The Santa Fe is building a new hospital in Temple to cost \$100,000.

The Santa Fe is to build a modern passenger station in Temple. It is certainly needed.

Commissioner of Agriculture R. T. Milner has made a request that the secretaries of all the county fair associations report to him the date of all the county fairs throughout the state. Many requests are made of him to know the date of these fairs and he wishes to compile a record of all the dates of county fairs for general information of the public.

A press dispatch from Cleveland, Ohio, gives the following information: "Payment by the consumer of the fine of \$29,240,000 assessed against the Standard Oil Company by Judge Landis is now being planned, according to the information received today by Secretary C. D. Chamberlin of the National Petroleum Association, an organization of the independent oil refiners of the United States."

A Communication from Sweetwater to the daily press says: "A corps of Santa Fe surveyors have been camped near here for weeks engaged in surveying a line from Coleman via Sweetwater to a connection with a line previously surveyed from here northwest. This is the much-talked of "cut-off" line. This survey, crosses Sweetwater Creek three miles east of town and runs up Killdugan Creek. The nearest point from Sweetwater to main line survey is two and one-fourth miles; a spur point half a mile north of court house square and near the site on which the new Orient passenger station is to be built. The engineer in charge says this is the best and most practicable line yet surveyed, as well as the most direct."

### The Limit of Life.

The most eminent medical scientists are unanimous in the conclusion that the generally accepted limitation of that human life is many years below the attainment possible with the advanced knowledge of which the race is now possessed. ### Ordinances of Goldthwaite.

CHAPTER XXII.

An ordinance of the incorporated town of Goldthwaite, Mills county, Texas, declaring all fast driving, and all racing, and all driving at a rate of speed faster than 8 miles per hour to be unlawful, and to be a nuisance, and to be punishable by a fine and providing for a punishment thereof.

Be it ordained by the town council of the town of Goldthwaite as incorporated, that hereafter it shall be, and is herenow declared to be, unlawful for any person to drive on the streets or alleys of Goldthwaite as incorporated, or on any public place therein, either on horseback or in any vehicle at a rate of speed faster than 8 miles per hour; or to race with any other person on any of the streets or alleys of Goldthwaite or other public place where either of the persons are on horseback or in any vehicles at any rate of speed whatever; and all such fast driving, and all racing whatever, are hereby declared to be unlawful and a nuisance.

And any person violating the provisions of this ordinance or either of same, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not less than ten nor more than one hundred dollars.

And any fine imposed hereunder shall be collected by issuance and service of execution against the property of the person convicted; and such person may be imprisoned for not more than fifteen days in case such fine and all costs are not otherwise collected.

And this ordinance shall be published in the Goldthwaite Eagle, as required by law, and shall thereupon immediately be in effect as soon as allowed by law.

Passed and adopted this August 5, 1907, at a regular meeting of the town council of the town of Goldthwaite, Mills county, Texas, as incorporated; and the rule requiring ordinances to be read three several times: being unanimously suspended. And this original ordinance is ordered to be spread upon the minutes of the council, and thereupon filed in the office of the secretary, and if approved by the mayor, is to be signed by him and kept in said secretary's office as chapter XXII of the ordinance of the town of Goldthwaite, Mills county, Texas.

Which ordinance, passed as aforesaid, was filed in the office of the secretary, and by me this day examined and approved and ordered to be there kept, signed by my hand, as an ordinance of the said town, and attested by the secretary.

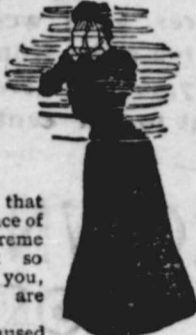

Thomas A. Edison is quoted as predicting that before long science will enable the farmer to enrich his lands by means of nitrogen from the air. He said: "Until recently the utilization of atmospheric nitrogen was regarded as merely a laboratory demonstration. Business men said it would never be obtained cheaply enough to sell to the farmer as a fertilizer. In Norway a plant has been established which is conducted with such good results that I expect to see atmospheric fertilizer on the market in this country within the next ten years. That such a product will soon be imperatively necessary there is no doubt. Every ship load of wheat and corn which goes abroad leaves the United States so much poorer; not in gold, but in nitrogen." Mr. Edison continued: "Another scientific discovery which I expect to see before I die is the direct generation of electricity from coal. This has already been achieved in an experimental way. I have heard of several men who have done it. Imagine what will be the consequences. At the present time nine-tenths of the power obtained from coal is lost by the use of boilers, wheel and dynamos. With the direct generation of the electric current, therefore, the world will have ten times more energy than now."—Texas Farmer.

#### City Council.

The city council held a regular meeting Monday night, at which time the form of government for the corporation was changed from that of a town to a city.

Alderman Boon resigned, because of the fact that he is a member of the light company and will be interested in contracting with the council for lighting the streets of the city.

An ordinance prohibiting fast driving and racing was adopted and appears in this issue.

A contract was made with the light company to furnish six 16 candle power lights for the streets at a cost of \$1 50 each per month. These lights are to be placed on each corner of the square, one near the depot and one on Fisher street between J. T. Prater's store and the Rock hotel.

W. H. Terry received a message a few days ago from one of his brothers in Stamford informing him of the serious illness of his brother at Clarksville. He wired to relatives at the latter place to know further particulars and was gratified to learn that his brother was not sick at all. The mistake came about by a queer condition: There are two men by the name of Terry living at Stamford, both with the same initials, although they are not related. They both formerly lived in Clarksville and each has a brother living at that place and a telegram conveying information about the illness of one of the Clarksville men was delivered to the wrong family in Stamford and it said: "Your brother is dangerously sick."

### Two Fires.

Last Saturday night fire destroyed a small residence on Parker street, just north of the livery stable, known as the Meador place. The house was occupied by Frank Melton and family and they only saved a small amount of furniture and clothing, the fire having gained great headway before it was discovered. The building was owned principally by J. W. Roberts, although the Meador heirs had a small interest in it. There was no insurance on the house or its contents and it was a total loss. The south wind drove the flames away from the livery barn, which was indeed fortunate, for had the barn been ignited there is no telling the amount of damage that might have resulted. The origin of the fire was supposed to have been from the kitchen stove.

### THE KIRBY PLACE.

The residence in the southern suburbs, near the cemetery, known as the Kirby place, was burned Sunday night about midnight. The residence was occupied by Talmage Palmer and family and was owned by J. C. Street. It was uninsured as well as its contents and nothing was saved from it. When the fire was first discovered by the family a partition wall was falling in and the heat and smoke prevented the work of saving the household goods in the rooms that had not yet taken fire. The origin of the fire is not known, but it is generally supposed to have been caused by rats with matches. The loss to the Palmer family as well as to Mr. Street is heavy.

Judge K. M. Landis last Saturday in the United States district court at Chicago, fined the Standard Oil company of Indiana \$29,240,000 for violations of the law against accepting rebates from railroads. The fine is the largest ever assessed against any individual or any corporation in the history of American criminal jurisprudence, and is slightly more than 131 times as great as the amount received by the company through its rebating operations.
