### CITY ORDINANCE.

Chapter VII.

Art. 2. Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite: That Article 2 of Chapter VII, shall be so amended as to read as follows: It shall be unlawful for any person to discharge any roman-candle, sky-rocket, cannon cracker, or other fire works of any kind within the following limits: Beginning at First street where it crosses Kelly street, thence south with Kelly street to 7th street, thence west with 7th street to Lee street, thence north with Lee street to 1st street, thence east with 1st street to the place of the beginning. Any person or persons violating the provisions of this Article upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$25.00, and each time the said person or persons discharge roman-candles, sky rockets, cannon crackers, or other fire works of any kind within said limits, he or they shall be deemed guilty of an offence. The foregoing ordinance passed by the city council of the city of Goldthwaite, at a meeting held on the 13th day of December, 1906, was placed in the office of city secretary, and on this 14th day of December, 1906, by me approved.

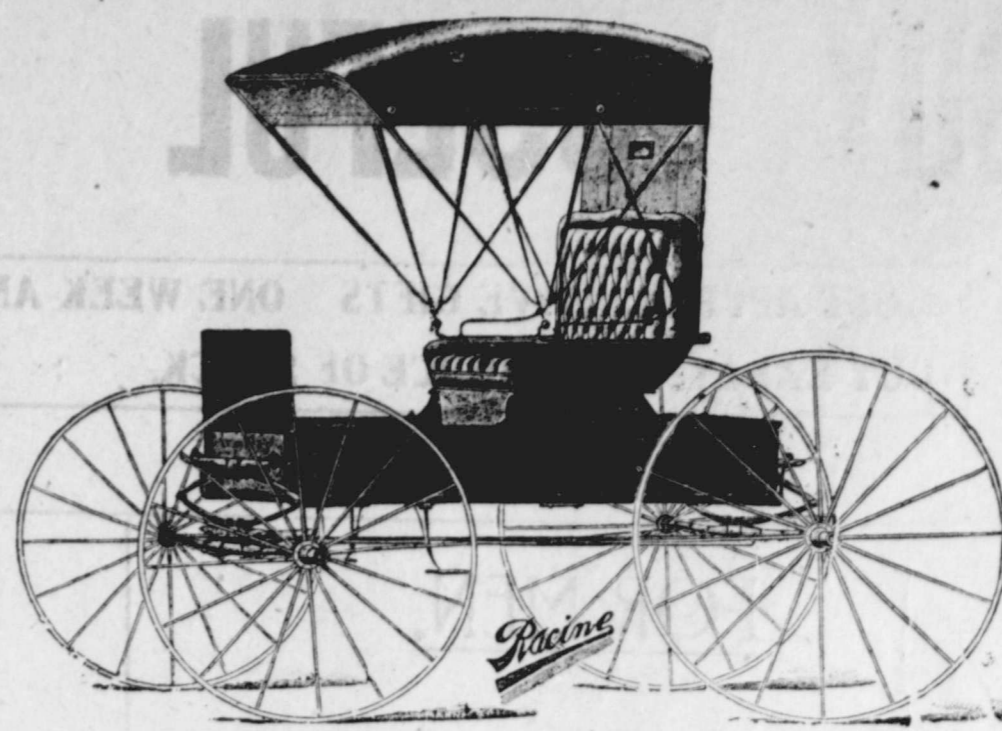
