Up to Wednesday of this week 18,352 bales of cotton had been shipped from Comanche from last year's crop, and there were 1,460 bales in the yards, making a total of 19,812 bales marketed in Comanche.

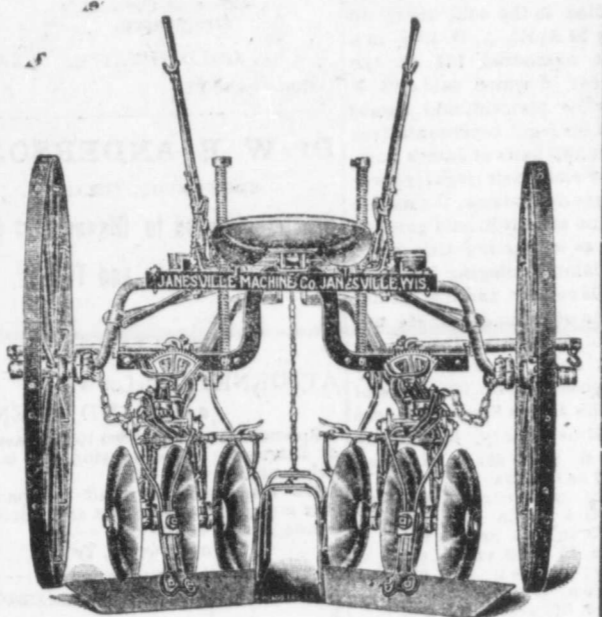


EAST SIDE SQUARE. HENRY MARTIN, WEST SIDE SQUARE

SCHOOL TERM.

The treasurer has on hand enough money to pay the salaries of the teachers for the present school month and have \$288.97 besides. There is due \$98 from transfers, which, if collected, will make a total of \$386.97. The expenses of the school amount to \$207 per month, and there are some repairs to be made on the fence; stoves and fuel for the next session must be provided. It is now up to the board to figure how much money will be required to pay these incidents and to say how much longer the public school will be continued.
