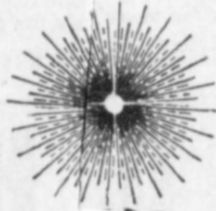

PRESS MEETING.
A LARGE ATTENDANCE AT THE MEETING HELD AT CORPUS CHRISTI.

The twenty-seventh annual meeting of the Texas Press Association was held at Corpus Christi June 6, 7 and 8 and was the most profitable association ever held. Every number of the newspaper was interesting to publishers, but the average reader would not care for a lengthy comment on the program or a discussion. It was claimed and attested that the meeting was the history of the organization and of the members of the newspaper since before.

There is no doubt that every association will agree that what was selected for a place of meeting was made, for never was there a more hospitable place than that of the little city by the sea. Corpus Christi is a lovely place under all conditions and they exert themselves to entertain their guests and make the town appear to such good advantage that the visitors can not help being in love with the place.

A great majority of those who attended the convention met in the afternoon boarded one of the elegantly equipped trains on the San Antonio and Aransas Pass railroad bound for the meeting place. At Kennedy junction another party of newspaper workers joined the crowd, which then filled five or six coaches. A Gregory a reception committee composed of ladies and gentlemen from Corpus Christi met the train and passed down the aisles greeting them with flowers. They were of the most hospitable spirit and made everybody feel welcome and happy.

Arriving at our destination we found the business houses decorated in honor of our coming and electric lights displaying the national colors were hanging in every street. Wednesday night ride much enjoyed. Thursday morning the "annual bath" attracted the attention of the editors and all agreed that Corpus Christi was the best place they had ever found for the pleasure.

Thursday at noon Col. Lupton, general passenger agent of the San Antonio and Aransas Pass, supplied a train to carry the association to the Epworth emporium grounds, where a most magnificent dinner was served. The business session of the association was held that afternoon in the immense auditorium and at 4 o'clock the train started on its return trip to the city.

That evening a reception by ladies of Corpus Christi at the Seaside hotel attracted all the visitors and many a train the people of the city, and Friday evening closed with a banquet in the Elks hall, where fully 400 covers were laid. This was the crowning social event and gave the visitors cause for pleasant memories of the pretty little city.

Saturday morning Col. Dougherty, general passenger agent of the Gulf Coast line—the St. Louis and Brownsville, placed a special train at the disposal of the Press association for an excursion to Brownsville, and many availed themselves of the opportunity to see that fine section of country, but the Eagle people were among those who were unable to accept the offer and join the excursionists, hence we can not give a description of that most interesting country, but we are sure that it could not surpass Corpus Christi either in climate, resources or character of population.

All of the Texas coast country is fine and that portion traversed by the San Antonio and Aransas Pass railroad is beautiful, fertile and productive. It is the home of diversified farming and is especially adapted to the growth of fruits and vegetables. There is very little cold weather there in any time of year and the salt sea breeze make the climate delightful year round. This was the first visit to that section and he was surprised to find it such a delightful country with so many advantages. The annual meeting of the association will be held in Galveston.

The Eagle this week received information from Congressman Slayden that the free mail route which is to serve people of Big Valley was again under consideration by the postal authorities and that the prospects for the establishment of the route were good. 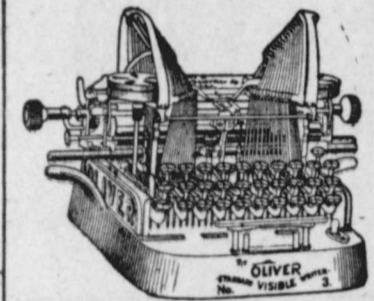
