City Marshal King, who also is city tax collector, reports that 92 per cent of all taxes assessed against property owners in Lampasas has been collected.

There must be something wrong with the young people of this county, as not a marriage license was issued by the county clerk from the 15th of February to the 16th of March.

Stokes Bros. & Co. and Barnes, Higdon & Co. each shipped a hundred bales of cotton to Kobe, Japan, Tuesday of this week. The cotton goes from here to Houston, thence to San Francisco by rail, and thence by steamer to Japan, and the freight rate from here to its final destination was only \$1.35 per hundred pounds.—Leader.

Congregational ministers representing Boston and various sections of New England have forwarded to the American board of commissioners for foreign missions a protest against the acceptance by the board of a gift of \$100,000 from John D. Rockefeller. The petition, which was prepared by a committee chosen at a meeting of the clergymen, protests against the acceptance of the gift on the ground that the Standard Oil company, of which Mr. Rockefeller is the head, "stands before the public under repeated and recent formidable indictments in specified terms for methods which are morally illicit and especially destructive" and that acceptance of such a gift involves the acceptance of the board in a position implying honor toward the donor and subjects the board to the charge of ignoring the moral issues involved.

Two months ago John F. Irvine, mayor of a town in Louisiana, had stolen from him \$3,500. Through some mysterious influence and manner Mr. Irvine was told by a fortune teller that he would find the money intact in the middle drawer of a bureau under some old papers in a house in Ponca, O. T., fourteen miles from Ponca City. He and officers went to Oklahoma and wired that the money, three \$1,000 bills and one \$500 bill, has been secured in the very spot named and that a suspect was under arrest at Ponca.





