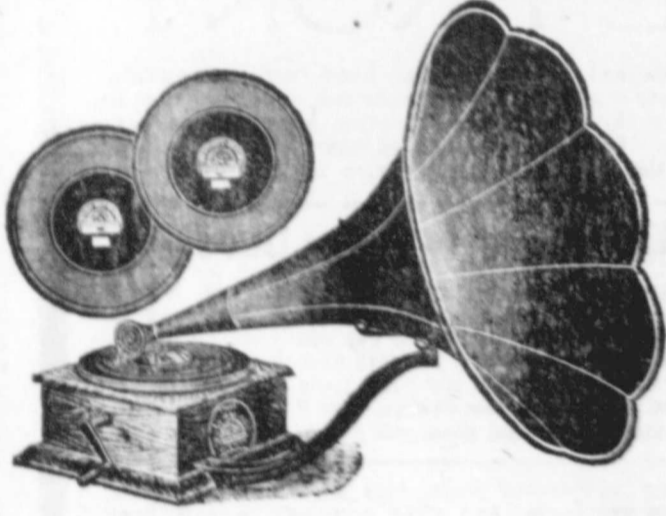
Prince Dabro of Egypt has reached New York on his way to Texas to study the cotton situation. He says cotton growing is becoming one of the most important industries of his country.

The negro was arrested at Rusk, after he had disposed of the horse and saddle for \$45. He was placed in the penitentiary to prevent the enraged citizens lynching him.

Mrs. Newhinney of Kaw City, Okla., dreamed that her son, Joseph McShields, employed in the railway service out of Tacoma, Washington, had been killed in the performance of his duty. The dream was so realistic that she wrote immediately to her son, but before the letter was mailed a telegram was received saying her son had been killed the day previous by the cars and that the body was being sent to Kaw City.

That about one-third of all the school children in the United States, or about 12,000,000 boys and girls, are behind their proper grades because of physical defects that could be remedied, is the gist of a report made by a committee of prominent educators, headed by Charles C. Buringham, former president of the Board of Education of New York. This committee has investigated conditions among school children, not only in New York, but in Boston, Chicago and other cities.

City Detective Talbot died in Fort Worth Friday. He had been connected with the police department of that city for a long time.

A Santa Fe railroad surveying party is running a line through Scurry county and it is reported that the long talked of "cut off" route is now being located.

Secretary of State Elihu Root has been taking exercise and discipline in Wm. Muldoon's institution at White Plains, N. Y., and announces that he is greatly improved in health. Muldoon was the trainer of John L. Sullivan in the old pugilist's palmist days.

Four men were arrested in Chicago the other day charged with robbery and a large amount of plunder was found in the room occupied by them. They were all dressed in female attire and it is claimed they stole the dresses.

These will be on exhibition Nov. 9-24. There will be given as prizes to the best exhibitors of goat at this fair, the sum of \$6000.

The Texas railroad commission has promulgated rules regulating the movement of freight by the railroads and providing for demurrage to be paid to the shipper. Heretofore the railroads have been allowed all the time they wanted to move freight, when a car reached its destination it had to be promptly unloaded or a demurrage charge was made. Hereafter the rule works both ways and if the freight is not handled promptly the railroads will pay demurrage.

McMillan's magazine says: It would require a volume to tell all about the many different devices adopted by smugglers for the concealment of diamonds. Five years ago a consignment of \$5000 worth passed the custom house hidden in a sugar candy animal carried by a child. The toy was of course transparent, but so also were the diamonds.
