BROWNWOOD.

The marriage of Miss Luvenia

Groesbeck, Limestone county,
died Saturday night.

O. W. Holman of Luling,

deal which was closed last night
whereby he becomes owner and
manager of the Crown hotel after
July 15.

The city attorney has been in-
structed to begin condemnation
proceedings against the Chas.
Bean property on Brown street
near the Howard Payne college.
The street is to be opened
through to the college.

Several weeks ago the city
council instructed E. B. Henley
& Co. to offer Mrs. M. A. Martin
\$550 for an acre of ground on
Martin hill for the purpose of
erecting the standpipe there.

The city council has formally
donated the 53 acres of land

the Frisco railroad extending to
Cox Island, to the city as a park
provided the citizens will estab-

A premature explosion of powder on board the United States battleship Georgia, while the marines were engaged in target practice in Cape Cod bay, resulted in the death of about twenty men, while several others were badly hurt.

The trial of a test case under the new law requiring dealers in Uno and kindred drinks to pay a license of \$4 000 in prohibition districts was tried in Houston this week and the judge took the matter under advisement and had not rendered his opinion up to the time the Eagle was put to press.

The anti-trust law as enacted by the last legislature will work a great hardship on the people of Texas if it is strictly enforced, for it imposes severe penalties upon those who sell or in any way aid in disposing of trust made goods. Pressure is to be brought on the governor to induce him to call a special session of the legislature to amend the law.

Dr. G. W. Hutchinson of Ebony, while hitching up a team of horses at his home yesterday morning stepped back from the movements of an obstreperous horse, and fell over the buggy tongue, landing in such a manner as to break his collar bone. After having the wound given the proper attention the doctor came on to town yesterday, and told a News reporter that by being careful in driving no ill effects resulted from the trip.—Brownwood News.

Study the Amendments.

It is the duty of every voter to cast his ballot for or against the constitutional amendments to be submitted in a special election in this state on August 6. These amendments were all published in the Eagle a few weeks ago and any subscriber who wishes to refresh his memory about any of them can secure a copy of the paper containing the full list of amendments.

There is one relative to the establishment of a home for wives and widows of Confederate veterans and women who gave aid to the Confederacy. Of course this amendment will be adopted, and no argument is necessary on that point.

An amendment provides for the creation of a department of agriculture and a bureau of labor. The creation of this new department is unnecessary, as far as the Eagle can understand.

There is an amendment relative to the increase of the compensation of members of the legislature. There is very little if anything in favor of this section and it is pretty likely to be defeated.

An amendment allowing the creation of improvement districts. This seems to be all right, as the people forming such district will vote on the question and this amendment only allows them to decide for themselves.

An amendment provides for the establishment of a state printing plant. This system was tried by the state of Texas a few years ago and proved very unsatisfactory. There is no reason why the state's printing could be done better or cheaper in this way than under competitive bids. If the trust controls the bids it appears to be a very easy matter to discover the fact and prosecute the bidders under the anti-trust law of the state.

An amendment allows an increase of tax to be voted for the improvements of public roads. This is certainly a good provision and should receive the endorsement of the people of the state.

This is only a short synopsis of the proposed amendments and shows the subjects to be covered by them. Every voter should inform himself on the subject so he can vote intelligently and according to the way he thinks best.

The Wells-Fargo Express company is arranging to test the Texas anti-pass law by beginning action against the railroads to force the issuance of passes to the agents and employes of the express company.

The prisoners who broke jail in Brownwood last week were recaptured.

The Baptist brethren have closed their option on the Hancock park property, and now have a deed to the same, the transfer having been made Saturday afternoon. The terms of the trade are well known, having been made on a basis of \$5,000 cash, and \$5,000 per year for three years, the total cost to the church being \$20,000. In the purchase of the property, they have some privileges of selling the part which they do not care to keep, and they propose to do this and it is understood that the part of the property lying on the side of the creek next to the city, is now on the market. Plans are laid already for improvements on the grounds which the Baptist expect to retain, among which are a large auditorium, some pavilions, improvements to be made on the bath houses, a clearing of the grounds, securing of an extension of the water main across the creek and many other things in the way of making the grounds more beautiful and attractive.—Lampasas Leader.

The jail at Whiting is an old box building that is seldom used. On July 4th, however, a young man imbibed too freely of some tonic that not only toned him up but made him unduly fractious, and the city marshal was compelled to gather him in and place him in this little-used jail. Just after they had left him the most horrible cries of pain and shouts for help were heard issuing from the wooden box, but it was supposed that these were only the ravings of a drunken man who desired to attract attention. Some time later it was discovered that a nest of hornets had been disturbed by the prisoner's entrance and immediately commenced to punish him for disturbance of their peace as well as for drunkenness. The treatment sobered him and the police justice deemed further penance unnecessary.—Holton (Kan.) Record.

A young lawyer, whose cases were few, was asked to defend a poverty stricken tramp accused of stealing a watch. The lawyer pleaded with all the ardor at his command, drawing so pathetic a picture with such convincing argument the court was in tears, and even the tramp wept. The jury deliberated but a few minutes, and returned the verdict "not guilty." Then the tramp drew himself up, tears streaming down his face as he said: "Sir, I have never heard so grand a plea. I have not cried before since I was a child. I have no money with which to reward you but" (drawing a package from the depths of his pocket) "here's a rat watch; take it and welcome.—Ex.

One day last week while the organ at the Methodist church was being cleaned out a mouse snake was found on the inside, which perhaps, from the view of the situation, had been using the organ for a hiding place for some time.—Zephyr Mirror.

A premature explosion of powder on board the United States battleship Georgia, while the marines were engaged in target practice in Cape Cod bay, resulted in the death of about twenty men, while several others were badly hurt.

Editor Eagle: As I promised my last, I will tell what I can of crop conditions, as I saw them on the way. From Goldthwaite crops were very much same for about fifty miles, with the exception of a few corn fields that were fired up considerably. From 50 or 60 miles on, crops were very spotted. Some had good crops, while others were very poor, and the class was largely in the proportion.

Remember that conditions were those prevailing in 1930. Some fields of cotton not chopped out and some with not to exceed one-tenth stand, with many poor crops. In some places I saw with the husk getting dry, in another section corn green to the bottom.

For passing Temple, starting corn was not much advanced.

Cotton in places here much further advanced than in the Nolanville section.

In the Nolanville section few good oat crops, but the small grain was almost all in.

The Cotton School is getting on nicely. We have 112 pupils. Some few and others are going to the latter part of this week.

In the school took vacation.

Some of the pupils went to Arthur, some to a big establishment, given by this (Harriet) veterans and women, some took in the aid to the aged here in Houston, but quite a number of us took a \$1.00 excursion to Galveston. To me the sights I saw were worth many times the cost of the trip. 'Twas the first time I ever saw a large body of water, much less ride over water for three miles on the train, (crossing the bay.)

The wharves, piers, grain elevators and boats, both fishing and pleasure, were among the first sights that called for our inspection. We took a trip out to the mouth of the bay on an excursion steamer. (7 miles and back, 50 cents.)

We partly inspected an ocean steamer, but words but feebly express the beauty of some of the upper-deck rooms.

We took a trolley car for the beach and on our way saw the dredge boat pumping sand into the city. They go out into the channel and load up with sand, come back to the city and pump it out into the streets to raise the level of the town. It looks like a monster undertaking but they have done a great deal along that line already.

Well, after quite a ride over the ground where once large buildings stood, but now only sandy, barren lots, we arrive at the beach where we got to see the great Galveston sea wall. Of course a surf bath was part of our program, and there were hundreds of others who had the same on their program.

Well, I must not take up too much space this time. In my next I will tell something of Houston.
