

WEST SIDE BARGAINS AND FREE PREMIUMS.

WHAT I SAW IN DALLAS Editor Eagle: As you know I went to Dallas last week to attend the nut growers association, and it is with the hope of increasing the interest in the pecan industry in our county, that I attempt to tell you some of the things I saw and heard while there.

This is a national organization and there were representatives there from Washington, D. C., to California. They were intelligent, enthusiastic and decidedly more sanguine with reference to the final success of the industry than I expected.

At Dallas the pecan was given the right of way and almost the entire time given to it. There were a number of papers read and speeches delivered, all of which were studied and to the point and favorably received. There were illustrations of budding, grafting and transplanting given, which showed that there was no more difficulty in improving the pecan than anything else. There were specimens both of those that grew naturally and the improved from almost everywhere, and I believe that Mr. Grant, who went with me up there, will join me in testifying, that very few, if any, of those naturally grown were ahead of ours. Besides this there was a display of preserves, jellies, sweet pickles and candies showing how the pecan could be used for this purpose that was a surprise to many of us.

We came back greatly encouraged because of what we saw and heard. The chances for success in pecan culture are as good if not better here than anywhere we heard from. I know now that we have the climate and the soil that is adapted to the pecan, and I know that we have the pecan that comes as near meeting the demands of the market as any other, and I believe we ought to take a position among the leaders in this enterprise; and hence, I believe we ought to organize for a united effort in the culture and improvement of our pecan.

An illustration to show the importance of this: Yesterday evening at C. C. Yarborough's we walked over just a small plot of ground that is devoted exclusively to pecans. Now this piece of ground is not worth a cent for any other purpose, yet as it stands in pecans it is worth \$1000 and can be made worth three times that much. There are numbers of places in the county similar to this, and from which like results might be obtained, and I think that steps ought to be taken now to secure these results, and hence I hope to hear from some one with reference to the manner in which we should proceed.
