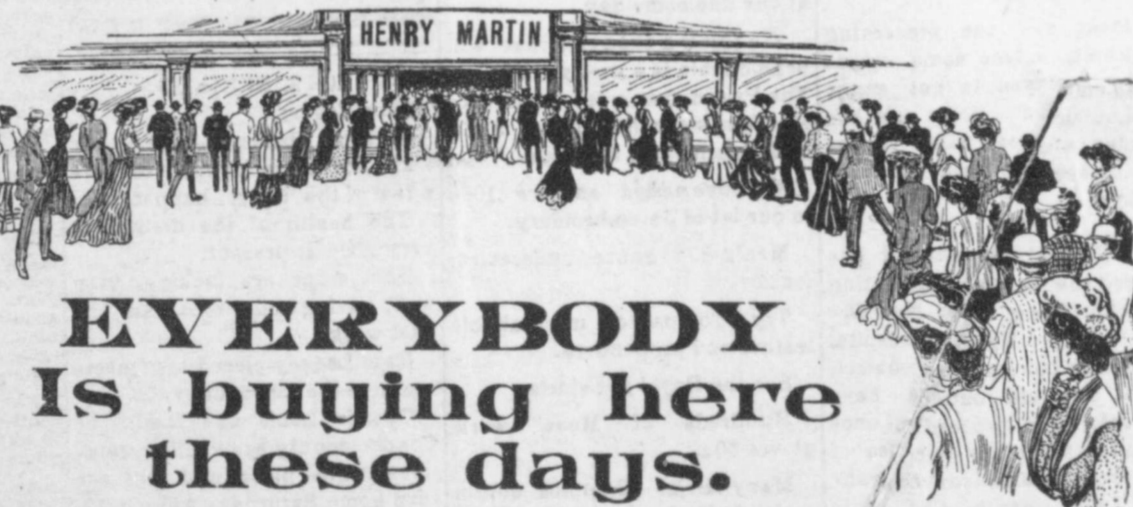

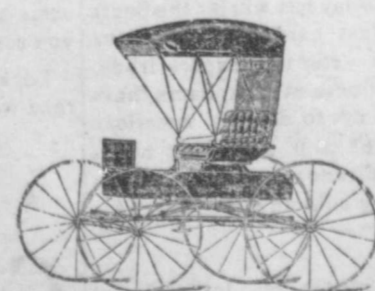

The first bale of this season's cotton was brought in Thursday by Norman Harrell of the McMillan community, San Saba county, and was sold to Gatlin & Geeslin at their round bale gin for 4 cents per pound in the seed, which equaled about \$12.80 lint.

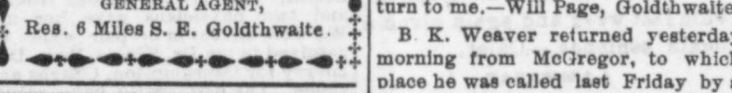
