This new method of selecting  
jurors entails considerable work  
upon the tax collector of the  
county, the county and district  
clerks and the sheriff, who, as  
provided by the new law, must  
select the names of all qualified  
jurors in the county, cutting out  
all the exemptions and place the  
names in a wheel, from which  
they will be drawn at each term  
of court. The lists are made up  
in August and are supposed to  
last for two years. All jurors  
and all special venirees are drawn  
from this wheel and when a juror  
has served for four years his  
name is taken out of the wheel  
and he will not be called upon  
again for jury service for two  
years.—Waco Tribune.

#### War on Catalogue Houses,

War has been declared on the great catalogue houses of Chicago and other cities by the 500,000 retail merchants of the West. In one of the most striking economic movements this country ever has known the small dealers are fighting, as they say, for their lives.

The mammoth institutions, employing thousands of workers, doing their business entirely through the medium of their bulky catalogues, spending no money in the community whence they derive their annual millions of dollars of patronage, are forcing increasing numbers of home merchants to the wall and so their opponents claim, are "making commercial graveyards of once prosperous towns."

An organized attack on the catalogue institutions is to be made by the Home Trade League of America, which has existed for several months in Chicago, largely as a publicity bureau, but which is shortly to incorporate and institute a more systematic and aggressive campaign against the catalogue houses through a board of twenty-one managers, with a vice president and an advisory committee of ten members from each state.

The backbone of the league is formed of commercial associations—national, state and local in character—in Illinois, Wisconsin, Iowa, Michigan, Kansas and Minnesota. The officers of associations in scores of cities are in constant correspondence with the league, which will continue to have its national headquarters in this city. Officers of the league will be selected from the most aggressive of the leaders of these associations of business men. Alfred C. Clark is manager of the league.—Chicago Special.

It is estimated that the number of saloons in San Antonio that will apply for license under the new law will reach 350.

A freight train of 21 cars on the International and Great Northern road was wrecked near Austin Sunday and one man was killed.

The sixth court of civil appeals has been organized at Texarkana with Sam P. Wilson of Cherokee county chief justice, R. B. Levy of Gregg county and W. F. Hodges of Lamar county associate judges.

For the first time in the history of Laredo, which was founded in 1757, not a drink of any kind of spirituous liquor could be bought in the city last Sunday, as every saloon in the city closed up hard and fast at 12 o'clock Saturday night and in obedience to the new saloon law, remained closed until midnight Sunday night.

A woman fell in a well in Williamson county Sunday and was drowned. While going home from church she and her husband stopped at a neighbor's to get a drink. The husband held the horse while she went to the well. Hearing the chain rattle and not seeing her, the husband hurried over to the well and saw her frantically fighting the water. No rope of sufficient strength being on the place they had to send to a neighbor for one before help could be given. The woman was drowned before suocor arrived.

Attorney Davidson says the new anti-trust law does not interfere with merchants selling goods that are manufactured or controlled by a trust. He says: "There is not in this entire act one single section, paragraph, clause, line or word which treats in any manner whatsoever, or which directly or indirectly relates to or in anywise affects the purchase or sale by anyone upon his own account, and not under an exclusive contract, of goods which have been manufactured, handled or sold by a trust, or a monopoly, or by those engaged in a conspiracy in restraint of trade."

This world would be a deal happier were we to be kind to each other while we live as we are after death closes the portals to us forever. If you will allow me space in your columns I will endeavor to give my people and friends a little history of our trip from the Lone Star State to grand and proud old South Carolina.

Wife and I had quite a nice trip, though of course, a little worrisome. There has been wonderful improvements all along the lines in the last several years, especially so in the agricultural business. Well, I feel very much at home where I can see the tall pines and the thrifty old white oak trees, whose boughs are drooping with acorns and the blue jays are singing and make merry all about us, and the negroes are as numerous as the English sparrows are in our beautiful court house square in good old Mills county. And to "cap the climax" watermelons are here by the thousands.

We found the crops all along our route somewhat late, but exceedingly good except the fruit crop which is very poor. The cotton crop in this county is good though late; everything seems to be in a flourishing condition. Lands are as high as a "oat's back," mules and horses are out of all reason; corn is 90c per bushel; labor is 40 to 60c per day; good field hands get 60c and board themselves. I have not been able to learn what wages cotton factory hands get, but pretty fair. Such hands or laborers are scarce. There are lots of cotton mills in this county. For instance, Greenville, which is about 70 miles from this point, has seventeen cotton mills.

I have been thinking of going over to Jamestown, but have not as yet decided whether to go or not. We will go from here to Georgia, and will remain for a short time and then we want to stop over at Pass Christiann, Miss., for a short while, and then from there we will go home.

We are now having lots of rain. Respectfully,

E. H. K. Green and a number of Dallas capitalists have organized a company to prospect for oil at Cash, eight miles south of Greenville.

Quite a number of the legislators who enacted the anti-pass law that is now in force have resigned, because of the measure being more far-reaching than they expected and their railroad passes being revoked.

A co-operative bank and trust company to be strictly a union labor concern, is to be established in Oklahoma City. It is to be capitalized at \$500,000 and the stock sold exclusively to members of labor unions and farmers' unions.

The famous Baimilia mine, near Parral, Mexico, from which Pedro Alvarado, the multimillionaire mine owner, who begged to be allowed to pay the national debt of Mexico, has taken \$150,000,000 worth of ore, and for which he has been offered \$5,000,000, has been leased for fifteen years to Eugene Davis of Washington, D. C., and associates.

The annual report of the civil service commission for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1907, which has just been issued, shows that President Roosevelt, from December 23, 1900, to January 30, 1907, made sixty-two exceptions to the civil service laws, and permitted that many persons to enter the classified service regardless of the law and regulations, says a Washington special.

The amendment to increase the pay of the legislators and the one to establish a state printing office don't stand any more showing than a one-legged man at a kicking match. The people don't propose to allow that set to receive a larger amount of the state's money than they now get. One thing the people would be glad of an opportunity to do, is to reduce the representation. And as to the printing office amendment, we've had one, and it was a graft.—Cisco Round-Up.

A majority of the railroad commission has approved the interchangeable books used by traveling men and others on the railroads of Texas. It is the form followed by the railroads in giving low rates to those traveling a great deal. Each year the payment of \$1 gets the book and the necessary credential to secure coupons whereby the holder is returned 1/2c a mile after every 1,000 miles traveled. One of the railroad commissioners has invested in one of these books and will secure the benefits of the 1/2c reduction.

A letter has been received at the headquarters of the board of foreign missions of the Presbyterian church in New York from one of the medical missionaries of the board now in China describing conditions around Canton. According to the writer of the letter, only a leader is necessary for widespread rebellion in that part of China. He says that certainly before twelve months have passed a decided change in the government may be expected, and whether it will be accomplished by force of arms or not is yet to be determined.

AMENDMENTS ARE IMPORTANT.

Require Careful Thought by Voters Election near at Hand.

The election to give the citizens an opportunity to vote on the proposed constitutional amendments is to be held August 6. It is necessary that every voter should consider the amendments carefully, for some of them are of vital importance to this state. A superficial knowledge of the subject embraced in the amendments will very likely lead the voter into error. Everyone should read the amendments carefully and then decide for himself. Of course, most people have a general idea of the subjects, but some are very far wrong in their conception of the amendments. At least one man has the idea that an amendment is submitted providing for the increase in the salary of the governor, when as a fact no such proposition is included in any of them.

Following is a synopsis of the amendments with the form of the ballot to be used in the election. Those who do not favor the amendments should run a pencil mark through the section reading favorable to the amendment and allow the section that says "against" the amendment to stand. To mark out the entire ballot is equal to failure to vote, the ticket will not count if a mark is made across the entire ticket. Read it carefully and then mark it to read "for" or "against" the amendment.

Those who do not thoroughly understand the amendments in this synopsis can secure the full text of all of them at this office.

After the speaking the local held a closed meeting and initiated seven new members with four others to be initiated Friday evening. The following named were elected officers for the coming year: president, J. W. McNeil, vice president, D. T. Bush; chaplain, Bro. Casey, of Mullin; conductor, Will Trowbridge, Big Valley; door-keeper, Bro. Wilson of Chesser Valley, and secretary-treasurer, Bro. Carter Mohler, Big Valley; lecturer, Bro. Goad of Bethel. Bro. Wm. Biddle of Goholston was elected as delegate to the State Union. The next County Union will be held with the Big Valley local at Smith's school house in Big Valley. In concluding this report I wish to say that I believe the sentiments of the entire Union of Mills county in extending to Bro. J. D. Ryan, our retiring president, our sincere thanks for the able and impartial manner in which he has presided over our meetings for the two years he has been president. I feel that it is no injustice to any other member of our union to say that I believe that to the zeal and untiring efforts of Bro. Ryan is due perhaps more than to any other one man the up-building, perfecting and strengthening of our organization in this county.

#### Who Are the Eight Thousand?

The second edition of "Who's Who in America" contains 1,300 pages of brief biographies, without eulogy, criticism or comment, of such persons now living in America as have become noted as factors in the progress and achievement of the age. "Endeavor has been made," say the editors, "to include all Americans of more than local note in all lines of useful effort." No name is inserted or omitted for financial consideration.

With a view to determining effect education of the various grades has had on success in life, effort was made to ascertain the school training of each of these men and women 'of more than local note,' and 7,852 on their United States list were thus educationally classified.

According to the best estimate we can make from the latest census returns, there are in the United States 40,782,067 persons over twenty-one years old. These are divided educationally about as follows:

Class 1—Without school training	4,682,498
Class 2—With only common school training	32,862,951
Class 3—With common and high school training	2,165,337
Class 4—With college or higher education added	1,071,301

Now the question is, how many of the eight thousand distinguished citizens of the United States on the Who's Who list came from each of these classes? The 4,682,498 of Class 1 furnished 31 The 32,862,951 of Class 2 furnished 808 The 2,165,337 of Class 3 furnished 1,945 The 1,071,301 of Class 4 furnished 5,768

It thus appears:

1st. That an uneducated child has one chance in 150,000 of attaining distinction as a factor in the progress of the age.

2d. That a common school education will increase his chances nearly four times.

3d. That a high school training will increase the chances of the common school boy twenty-three times, giving him eighty-seven times the chance of the uneducated.

4th. That a college education increases the chance of the high school boy nine times, giving him two hundred and nineteen times the chance of the common school boy, and more than 300 times the chance of the untrained.

It is a noteworthy fact that of 7,852 "notables" thus gathered, 4,810 proved to be full graduates of colleges.

From the nature of the case it cannot be claimed that these figures are exact, but they are based upon the most reliable government statistics and the necessary estimates have been made with care. It is also doubtless true that other circumstances contributed to the success of these college trained men, but after all reasonable allowance are made the figures still favor the conclusion that the more school training the child has, the greater his chances of distinction will be.

Mrs. L. E. Miller this week received the sad news that her nieces, Misses Bertha and Edna Wallace of Austin, had been lost in the steamship disaster off the coast of California Sunday morning. The young ladies had been attending the National Teachers convention and joined a party for an excursion to Portland, Oregon. They left San Francisco Saturday night and about 1 o'clock the vessel collided with a ship loaded with lumber that had gotten out of its course and on account of the fog was not observed until it was in 100 yards of the passenger steamer. The lumber laden craft was damaged, but did not sink. The passenger-carrying vessel sank in a few moments after being struck and something near 100 lives were lost and the Misses Wallace

were among the number. They have visited in Goldthwaite and are kindly remembered here and the account of the terrible accident in which they lost their lives was received here with sadness and great sympathy is felt for Mrs. Miller.

Fire did \$30,000 damage to the stock of Sanger & Ettleson at Waco Tuesday night.

It is stated by an official of the Department of Agriculture at Washington that it is estimated that 11 per cent of the boll weevils survived the past winter, whereas the usual percentage is 5. This, together with the late planting season, causes the belief that the weevil will do more harm this season than ever before.

Monday morning shortly after Jannies Scroggin commenced work on the shaft he is sinking at the spot where asphalt was discovered a few weeks ago, was the victim of what liked to have been a most serious accident, by a cave in. He was down in the shaft at work when the sides began to fall in upon him, one rock striking him on the head, which out a considerable gash. He was rescued in time to prevent the accident being more serious.—Zephyr Mirror

The people of the United States need not be surprised if they awake some morning to find a war between this country and Japan in full blast. Both countries declare undying friendship but the facts remain that both are preparing for war. The Japanese commenced their fight with Russia before war had been formally declared and it is not unlikely they will attempt to secure a similar advantage with this country. A British naval officer is quoted as saying: 'Operators have been instructed to load no coal for export and steamers are supplied with only sufficient to complete the return trip to Japan. It is also stated on best authority that the Gov-

ernment has been inquiring for large shipments of Australian and Welsh coal, the latter designed for coaling stations remote from Japan and probably in the vicinity of the Philippines.' The officer also states that the Japanese going to Mexico through Hawaii are all veterans of the late Russian war.

A special from New York says: 'From all parts of the country President Roosevelt has, during the last few days, received postal cards urging him to reconsider his declaration of 1904 and accept another nomination for the presidency. They are rather elaborately printed, containing a picture of the White House, under which is the inscription, 'Uncle Sam Will Renew the Lease.' Printed in Philadelphia, the cards have come from many states and indicate that some one has started a campaign to induce the President to change his mind.'

A special session of the commissioners court was held Monday to declare the result of the prohibition election held at Hico March 10, 1907, in which a majority of 20 votes was cast for prohibition. The result had never been announced, the former commissioners court declaring the election illegal and ordering a second election. The higher court held that the second election was legal, and thereupon a writ of mandamus was issued by Judge Lindsay, directing the present commissioners to meet and declare the first election, which was accordingly done.—Hamilton Herald.
