





The Russian and Japanese fleets have not yet come together.

Weatherford secured the widows and orphans home of the Knights of Pythias lodge, the selection having been made Thursday.

John R. Curl, secretary of state, died at his home in Austin Wednesday. O. K. Shannon, who has been his chief clerk, was appointed to succeed him.

The Love bill increasing the ad valorem tax rate to 25 cents was finally passed by the lower house of the legislature Wednesday.

The Lewis and Clark centennial exposition is to open in Portland, Oregon, June 1, and the management expects to have everything in readiness for the occasion.

Major B.B. Waddell of Helena, Ark., aged 75 years, who carried the last message of General Johnston on the field of Shiloh, died in New Orleans this week at the home of his daughter.

Ex-Lieutenant Governor Jester, Ex-Attorney General C. K. Bell, Judge M. M. Brooks of the court of criminal appeals, Railroad Commissioner Colquitt and State Chairman Wells are among those who will seek the Democratic nomination for governor of Texas next year. Already the campaign has been opened by some of them.

Negotiations between the United States and China for a treaty restricting the immigration of Chinese to this country have been practically abandoned. It has been found impossible by the representatives of the two governments to reach a common ground of agreement as to many of the terms of the proposed treaty.

A mass meeting was held in Hempstead Monday night to ratify a petition to the governor asking that rangers be sent there to enforce the prohibition law and affirming that the officers of the county would not do their duty. Trouble was precipitated at the meeting and four men were killed and others were wounded. Congressman Pinckney and his brother were among the killed. Adjutant General Haden accompanied a body of rangers to the town and more trouble can be expected.




