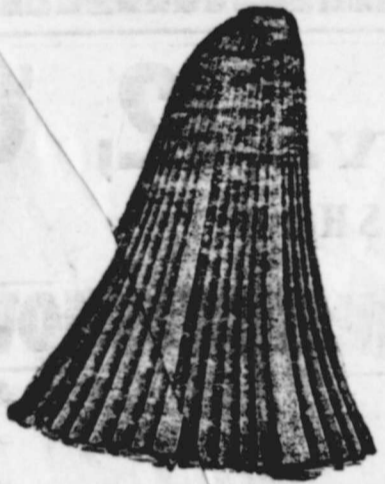

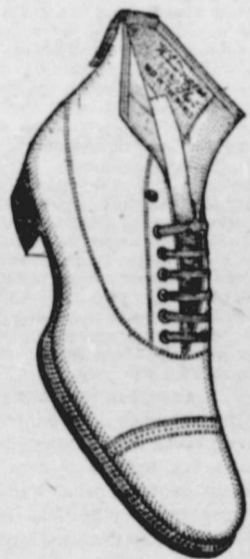

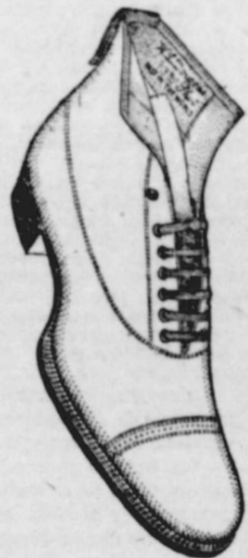

CONFEDERATE MEETING.

Jeff Davis camp met in regular session last Saturday afternoon in the town of Indian Gap. Capt. J. D. Sexton, commander, called the meeting to order and Capt. W. R. Cox was called to the aid of the joint problem. Resolutions were passed and the time for the presentation of the resolutions was postponed and the time for the fourth Sunday services was changed to this in the afternoon. For forty-five years her name has been hallowed and revered by the shattered remnant of the noblest army that ever met in a field camped upon a wooded field. Her death brings to our minds the solemn fact that ere long the noble women, who so uncomplainingly shared with us the sufferings and privations of the civil war, will soon have passed over the river to meet with Davis, Lee and Jackson and all the other veterans who have gone before. As long as an old veteran lives to sound the tocsin of true conviction, the grand type of womanhood of which Mrs. Davis' life has been a shining emblem, will be honored and revered by the soldiers of the cause we loved so well and for which so much heroic blood was sacrificed. We honor her not only for her splendid qualities, but also because she was the widow of our great chief, whose life and comradeship were so closely linked with us during four years of heroic struggle in behalf of a people who believed to be just and pure. Let all the old veterans emulate the purity of her life and example, so that we can greet her in a world where there is no strife nor war.

Our deeds as Confederate soldiers have passed into history, and we feel no regret for our past acts as such, but are proud of what we achieved as we receive the highest commendations from the civilized world.

We believe in the greatest amount of liberty consistent with law and order; we also believe a family law is better than no law at all, as we had a few such laws immediately after we laid down our arms in '65 and '68.

We perform our duty as we always have with open doors, law and order; we are no conspirator or anarchist. We have and will sustain our officers in the discharge of their official duties and we commend them in the highest for their official conduct as well as their private acts. And we are proud to know many of them were veterans and sons of veterans. We also will sustain our corporate officers, as we believe they are doing a good work and we hope they will be sustained by the community. We also will sustain our out-going officers one and all with the hope that our in-coming ones will make us as good ones.

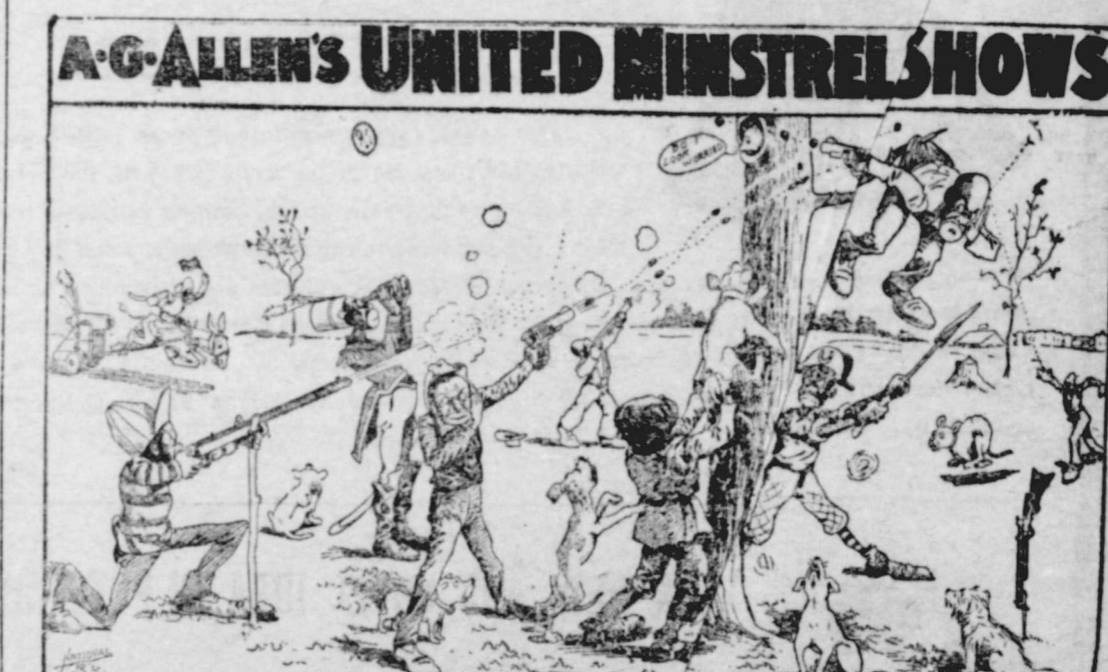

Editor Eagle:

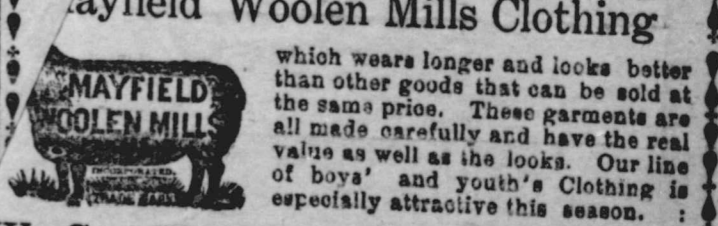
