ITEMS CULLED FROM THE LEADING LOCAL PAPERS.

BROWNWOOD.
Sunday night some one took a knife and whittled all to pieces a rubber tire on one of Jack Hall's lively rigs.

The new telephone line from Brownwood to Brady is now completed almost half way and work on the other end of the line is progressing rapidly.

Willie Marshall, who is employed by the Zephyr Light and Power company, was in Brownwood Sunday and says the electric light plant made its trial run last Thursday.

Luther Regian, a 15-year-old lad, was arrested Tuesday by Constable Snipe of the Maytown precinct on a charge of burglarizing the home of B. M. Roberts in Gap creek community in the northern part of the county.

A secret marriage of some two months standing was made known Monday. The contracting parties in this rather romantic wedding are L. F. Boatwright and Miss Dovie Swart, two of Brownwood's popular young folks.

At a meeting of the Business League Tuesday afternoon W. H. McGoldrick, representing the Federal Gas Co., of Washington, D. C., was present and asked the League to endorse an application from his company for a franchise to establish a gas plant in Brownwood for heating and lighting purposes.

George Mills, who lives about sixteen miles up the Bayou, had quite a serious accident happen to him one day last week. 

Ike Aarons of the Bayou community had business in this city Wednesday.


