CHANGE IN BOX RENTS.

Beginning Jan. 1st the following rates for postoffice delivery boxes will be effective:

Small call boxes, formerly 25c per quarter, are reduced to 20c per quarter. Small lock boxes, formerly 50c per quarter, reduced to 35c per quarter. Large lock boxes, formerly 60c per quarter, reduced to 45c per quarter. Lock drawers, formerly 75c per quarter, reduced to 60c per quarter.

By order of postmaster general all box rents must be paid before the 1st day of the quarter, and where rents are not paid before the first day of the quarter boxes are ordered closed. The office will begin the collection of rents for the quarter beginning Jan. 1, 1907, ten days before the expiration of the present quarter or on Dec. 21, 1906. Box renters will govern themselves accordingly. An additional supply of lock boxes and drawers have been ordered and it is hoped they will reach here in time to be installed by Jan. 1, 1907.

Patrons of rural free delivery routes should use care to instruct all their correspondents to address their mail to the proper route number. The route running north of town to the Browns creek neighborhood is route No. 1, that running south-west to Big Valley neighborhood is route No. 2. Patrons on route No. 2 will be required to number their boxes within the next few days.

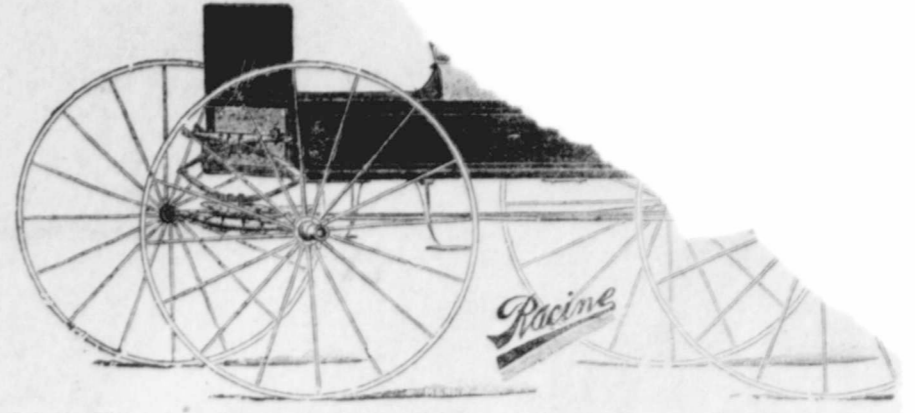
