Editor Eagle:

As I promised to write you I will now endeavor to do so.

This is a great farming country, and it is raining now. This is a corn, cotton and hay country. There will be about 600 cars of cattle shipped from here this season.

They have now about 280 in the Muskogee prison; the majority of them are for selling whisky. The Indians will have a stamp at their stamping ground on the 4th, and it is only 5 miles from my boarding place and I think I shall go to it. I have been to Messrs. Candies & Lucas' ranch, Winfield Scott's and J. S. Todd's ranches; these people you know I guess.

We will work our cattle about the middle of next week, say the 5th of July. Our cattle are doing just as fine as can; with plenty of grass, water, and a good rain today.

I am boarding part of the time at the postoffice with a mighty fine family by the name of Dyer, and the balance of the time with a family by the name of Edie. I will close for this time.

CITY ORDINANCES.

CHAPTER I.

TAXATION.

Art. 1. Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite: That an annual ad valorem tax of one-fourth of one per cent is hereby levied on the assessed value of all real and personal property within the corporate limits of the city, and not exempt from taxation by the constitution and laws of this state.

That this ordinance be in force and effect from and after its passage and publication.

CHAPTER II.

FAILING TO RENDER TAXES.

Art. 1. Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite: That if any person within the corporate limits of the city of Goldthwaite, or living outside of said limits and owning property within the limits, shall refuse or neglect to make out and render a list of his taxable property when called upon by the assessor of taxes, or his deputy, or shall fail or refuse to qualify to the truth of his statements of taxable property, or shall fail or refuse to make any oath or affirmation required by law in the rendition of taxable property, he shall be fined in any sum not less than ten nor more than fifty dollars.

Approved, July 3rd, 1906.

CHAPTER III.

CITY TAXES.

Art. 1. Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite: That it shall be the duty of the city tax assessor and collector to provide the city at once with a list of the property, interests, appraisements and oaths to correspond in form and substance as nearly as can be to those in use by the state of Texas, in the assessing and collecting of state and county taxes; and that said assessor and collector shall be held responsible for the truth of his statements of taxable property, or shall fail or refuse to make any oath or affirmation required by law in the rendition of taxable property, he shall be fined in any sum not less than ten nor more than fifty dollars.

CHAPTER IV.

TO PROHIBIT THE OBSTRUCTION OF PUBLIC SQUARES, ALLEYS AND SIDEWALKS.

Art. 1. Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite, that it shall be unlawful for any person or persons, to obstruct or place any obstruction of any kind whatsoever on or across any street, alley or sidewalk within the limits of the city, provided, nothing in this ordinance shall be construed as to prohibit any merchant or merchant from exposing or displaying his goods, wares and merchandise, excepting pointers, such obstruction shall remain not on any sidewalk, alley or sidewalk, if so arranged or exposed as not to take up more than three feet of the sidewalk extending from the wall of the building, and further to be so arranged or displayed as not to interfere with the customary and ordinary use of the street, alley or sidewalk by the public. Provided further, that all obstructions shall be removed before dark each and every day.

Art. 2. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed twenty-five dollars, and each day such obstruction shall remain not removed shall be deemed a separate offense.

The foregoing ordinance passed by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite at a meeting held July 3rd, 1906 was placed in the office of the city secretary, and by me, this the third day of July, 1906, approved.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION AUTHORIZING THE LEVY OF A TAX TO PAY JURORS.

Joint Resolution amending Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the levying of a tax of not exceeding fifteen cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, to pay jurors.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 9. The State taxes on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall be levied on the one hundred dollar valuation, and not exceeding fifteen cents on the one hundred dollar valuation, and not exceeding fifteen cents on the one hundred dollar valuation, except for the payment of debts incurred prior to the adoption of the amendment September 25th, 1885, and for the erection of public buildings, streets, sewers, water works, and other permanent improvements, not to exceed twenty-five cents on the one hundred dollar valuation, and no county, city or town shall levy more than twenty-five cents for city or county purposes, and not exceeding fifteen cents for road and bridge, and not exceeding fifteen cents to pay jurors, on the one hundred dollar valuation, except for the payment of debts incurred prior to the adoption of the amendment September 25th, 1885, and for the erection of public buildings, streets, sewers, water works, and other permanent improvements, not to exceed twenty-five cents on the one hundred dollar valuation, and no county, city or town shall levy more than twenty-five cents for city or county purposes, and not exceeding fifteen cents for road and bridge, and not exceeding fifteen cents to pay jurors, on the one hundred dollar valuation, except for the payment of debts incurred prior to the adoption of the amendment September 25th, 1885, and for the erection of public buildings, streets, sewers, water works, and other permanent improvements, not to exceed twenty-five cents on the one hundred dollar valuation, and no county, city or town shall levy more than twenty-five cents for city or county purposes, and not exceeding fifteen cents for road and bridge, and not exceeding fifteen cents to pay jurors, on the one hundred dollar valuation, except for the payment of debts incurred prior to the adoption of the amendment September 25th, 1885, and for the erection 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the payment of debts incurred prior to the adoption of the amendment September 25th, 1885, and for the erection of public buildings, streets, sewers, water works, and other permanent improvements, not to exceed twenty-five cents on the one hundred dollar valuation, and no county, city or town shall levy more

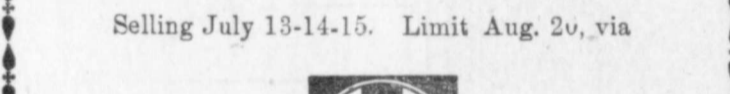

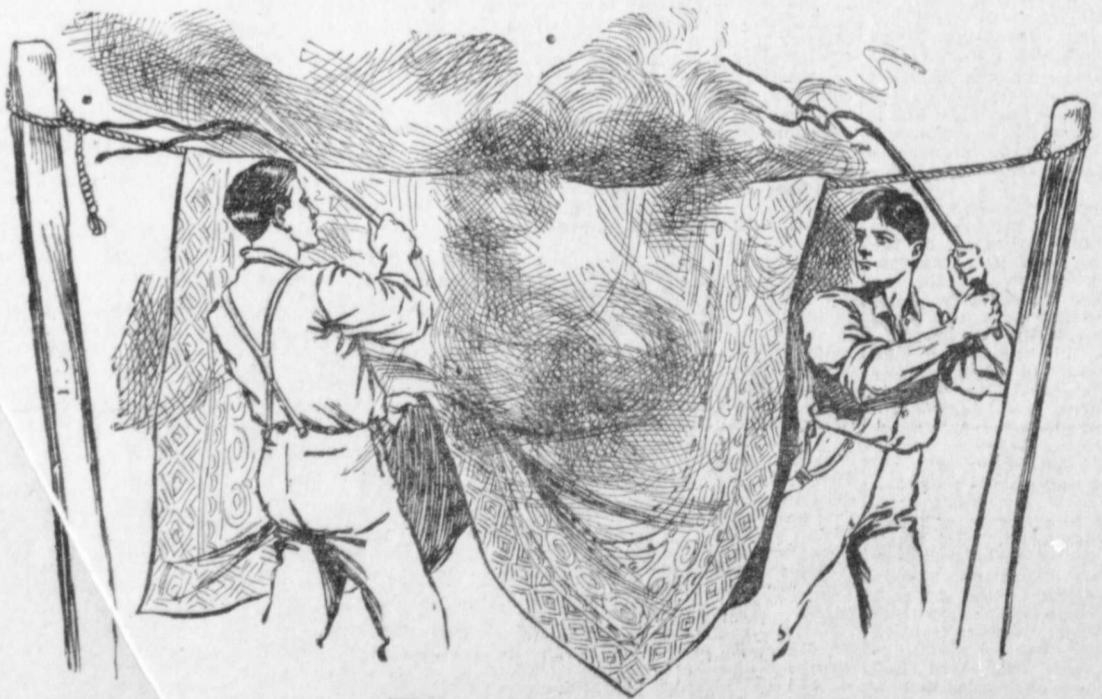

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION RELATING TO CERTAIN EXEMPTIONS FROM TAXATION

Joint resolution to amend Section 2 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to certain exemptions from taxation.
Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 2 of Article VIII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be and the same shall read as follows, to-wit:

"All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the Legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; actual places of religious worship; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools, also the endowment funds of such institutions; and all land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such bonds or mortgages; that such exemption of such land and property shall continue for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property above mentioned shall be null and void."

Section 2. The Governor of the State shall and he is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the next general election for State and county officers.

Section 3. The qualified electors for members of the Legislature of the State of Texas shall vote upon this amendment on the day of such election all persons favoring said amendment shall have written or printed on the ballot as follows: "For amendment to section 2, Article 8 of the Constitution exempting from taxation endowment funds used exclusively for school purposes." And those opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on the ballot as follows: "Against amendment to section 2, Article 8 of the Constitution exempting from taxation endowment funds used exclusively for school purposes."

Section 4. The sum of \$5000 or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication, proclamation and election.

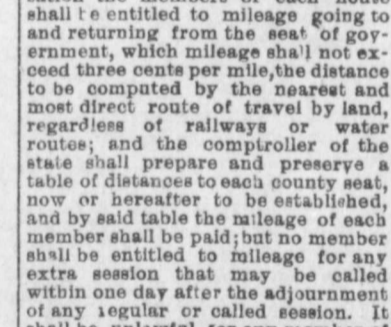
PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION FIXING SALARIES AND PER DIEM OF LEGISLATORS

House Joint Resolution authorizing the submission to a vote of the people of the State of Texas of a proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, fixing the salaries and mileage of members of the Legislature, and preventing the acceptance, for themselves or for others, by members of the Legislature of free passes, frank, rebates, privileges or advantages from certain persons and corporations.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That at the next general election of the State of Texas, or at any previous election, in case an election for the state officers shall be had, or ordered by the governor for other purposes, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Texas for their approval or disapproval, the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, as provided for in Section 1 of this resolution: "Against amendment to section 24, Article 3, of said Constitution relating to the pay of members of the Legislature, so that the said Section shall read as follows: 'Section 24. The members of the Legislature shall receive from the public treasury such compensation for their services as may from time to time be provided by law, not exceeding one thousand dollars for the year succeeding their election, payable in equal installments, on the first days of January, February, March and April of the year succeeding their election, and five dollars per day for each day of every special session held during the second year of the term for which said members shall be elected.' In addition to said compensation the members of each house shall be entitled to mileage going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed three cents per mile, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel by land, regardless of railways or water routes; and the compiler of the state shall prepare and preserve a table of distances to each county seat, now or hereafter to be established, and by said table the mileage of each member shall be paid; but no member shall be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of any regular or called session. It shall be unlawful for any member of the Legislature during his term of office to accept any transportation over any railway line or lines in this state, and any member of the Legislature violating the provisions of this Act prohibiting the acceptance of free transportation shall forfeit the office to which he has been elected. And it shall be unlawful for any of such members to accept, receive, have, use or enjoy, directly or indirectly, for themselves or any other person, any free pass, frank, rebate, privilege or advantage not accorded the general public from an railroad company, telegraph company, telephone company, sleeping car company, or other corporation, or any persons firm or corporation acting as a common carrier in this state. Any member of the Legislature violating this provision shall forfeit his office. And the necessary laws shall be enacted to carry out the provisions of this Article. [A true copy.] O. K.
