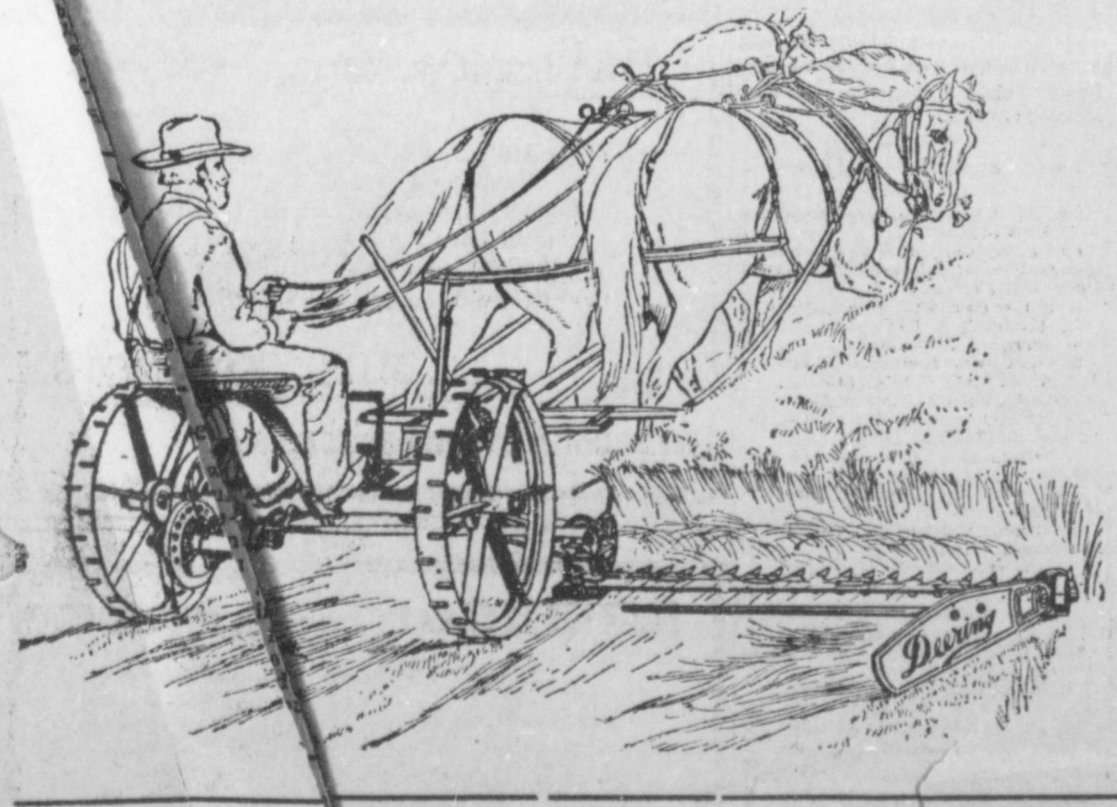

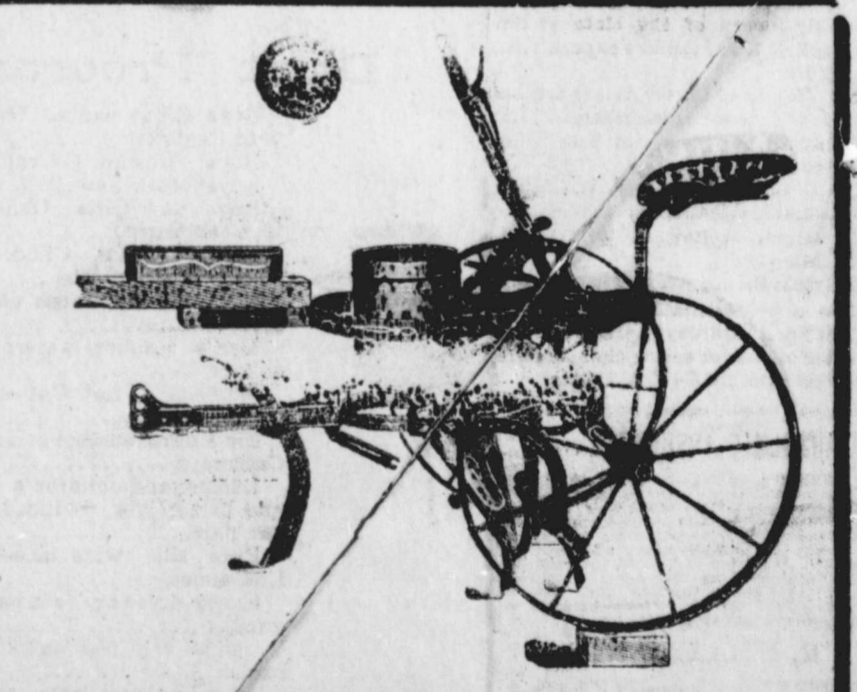

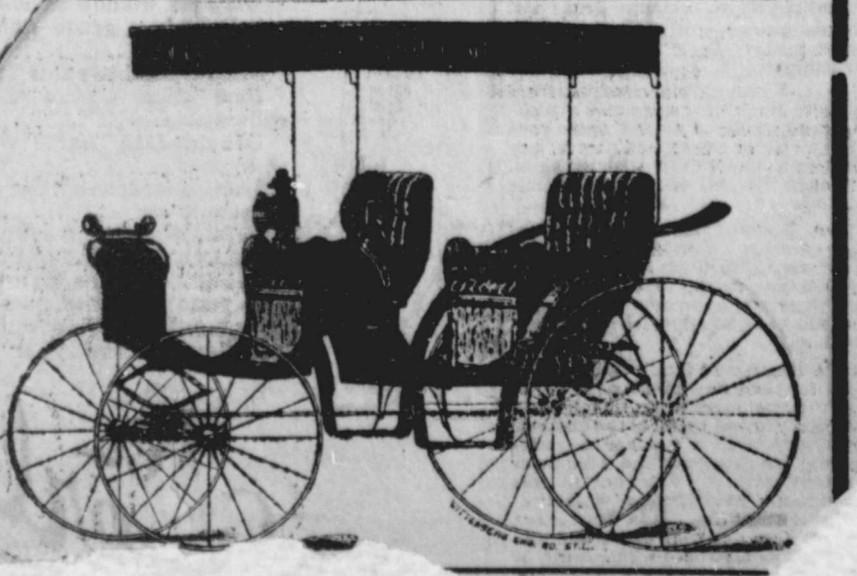

#### COLD STORAGE BILL.

Following is the law regarding cold storage or club rooms that was enacted by the legislature and approved by the governor. The law becomes effective ninety days after the legislature adjourns.

"Section 1. If any person, firm or association of persons, agent or employe of any person, firm or association of persons, who are engaged in the business or occupation of keeping or storing spirituous, vinous or intoxicating liquors for others within any county, justice precinct, subdivision of a county, city or town in which the sale of spirituous, vinous and intoxicating liquor has been prohibited under the laws of this state shall permit any one to drink spirituous, vinous or intoxicating liquor within such place of business, such persons, firm or association of persons, agent or employes, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor.

"Sec. 2. If any person, firm or association of persons, or any agent or employe, shall be found guilty of the

above offense they shall be punished by a fine in any sum not less than twenty-five dollars (\$25) and by confinement in the county jail for not less than sixty days."

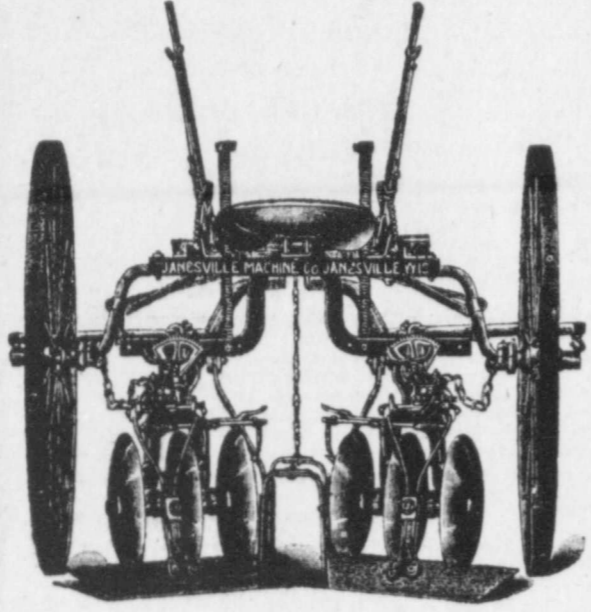

#### SCHOOL MATTERS.

The school board met Tuesday and decided to continue the session of the public school to May 10.

An election was ordered to be held the first Saturday in May for school trustees in the Goldthwaite independent district. The terms of Messrs. Matt Koach, W. G. Welch, J. C. Evans and B. Lammers expire at this time, while the terms of L. E. Miller, G. H. Frizzell and Dr. Em. Wilson will not expire for another year. The present board has worked faithfully and the members who will agree to serve another two years are sure to be re-elected.

The board has under consideration the building of an addition to the school building in order to relieve the crowded condition of the school. There are now outstanding two building bonds of \$1000 each. It is proposed to issue \$5000 more bonds and the money realized thereon and the bonds will be taken up and the addition to the building can be made with the remainder. By this system the present school tax will not be increased, but three years longer. Of course, the assurance will have to be submitted to the voters in the district and it is not likely that any move will be made in the matter until after the election of the trustees.

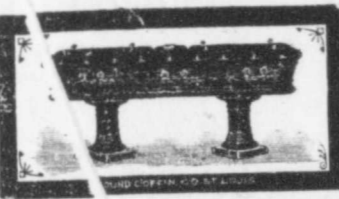
