### BENEATH THE WHEELS.

BOY BADLY INJURED BY JUMPING FROM MOVING TRAIN.

Newt, Kennerly, the 14-year-old son of Mrs. D. S. Kennerly, lost his right arm and a part of his left hand and had his knees injured by falling beneath a moving train near the railroad water tank Monday night.

The boy, in company with one or more companions, boarded the passenger train going toward Temple Monday night, expecting to ride to the water tank and walk back. It is customary for trains to stop at the tank for water, but on this night no stop was made and the boy attempted to alight while the train was under full speed. Just how he happened to fall so as to get both hands beneath the wheels is not known, but M. C. Humphries, jr., found him prone beside the track a few moments after the accident and picking him up assisted him to reach Dr. Brown's drug store, where his injuries were given attention. His right arm was so badly mangled that it had to be amputated between the shoulder and elbow and the first and second fingers on his left hand were taken off and the third finger on the same hand is injured and may have to be amputated, although the physicians think it can be saved, but it will be stiff, very likely. His condition is still critical, but strong hopes of his recovery are entertained. One sad feature about it is that the little fellow does not know of the loss of his right arm and complains frequently of the pain in his right hand.
