HAMILTON.

The State Bank & Trust Co. will be composed entirely of Hamilton people and will have a capital stock of \$50,000—Rueter.

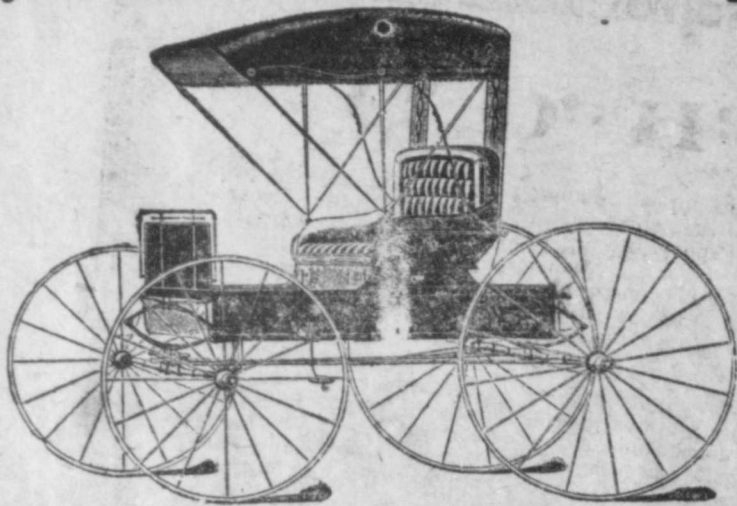
