The San Antonio fair is to open today.

A new bank has been established at San Angelo with a capital stock of \$250,000.

State Senator Looney of Greenville has announced that he will be a candidate for attorney general of Texas.

W. W. Hair of Temple, who was district attorney of this district at one time, has announced his candidacy for congress in the eleventh district, against R. L. Henry.

J. M. Cox, who furnished most of the Tom Green county exhibits at the Dallas fair, donated all of his exhibits except a bale of cotton, to Buckner's orphanage.

A negro brute who attempted to assault a white girl in Milam county was taken from the jail in Cameron Monday afternoon and hung. A company of the state militia was ordered to protect him, but the citizens were too quick for them.

A citizen of Port Arthur heard a commotion among his chickens a few nights ago and discovered an opossum in the fowl house. The possum ran into a hole in the ground and the man in attempting to dig him out uncovered a bottle filled with silver coin.

While the financial situation has somewhat improved in the last week a great many of the banks in the state have limited their depositors to the withdrawal of only a part of their deposits in any one day.

One example of the growth and prosperity of this section can be seen in the fact that four years ago four clerks handled the mail between Temple and San Angelo and now thirteen men are employed in the work.

The commissioners court has given notice that it will abolish the office of county treasurer at the end of the present incumbent's term. This is a wise move, for under the present system, when the bonds keep the county money, there is absolutely no reason why there should be a county treasurer, whose commissions are about \$2,000 per year.—Comanche Exponent.

It is pathetic to see a newspaper claiming that prohibition does not prohibit. The truth is and should be so stated that certain officers have not made prohibition effective because they have not done their duty. Prohibition, like any other law, will only prohibit to the extent that the officers exert their powers to make it effective. The reflection is on the officers' and not the law.—Palestine Herald.

Julius Hoover, a Lipan Flat farmer, has discovered another dry weather crop that is a money maker. He is raising broom corn and it is bringing in the shekels. He says it has done splendidly despite the dry weather and sells in San Angelo for \$80 to \$90 per ton. He has already harvested one crop and will get another before frost. Mr. Hoover is enthusiastic over broom corn and intends growing it regularly hereafter.—San Angelo Standard.

## Seed Selection.

Station No. 1 in the highway of farm progress is good seed.

Planting selected seed of the best variety and of the highest vitality is absolutely essential to the production of the best crops.

Buying the best seed, if the farmer does not have it, is commendable; but this must be followed by the best cultivation and the most careful selection to eliminate minor defects and improve the excellencies of the type, or the seed will deteriorate.

The ideal plan for a farmer is to select a small field of choice land remote from other fields cultivated in similar crops, plant the best seed obtainable and cultivate in the best way; from this select seed for planting the ensuing season; or, in case of no special seed field, take the following plan:

### COTTON SEED.

1st. From your best field of cotton select the best portion, and in this choice division mark the most vigorous and productive plants, showing short joints and fruit limbs near the bottom. The entire plant should be an exceptional fruit producer. Seed should be selected from these marked cotton stalks, but the top bolls and the bolls on the ends of the limbs should not go into this lot of seed; they tend to make the cotton later. The bolls selected for seed should be picked by special field hands, sent in advance of the regular pickers. This seed cotton must be stored in a dry place and watched to avoid mixing.

Special care must be taken at the gin, that the gin and floor are free from all other cotton seed before ginning. Store this seed in a dry place.

Where greater length of staple is desired, select for seed such bolls only as show the longest staple. By careful selection most any desired qualities, or characteristics, can ultimately be secured.

### SEED CORN.

The above rules for cotton apply to corn.

1st. Fix some standard qualities of corn and type of ear you prefer, then select to secure these.

If a white corn, with average ear, it should be about eight inches long, with medium cob, long, deep and uniform kernels, which cover the ends of the cobs well, husk adhering closely to the corn at the tip. The kernels should show a nitrogen content above the average. In the above case the seed corn should be selected from a stalk that has two early matured ears, so as to promote a tendency to produce two ears and an early maturity.

2nd. If the large ear type is preferred, it is better to select the seed corn from stalks bearing one ear only, but of the desired type. In general characteristics it should correspond to case one, except with a large and longer ear.

3rd. All barren or non-producing stalks should have been detasselled, and all ears blighted, or blasted by smut, should have been removed from the field where seed corn is. Best not to select even rood ears where most of the surrounding ears are nibbles.

4th. Store in a dry place, but never when wet or not thoroughly cured.

### Ordinance of Goldthwaite.

CHAPTER XXIV.

An ordinance of the incorporated town of Goldthwaite, Mills county, Texas, prohibiting the disturbance of any theatrical performance or any public gathering, other than meetings for religious worship.

Be it ordained by the town council of the town of Goldthwaite, as incorporated, that any person who shall be guilty of loud talking, laughing, hissing, cat-calling, smoking, throwing paper or other missiles, or any other act or conduct tending to disturb or annoy any spectator at any public gathering of people in the town of Goldthwaite, other than a congregation met for the purpose of religious worship or any spectator or actor or performer in any theater or opera house, or tent, or other place where such performance is being conducted, while such performance is going on, or while the audience or any part thereof are there, or thereabout, assembled, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not less than ten nor more than fifty dollars; and execution for such fine shall issue and in case the same is not paid, then such person shall be imprisoned for not more than ten days, as allowed by law.

And this ordinance shall be in effect immediately after its passage and the publication required by law.

Passed, approved and adopted, this November 4th, 1907, at a regular meeting of the town council of the town of Goldthwaite as incorporated by a unanimous vote; and the rule requiring all ordinances to be read three several times, being unanimously suspended.

And this original ordinance is ordered to be filed in the office of the secretary, and if approved by the Mayor, is to be signed by him, and there kept, as chapter 24 of the ordinances of Goldthwaite, and shall be published in the Goldthwaite Eagle, and thereafter be in effect.

Which ordinance, passed as aforesaid, was filed with the secretary, and by me examined and approved, and ordered filed and kept as chapter 24.

## GOVERNOR CAMPBELL SPEAKS.

### A Large Audience Assembled to Hear Him.

Hon. Thos. M. Campbell, governor of Texas, arrived in the city Tuesday evening on the 7:40 train and was met at the depot by the band and a large number of citizens and escorted to the court house, where he made a most interesting speech on state affairs.

Hon. P. H. Clements, representative in the legislature for this district, introduced the governor in a short speech and in reply to the introductory remarks Governor Campbell made some very complimentary remarks about Mr. Clements. He said that as long as the people of Mills county sent such men as Mr. Clements to the legislature they could depend on their interest receiving careful attention. He said that the gentleman from Mills county always talked right and voted right and his vote was always in the interest of the people.

Giving attention to state affairs and particularly to the work of the thirtieth legislature, he showed how the ad valorem tax rate had been reduced from 20 cents on the \$100 valuation to 12 1-2 cents and a surplus of \$700,000 placed in the treasury. He said he expected the rate next year to be 6 cents or less, and this was due to the full rendition tax bill. His example of the proper rate for property rendition was clear and illustrated that if a man rendered \$1000 worth of taxable property on a 50 cent basis he would have \$500 worth of property exempted, while the man who rendered \$1,000,000 on the same basis would have \$500,000 exempted. This he said was not equal taxation and the only equitable way was a full rendition.

He then told of the Robinson insurance law, of the anti gambling law, of the franchise tax and the tax on intangible assets and said the fellows who were objecting to the work of the Thirtieth legislature were those who had been deprived of free railroad passes and were not telling the real reason for their dissatisfaction over the work of the legislature. He said the passes given by the railroads were certain to secure favors unless the recipient was totally devoid of appreciation, and his talk along this line could be understood to cover a wide scope. He was particularly severe on the lobbyists and the trusts. In regard to the recently pub-

lished letter of H. C. Pierce, head of the Waters Pierce Oil company, he said that whenever Pierce came to Texas and faced a jury to prove the statements contained in that letter he would be ready to communicate with him, but that as governor of Texas he would have no communication with a fugitive from justice. He further stated that when an officer entrusted with the duty of protecting the people from the trusts betrayed his constituents into the hands of these trusts he should be driven from office forever.

The governor was given the closest attention throughout the speech and was frequently enthusiastically applauded. He made no reference to the Bailey matter, but we of the anti-Bailey side took considerable comfort from his remarks concerning those who confessed to being ingrates by claiming that the favors extended to them would not influence them and all were pleased with his statements concerning an officer who would betray the people into the hands of the trusts. His talk was alright and gave his hearers a great deal of valuable information about state affairs.

Governor Campbell was entertained at the home of Mr. B. R. Brown and left Thursday morning for Austin.

Right there the first battle between the blue and the gray was fought July 5, 1861, which destroyed the town and left many a man dead and dying on the battlefield. There is a National cemetery at Springfield with 845 graves known and marked and 712 unknown awaiting the resurrection morn. If I don't become homesick or the weather too cold I may remain here several weeks. I expect to visit Holly Springs, Miss., my mother's sweet sunny home of which she so often told us in our happy childhood days.
