They, like many other good citizens of Texas, wanted the charges against Mr. Bailey investigated before he was returned to the Senate of the United States as a representative of this great state.

Coming down a hill the rope on his brake broke and he fell off and the wheels struck him and bruised his hips and shoulders. He was brought home and will likely be all right in a few days.—San Saba News.

Senator Bailey was re-elected by the legislature Tuesday, notwithstanding charges had been filed against him with the investigating committee of the legislature and no investigation had been made. It is claimed by the members of the legislature who were favorable to the election of Mr. Bailey that the investigation will be made in a thorough manner.

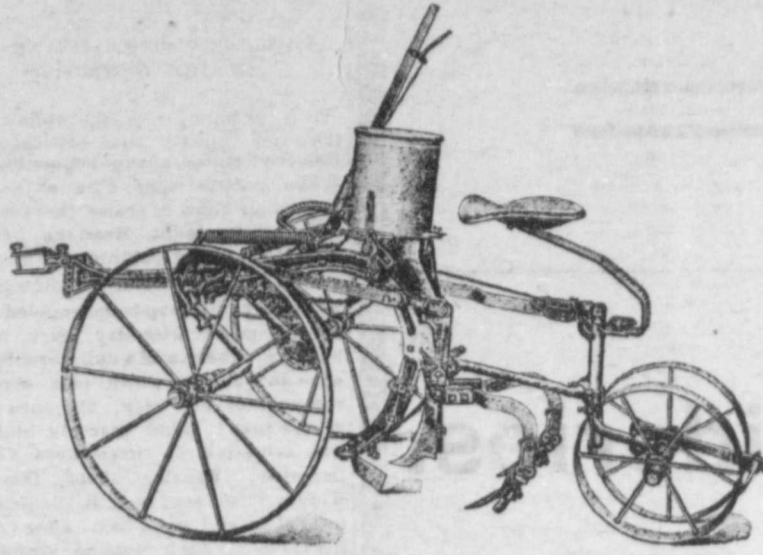

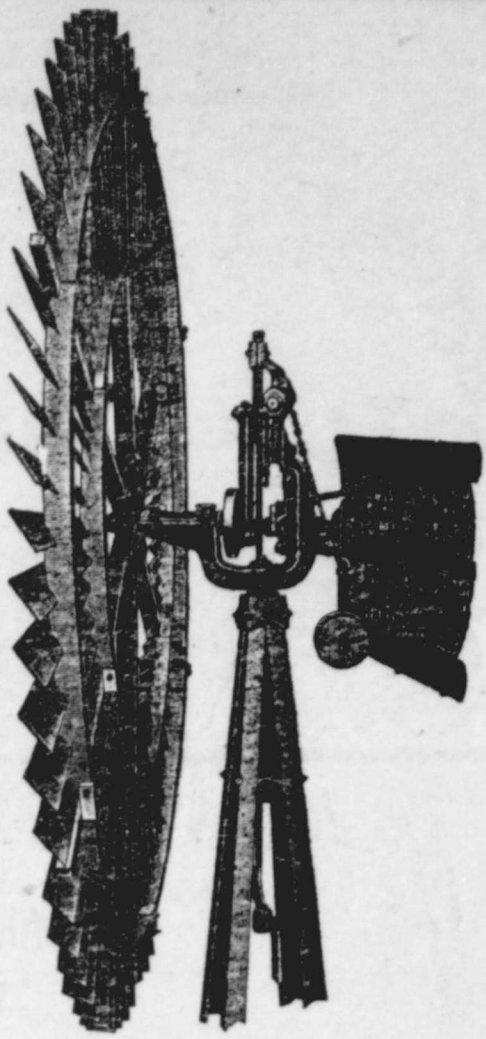

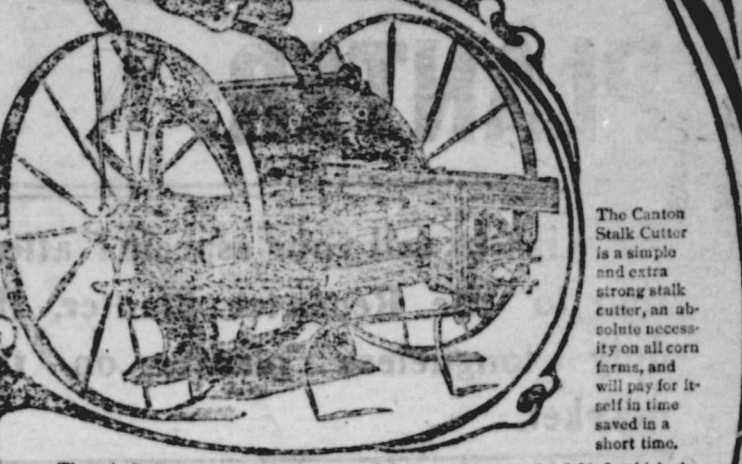
