A CLOSE CALL.

Sheriff Atkinson had a narrow escape from being killed by a train at the depot last Saturday night and as a result of the accident he has been pretty badly crippled since. He had a man in charge and was en route to the depot to allow the man to have a railroad ticket redeemed. Just as they reached the railroad track the passenger train from the west was dawning up to the depot and Mr. Atkinson suggested that they wait until the train passed, but the man paid no heed to him and rushed across just in front of the engine. Mr. Atkinson did not want to allow the train to get between him and his man, so he dashed in front of the oncoming train and stepping on a part of a rotten apple he fell upon the track. He crawled off just in time for the train to miss him, but had he remained upon the track a moment longer there would have been a much sadder story than this to tell.

COTTON FIRE.

Last Sunday afternoon Mr. L. R. Conro discovered two bales of cotton on fire in the public yard here and by hard work he moved the bales apart from the other cotton and extinguished the fire. The bales were laying side by side and the fire was undoubtedly communicated from one to the other and would have spread rapidly in a few moments, but for Mr. Conro's timely discovery. The theory of the origin of the fire is that fire was in the middle of one bale when it was brought in Saturday afternoon and did not work its way out for about twenty-four hours. The cotton was laying in such a way as to be sheltered from the wind, which is one reason for the fire not gaining any further headway.

PETITION CIRCULATED.

The petition asking the county judge to order an election to decide whether or not the city incorporation of the city of Goldthwaite shall be abolished has been circulated this week and up to 11 o'clock yesterday there were 17 names on it. Rev. G. W. Gartman had it in charge and stated to the EAGLE editor that he had found that a great many people were not ready for an election on the question, as they wanted to see the results of the incorporation after it had been in effect some time. The law requires that 25 tax payers must sign the petition before the county judge is authorized to act.

A majority of the tax payers would have to vote against the incorporation before it could be abolished, and there is hardly a likelihood that a considerable number of citizens would favor abolishing the incorporation just as it has been thoroughly organized and placed in position to carry out plans designed for the betterment of the town. The council has conducted the city's business on the most economical lines possible and has not even allowed the aldermen pay for their services. Some of the heaviest tax payers and best business men are members of the council and their efforts in behalf of the city entitled them to the gratitude of every citizen of the town.
