GARDEN CITY.

Editor Eagle:
I thought I would send a few
words for the Eagle's claim to
let the people of Mills county
know that I am alive. We landed
safe and sound in the little town
of Garden City September 1st,
and were cordially received by
the noble people of this place.

I began my work September 7,
and made my first run to Stiles
station on the 27th; began a
meeting which lasted till the fol-
lowing Sunday, Oct. 1. I
preached on the streets the first
two days and then we moved to
the court house, which was
crowded every day. Between
services I made visits, read God's
word and had prayer. I never
have seen a more unity among
Christian people as was mani-
fested there and God gave us a
glorious victory over sin and
satan. Never have I felt so help-
less and dependent upon God's
Holy Spirit for strength and
guidance as I have been made to
feel since I have been on this
field, a scope of about one-hun-
dred square miles of fertile
plains with villages, towns and
school houses that calls for the
struggling missionaries; and to
know that we can't meet one-

tenth of them. My heart has
been made to faint within me, as
I look in the face of the situation
of West Texas. O, that God
would fit and prepare some of
East Texas young men and put
within them a burning desire for
the salvation of the lost and they
would turn their faces westward
with hearts more willing to give
than to receive, and help raise
the banner of Prince Emmanuel
to a lost and dying race. We
need men that are not looking
for soft places, but men that will
roll up their sleeves and work.
There is no resting place for a
true child of God, but every day
he labors the more he sees to do.
His meat and bread is to do the
Master's will.

I was proud to read the report
of your missionary, Brother J. H.
Smith. It looks like better times
for the Mills county Baptist, and
I hope God will give unto the
Mills county Baptist association
one of the most fruitful years
that's known in her history, and
you shall have my prayers and
sympathy to that end.

GONE TO REST.
 Again has it become incumbent upon the editor of this paper to write of the death of a member of his family. On several previous occasions has he performed the same sad duty, but never with a heavier heart than at this time. Realizing that it will become one to speak of the virtues and Christian character of a member of his household or to tell of the sorrow and gloom that is in the home because a loved one has gone into the great beyond, this article will be made to conform to this idea.

Mrs. Sarah Greenwood Laurance died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. R. M. Thompson, in this city Tuesday morning at 5 o'clock and her remains were laid to rest Wednesday afternoon in the silent city on the hillside west of town. Mrs. Laurance was born in Grimes county and resided there continuously until about fifteen years ago and had made her home in this city with her daughter for about ten years. She was in bad health for a long time and finally her frail constitution gave way, despite the efforts of skilled physicians and loving hands, who exhausted their every resource to stay the hand of Death.

MISSIONARY REPORT.
 DEAR BRETHREN:
 Since my last report, have visited the following places. On Friday before first Sunday in this month Brother W. L. Martin and myself went down in the Jones Valley community, and after visiting and working around there Friday and Saturday night, preached there Saturday night. There being another appointment in front of me, I came back to Rook Springs and preached Sunday night. The next week, there being so much rain, didn't get to do a great deal of work. Went down to Big Valley and back down in the North Bennett settlement, and preached there on Saturday night, and at Center City Sunday at eleven, and got \$9.20 for State and Associational missions. Came to Liberty church that night got \$6; \$1 for State and \$5 for Associational Missions.

Next week I visited the Pleasant Grove community, and found a number of good Baptist down in there, some have sought shelter in other denominations. Went on down through Payne and around Knox school house and found several Baptist who have sought a home with no Baptist organization near.

On Saturday preached for those grand Baptist, God loving people, and took a collection of \$9.50 for Associational missions and then returned to Star where we had a great meeting. Bro. Bailey is a great preacher and one whom the Lord blesses everywhere he goes, and Bro. Cornelius is a sincere we don't meet often. The Lord helping them, they got hold of the people, and young men and young ladies came by the hundreds, despite the rain and hail and cold weather, and about fifteen of them publicly confessed Christ as their Savior, and I had the happy privilege of burying seven of them with Christ in baptism, two others stand approved for baptism and several others will come in soon. We organized a church with five members and had eleven additions. Just a half collection was taken for State Missions and \$11.60 was contributed. We raised about \$45 for Bro. Cornelius, and about \$11 for incidentals.

A house for worship is set on foot and a committee appointed to push work.

These people have a mind to work and I think we shall soon see a nice church house there, and a good strong church, that believes in doing something worthy of the name of Christ.
