Editor Eagle:
Allow me space in your valu-
able paper for a few items from
these parts.

Everything is good, and bet-
ter, country prosperous, more
new comers, more new houses
than I ever saw. It may sound
fishy, but it is a fact, neverthe-
less, that I stood in one place and
counted 27 houses that lay in a
northern direction. All except
one has been built in the last
three years.

Three or four years ago C. A.
Dooce & Co., opened the Turner
ranch (consisting of 11,000
acres) to settlement. Now every
block is sold and houses built on
them. The prices paid for this
land ranged from \$9 to \$14 per
acre, now it is worth from \$17 to
\$22.50. You see what an invest-
ment in Runnels county soil will
yield. One man says he has
made more long, stinky green in
two years in Runnels county than
he ever made in all the rest of
his life.

A gentleman from Wingate,
says while going from that place
to Ballinger one day last week,
he counted forty-two loads of
lumber, and this is only one
direction—one road out of town.
With this taken in consideration,
the amount of development go-
ing on in other parts of the
county, some idea can be had
of the amount of building going
on in the county. Land still
goes higher, some selling as
high as \$27.50 per acre. Land
that was worth \$15 per acre one
year ago, is now worth \$20 to
\$25.00 per acre. Some are sell-
ing and going farther west, one
of our neighbors went to Mitchell
county and bought good im-
proved land at \$15 per acre. He
says there is lots of cotton out
there to pick yet. There is some
cotton to pick here yet I know
one man that has six or seven
bales to pick.

The new railroad (the Orient)
will miss this (Runnel-) county
three or four miles. Work is
progressing nicely south of
Sweetwater. Track is laid about
twenty miles. Coke county is
rejoicing over the road. A mar-
ket nearer home sounds better
than going thirty or forty miles.

I hear that J. H. Hilliard has
sold his farm and come to Run-
nels county. We welcome this
good family in our midst. More
good citizens is what we want.
Gentlemen there is plenty of
room, come along! Why delay?
We have a good county and good
people; sociable as you ever
saw—plenty of society. Sunday
school every Sunday morning
and prayer meeting at night at
Mazeland; Sunday school and
prayer at Norton every Sunday.

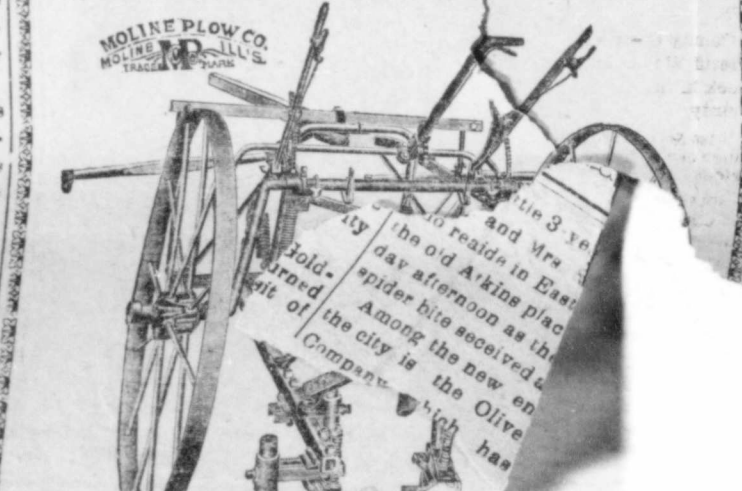
The candidates for county offices

In New England cobweb pills are
supposed to cure the ague, and in
the South a certain knuckle bone in
a pig's foot is a sure cure for rheu-
matism, if it be carried in the pocket
or worn suspended from a string
around the neck. Tracing the spider
web pill, it originated in China,
where all species of insects have
certain positive or negative values
in medicine. In Peking it is cus-
tomary to give two or three scorpions
or spiders to a patient ill of fever.
In Ireland the pea antry swal-
low spiders live to effect cures.
From these the cobweb pill of the
New England native was easy. In
Flanders the live spider is fastened
into the empty shell of a walnut,
and worn around the neck of the
patient. As the creature dies the
fever decreases until it is gone en-
tirely.

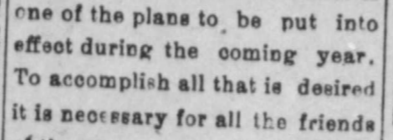
