NEIGHBORING NEWS.

Items Culled From the Leading Local Papers.

HAMILTON.

Mat Christianson returned last Saturday from a visit to his old home in Norway.

O. W. Heyroth is erecting a large warehouse just east of the Baptist church for use in storing vehicles and implements.

The council will take up the street question shortly and active steps taken to improve our thoroughfares.

C. A. Sauer, manager of the Hamilton cotton warehouse, tells us they have received and have stored 560 bales of cotton up to Tuesday night.

The big cut at the Couch hill has not been finished and a temporary track is to be laid around the hill so that cars can be run clear on to the river, where a lot of trestling is to be done.

Public Weigher D. P. Hedge reports up today he had weighed 1834 bales of cotton. There are now on the yard about 568 bales, which with the cotton in the warehouse, makes over 1100 bales of cotton on hands here. There must be several hundred bales of cotton in the country around Hamilton and it is a safe estimate to say that there are 2000 bales of cotton now being held for higher prices.

Judge J. A. Eldson returned a few days ago from Battle Creek, Mich., his health being somewhat improved. During his stay

he visited Chicago and consulted many eminent specialists. He said they agreed that his trouble was a nervous one, and that he would have to stop work and take more relaxation with moderate out-door exercise if he was to regain his health. Consequently on his return he immediately forwarded to Governor Campbell his resignation as judge of the court of civil appeals for this district.—Herald.

SAN SABA.

Buck and Clabs Sullivan left Monday for Douglas, Arizona.

R. M. Lewis of Bend has sold his pecan territory to Felix Gorman for \$500.

The F. W. Dent Telephone line from Bend to Lometa has been purchased by McCoury.

S. C. McCarley bought the confectionery and cold drink business from Mr. Long last Thursday and is now in charge of the business which he formerly conducted.

R. M. Lewis of Bend was in town Thursday doing some legal business. He has recently purchased the one-half interest in the old Dawson place from John Dawson, paying him \$2800 for it.

Neal McAnelly of Bend sold his pecan crop on the Colorado river to Lige Ratliff of Bertram and G. G. Stockton (High Pockets) of San Saba for \$1,000. Mr. McAnelly agrees to pay the purchasers 10 cents a pound for the pecans after they are gathered.

S. H. Evans, who lived on Forest Edwards' place on China, reports that he has one acre in sweet potatoes from which he will gather about 300 bushels.

Sweet potatoes can be sold here at home from \$1.00 to \$1.25 per bushel. These potatoes were irrigated from a reservoir and pipe.

J. C. (Bud) McKee sold the 1200 acre tract embracing the famous Sulphur Springs, below Bend last week to Jeff Casbeer of Nix, Lampasas county, for a consideration of \$6,000. These springs are the most noted in San Saba county and most our citizens have enjoyed a camp here at some time in the past.—Star.

The two cotton yards had weighed 3000 bales of cotton up to Thursday night. There had been shipped up to the same time 1935 bales this year, against 2355 bales the same day last year. There are 400 bales stored in the warehouse and 665 bales in the open yards.

A hurry call for a doctor was made and in 40 minutes he and Dr. Carson were with the baby. No acid had been swallowed, only a little spilled on its mouth. Nothing serious.—Chief.

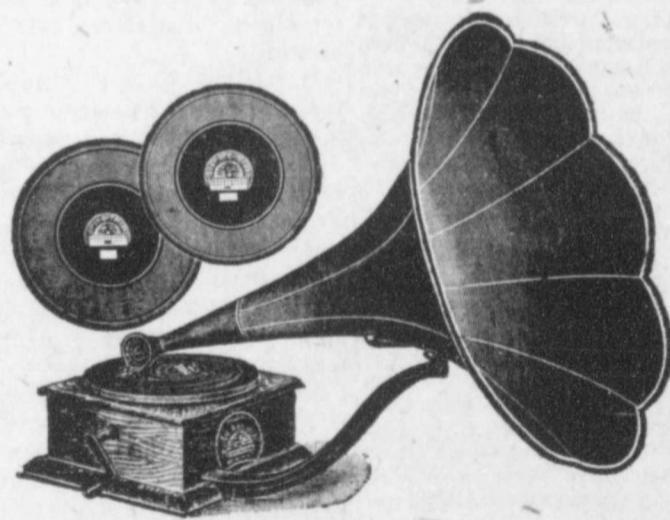

 You are hereby commanded to summon the unknown heirs of Mrs. Etta Beatler and their legal representatives by making publication of this citation once in each week for eight successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your county, if there be a newspaper published therein, but if not, then in the nearest county where a newspaper is published, to appear at the next regular term of the district court of Mills county, to be holden at the court house thereof, in Goldthwaite, on the second Monday in November, 1907, the same being the 11th day of November, 1907, then and there to answer plaintiff's first amended original petition filed in said court on the 28th day of August, 1907, in a suit, numbered on the docket of said court No. 946, wherein J. O. Mullian is plaintiff and Mrs. W. O. Bryson, D. H. Mullian and the unknown heirs of Etta Beatler are defendants, and said petition alleging that the plaintiff and the defendants are joint owners of two certain tracts or parcels of land situated in Mills county, Texas.
 Mrs. W. O. Bryson, one of the defendants herein, owns an undivided one-sixth interest in said land; the defendant D. H. 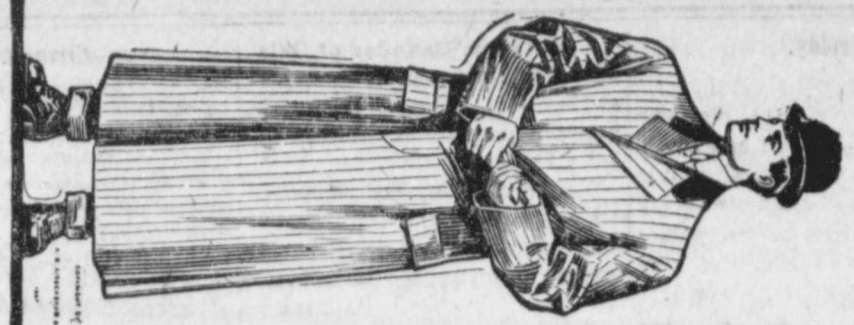

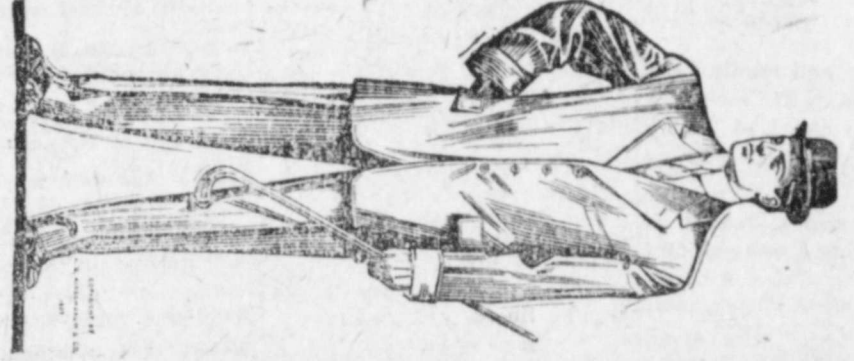

The prohibitionists were victorious in Grayson county last Saturday by a large majority.

Lightning struck the Okeewah, I. T., school house Monday, killing one boy, tearing off the roof of the building and giving all the pupils a severe shock.

Governor Campbell has appointed Judge Rice of Marlin to fill the vacancy in the court of civil appeals, occasioned by the resignation of Judge Eidsos.

More national banks were organized in Texas during the period from March 14 to the first of the present month than any other period in the United States.

A farmer in Titus county stuck a small stick in his ear by accident while passing through the timber a few days ago. In a few days the injury caused his death.

A number of the railroads of the state have joined in asking for an injunction restraining the railroad commission from enforcing its order requiring the companies to keep separate accounts of passenger and freight business and operating expenses in each department.

The city council of Amarillo has notified the water and light company of that city to make a price on their plant, in order that the council may decide whether to buy the company's interest or establish a new system of water works and electric lights.

The Standard Oil magnate, John D. Rockefeller, is quoted as saying: "I am the trustee of the property of others, through the providence of God committed to my care. I am steward of vast interests belonging in great part to widows and orphans and others who are actually or relatively poor. For this holding I am responsible to God. Were I to give up my interest in the Standard company I would imperil the property of those people, and I am a popularly supported and well-to-do man with a large family and a large business. Therefore, I feel my duty to God and to the people whose interests are invested in my company to continue active in its welfare."

An exchange tells us that a customer, who recently went to a local store to buy an axe, found the price to be 10 cents higher than he could get the same article from a mail order house at Chicago, and on making complaints to that effect the merchant agreed to "knock off" the dime providing the customer would give him the same treatment that he gave the Chicago house, then the fun began. Mr. Customer paid 90 cents for the \$1 axe, he then had to pay two cents postage and three cents for the money order. Then he had to pay the merchant twenty-five cents express and was on the point of taking the axe when he was told that he would have to leave the axe at the store for three or four days, the time it would take for it to come from Chicago. As several witnesses were present when the agreement was made, the customer had to comply with all the above terms and on summing it up afterwards he had paid \$1.20 for the dollar axe.—Ex.

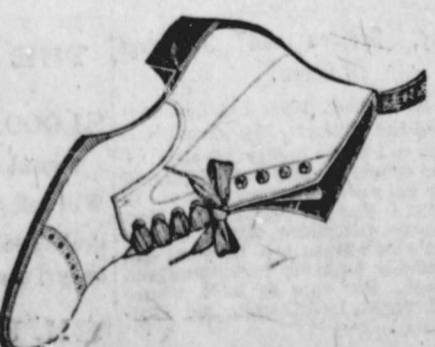

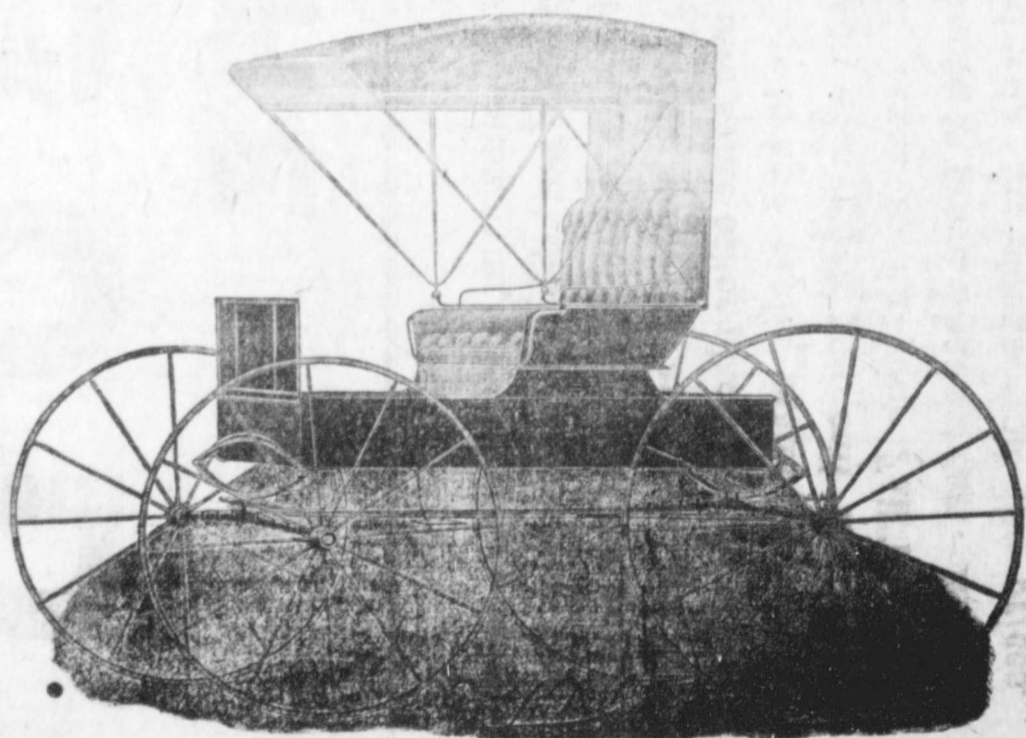

Maizeland.

Editor Eagle:
With pleasure I give the readers of the old Eagle a few items from this part of West Texas.

It's raining today, October 4th. This is the first rain in this immediate section since the first week in July. In other parts of the county good rains fell a few weeks ago.

Cotton picking is the rush of the day.

Fields are white and hands are scarce. In two weeks longer practically all the cotton will be opened. I have never seen cotton open so fast in my life as it has in the last few days. I think the average yield will be in this community about a quarter of a bale per acre, while in other portions of the county the yield will not be as good, and in some parts there will not be any.

I think there will be a good acreage sown in grain this fall. Fall oats do better here generally than spring oats. Oats that were sown last fall thrashed as high as thirty bushels per acre. I think I am safe in saying there was not two inches of rain fell on these oats after they were sown. We can make more in west Texas with less rain than any country with same conditions.

Maize, which is the principal feed crop, is good. It is worth 50c per bushel and there is a ready sale. Some people think they could not make a crop without corn, but that's all a mistake.

There has not been much land dealing this year on account of the dry spring we had. Times were not half as hard in the west as some people imagined. A few of the tenderfoot class, dried out last spring and went east with their starvation cry. Some actually thought they would starve to death if they did not get back in east Texas among the boll weevils and chills. Land is not any cheaper around Maizeland than it was last year. West Texas is an all around up and down good country. If any body does not believe it I will give them a job to come and look, free of charge (to me.)

The Ballinger and Abilene railroad is booming and I hope it will keep booming until trains are booming over the prairies between the above places. Winters is on the proposed route. With a railroad it will be a coming town.

The Ballinger Abilene road is backed up with home capital and I am sure will be built. With more railroads west Texas will be the garden spot of Texas. Real estate is sure to

I had rather farm here than any place I ever saw, but everybody to their own notion.

Do you believe in the greatest and most important class, the farmers, organizing? If you do not belong to the union, nor believe in farmers organizing, were you ever kicked by a mule or struck by lightning? Do you know the aim and object of the farmers union? If so, is there any thing wrong with them? The Farmers Union is based upon as lofty principles as exist beneath the shining sun. The demands of the farmers are just. The record shows that they have never made unjust demand on society. The farmers do not oppose any legitimate business but want to organize for the purpose of attending to

their own business in a business way. Who can blame us for this? No man with common mule sense will, It is only by organization that the farmers can establish themselves in the economical industries of the world as we should, Farmers organize and co-operate and you will reap two blades of grass where you have been reaping one. There are some weak kneed, skin flint, limberback, who have a cotton string for a backbone, oppose every thing no matter what it is. The arguments they present against it has had moss on its back a hundred years old. We want brave, loyal men to join the union who are willing to stick instead of being stuck twice.
