. Griffin for \$2000.

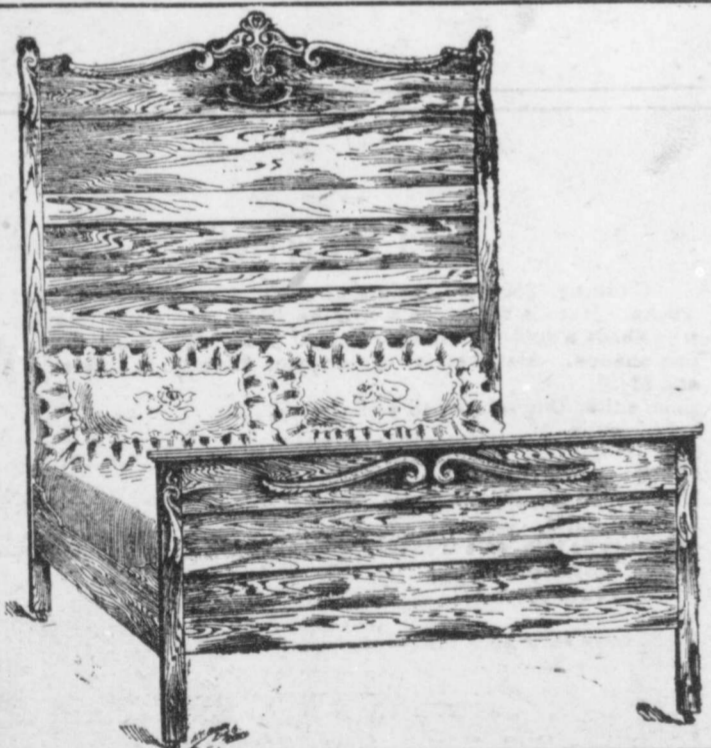
J. L. Price, the restaurant man, has sold his business on the west side of the square to T. J. Wilson and B. A. Caldwell.

We understand that an effort is being made to get the legislature to carve a new county out of Hamilton, Bosque, Erath and Comanche, with Hico for the county seat.

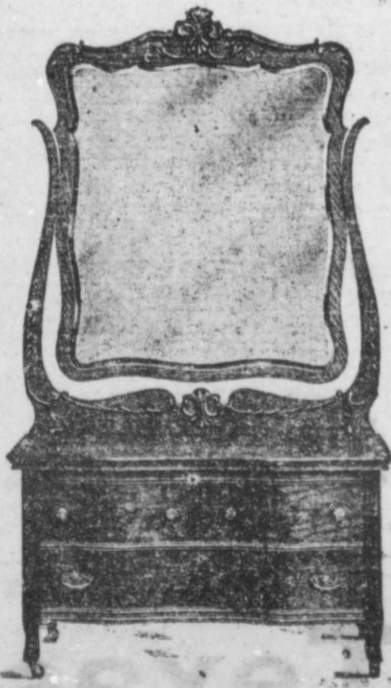
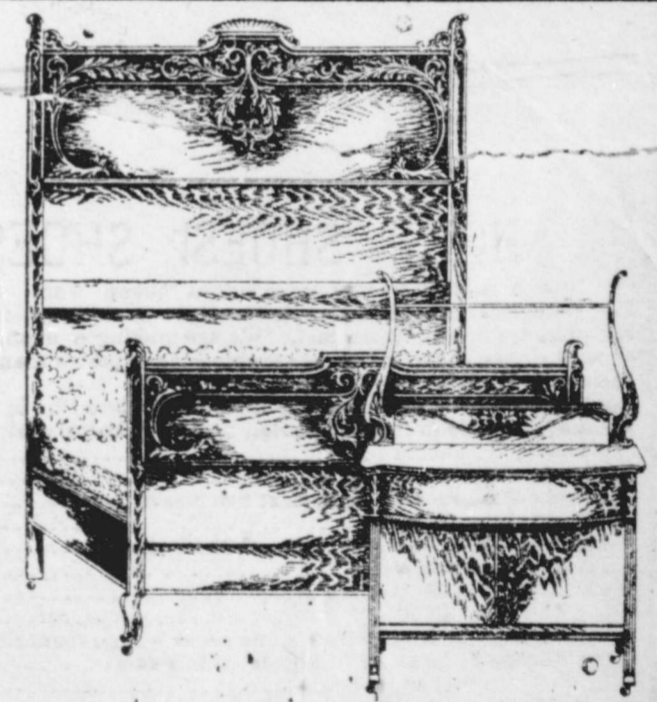

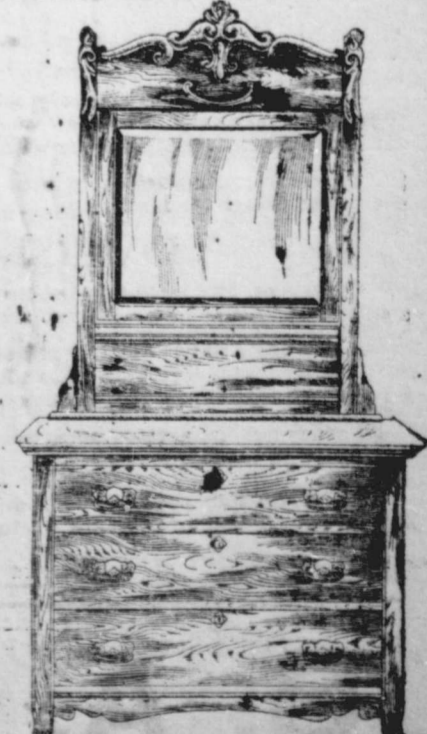

Mr. and Mrs. Gavit returned to their home at Brady City Monday, after a visit to friends and relatives here.

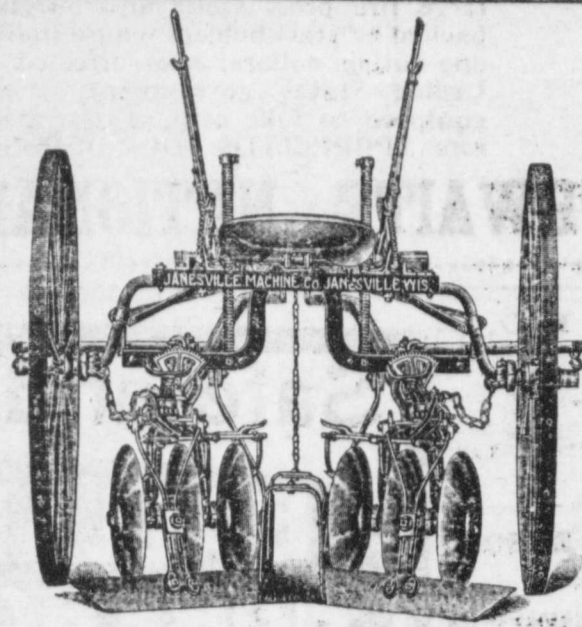
Med Kirby has been visiting his sister and other relatives at Fort Worth.

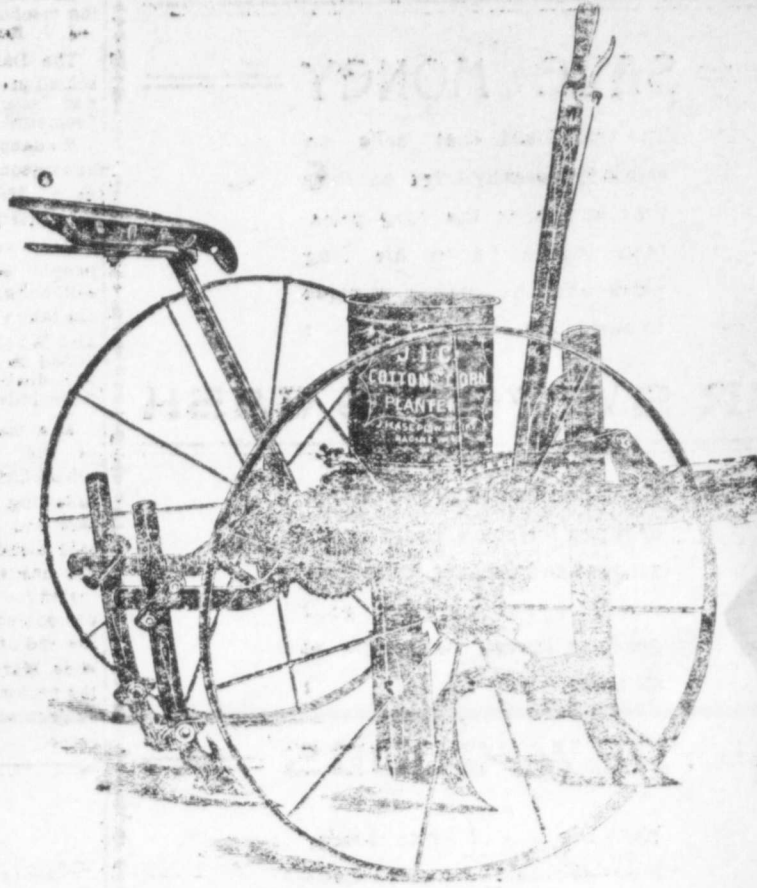
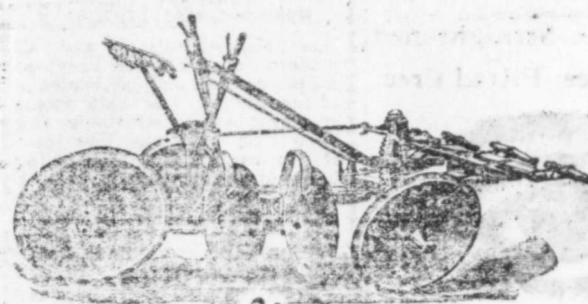

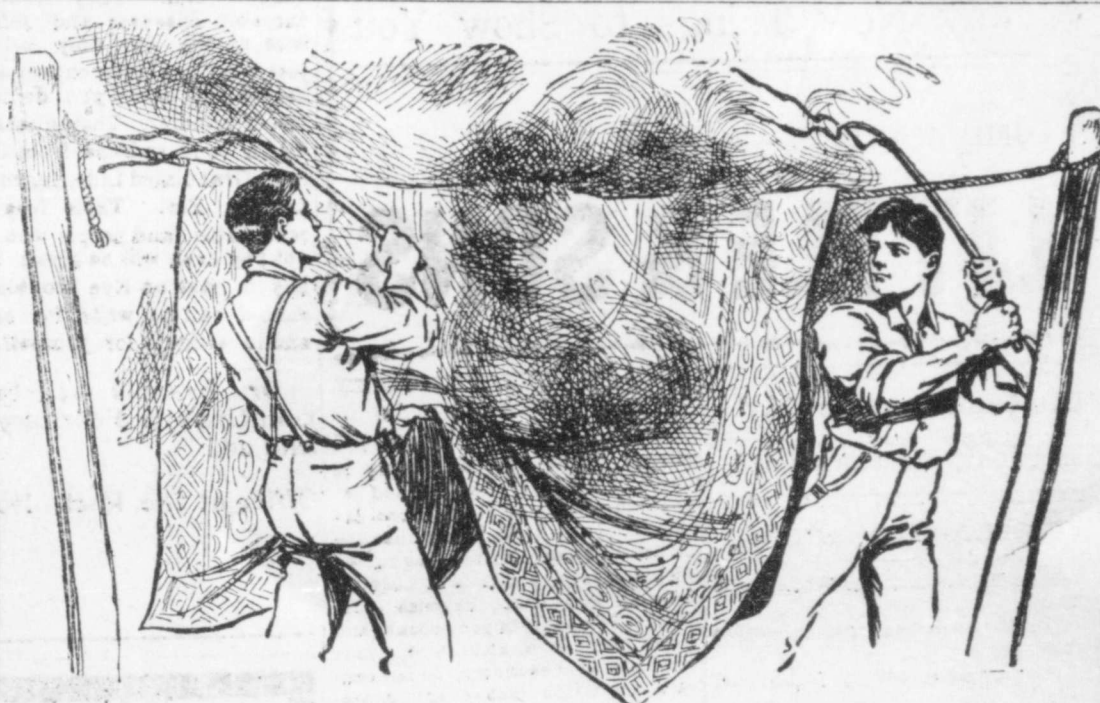
