OIL MILL ASSURED.

A MUCH NEEDED ENTERPRISE—LOCAL MEN INTERESTED.

It is now a certainty that Goldthwaite is to have an oil mill as soon as it can be built. The charter has already been issued and the company will be organized at once and work will begin.

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Mr. Benoni stated to the reporter that his company would invest as much as \$50,000 in the enterprise and would pay out fully that much each year for cotton seed at this place. The people here will be allowed to take some stock in the business and the president and three of the seven directors of the company will be residents of this county. Messrs. A. J. Gallin, Will H. Trent, Eli Fairman, J. B. Ferguson and other capitalists of this county will have stock in the company and will be its officers.

The location for the mill has not yet been selected, but it will be made known in a few days.

COUNTY DEPOSITORIES.

Notice is hereby given that, in accordance with the laws passed by the 29th Legislature, providing for and regulating "County Depositories", the Commissioners of Mills county, Texas, will, at the next regular term of the commissioners court to be begun and holden, in the town of Goldthwaite, at the court house thereof, on the second Monday in February, 1907, the same being the 11th day of said month, receive proposals from any banking corporation, association or individual banker in said county who may desire to be selected as the depository of the funds of said county. All bids shall be delivered to the county judge of Mills county on or before the first day of the February, 1907, term of the commissioners court. Said bids shall be sealed and shall state the rate of interest that said bidder offers to pay on the funds of said county for the term between the date of such bid and the February term, 1908, of said commissioners court, and said bids shall also be sealed and shall be accompanied by a certified check for not less than one-half of one cent of the county revenue for 1904, and shall otherwise comply with the laws regularly passed by the depositories.

The commissioners court will publicly open all bids at 10 o'clock a. m. on the first day of regular term of said court in February, 1907, and reserves the right to reject any and all bids.
