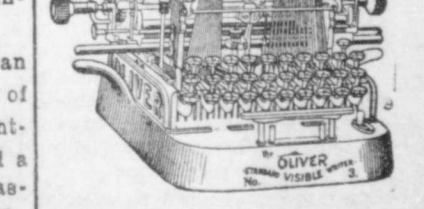

CITY ORDINANCES.
CHAPTER XII.
Article 1. Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite: That we hereby adopt chapter 3 of the criminal statutes of the state of Texas, which define offenses and prescribe penalties therefor, and provide penalties therefor. And a violation of any of the laws in said chapter mentioned, shall be punishable as is provided in such statute, and declare the same to be a part and parcel of the city ordinances of the city of Goldthwaite.
Art. 2. Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite: That we, the city council, as aforesaid do hereby adopt chapter 1, Title 17 of the criminal laws of the state of Texas defining the offenses of assault and battery and providing penalties therefor; and the same is hereby adopted as a part of the city ordinances of the city of Goldthwaite, save and except subdivision 3 of Art. 480 of said chapter.
Art. 3. Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite: That we, the city council, do hereby adopt the statute law of this state relating to gaming, hereby adopting all of the acts of the legislature of the state of Texas relating thereto now in force. And do hereby adopt and affirm the penalties (for violation of any of the acts relating to gaming) as is now in force by virtue of the statutes of the state of Texas.
Art. 4. Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite: That it shall be unlawful to fence any business lots within the city of Goldthwaite with barb wire or any other wire or any kind of material that will be calculated to damage a person or team, and that the owner or controller of all such lots now fenced with such wire or material shall have such fences removed by Sept. 15, 1906. Any person or persons violating this ordinance shall be fined any sum not to exceed \$10, and each day said fence shall remain after Sept. 15, 1906, shall constitute a separate offense.
Art. 5. Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite: That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to erect any wooden buildings within the following city limits: From corner of Second and Front street to corner Front and Sixth street; then to corner of Sixth and Reynolds, corner of Reynolds and Second, then back to place of beginning unless such persons desiring to erect a wooden building shall secure a permit from the city council. Any person or persons violating this ordinance shall be fined any sum not exceeding \$100. Each and every such building remains shall constitute a separate offense.
Filed in the office of the city secretary and approved by me the 20th day of August, 1906.

CITY ORDINANCES.

CHAPTER XII.

Article 1. Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite: That we hereby adopt chapter 3 of the criminal statutes of the state of Texas, which define offenses and punishment therefor, and provide penalties therefor. And a violation of any of the laws in said chapter mentioned, shall be punishable as is provided in such statute, and declare the same to be a part and parcel of the city ordinances of the city of Goldthwaite.

Art. 2. Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite: That we, the city council, as aforesaid, hereby adopt chapter 1, Title 15 of the criminal laws of the state of Texas defining the offenses of assault and battery and providing penalties therefor; and the same is hereby adopted as a part of the city ordinances of the city of Goldthwaite.

Art. 3. Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite: That we, the city council, do hereby adopt the statute law of this state relating to gaming, hereby adopting all of the acts of the legislature of the state of Texas relating thereto now in force. And do hereby adopt and affix the penalties (for violation of any of the acts relating to gaming) as is now in force by virtue of the statutes of the state of Texas.

Art. 4. Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite: That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to erect any wooden buildings within the following city limits: From corner of Second and Sixth street to corner of Front and Sixth street; then to corner of Sixth and Reynolds, corner of Reynolds and Scott, then back to place of beginning unless such persons desiring to erect a wooden building shall secure a permit from the city council not exceeding \$100. Each and every such building erected shall constitute a separate offense.
