

NEIGHBORING NEWS.

Items Cull'd From the Leading Local Papers.

BROWNWOOD.

The Old Fellows building under course of construction at the corner of Lee and Fisk street will not be completed for some time yet and it is reported that the contractor has asked for an extension of two months on his contract time.

R. S. Cawthorne, proprietor of the Royal hotel near the Santa Fe depot, has closed a deal whereby he purchased from W. H. Wood a half acre of ground near the Frisco depot for a consideration of \$1250. Mr. Cawthorne announces that as soon as the money market opens up he will begin the erection of the biggest and finest hotel ever built in Brownwood.

Advices from Coleman county say the West Texas Coal Mining and Development company, working in the coal field north of Santa Anna, has struck a vein of coal three feet in thickness, and that work of developing the mine has already been commenced.

Among the first cases called in the district court Tuesday morning were those of the state against Arch Ratliff, Roy Staggs and Thebo Wolf, based on charges preferred against them last year in connection with a Christmas prank played on another party. When the cases were called this morning the state was again unable to go to trial on account of absence of witnesses and the cases were thrown out of court.

Powell C. Rutherford of Brady, brother-in-law to Waddy Thompson, died this afternoon at the home of E. P. Thompson in Ford's addition. Mr. Rutherford was the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Rutherford of Brady, formerly of Brownwood. He came to this city Monday suffering with spinal meningitis and placed himself under the treatment of a specialist but rapidly grew worse and passed away this afternoon shortly after the noon hour.—Brownwood Bulletin.

Thursday afternoon at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Standifer, the future lives of two of our popular young people were united in the marriage of Mr. Charlie Lassetter and Miss Ella Talley.

The stockholders of the Compress company had a meeting Monday morning to hear a report from the management and more particularly to pay another 10 per cent stock assessment. No dividends have been declared this year.

The court of criminal appeals at Tyler overruled the motion for a new hearing in the case of Henry Mitchell who has been in the county jail for some time convicted of burglary. This is the last resort and Henry will be sent to the penitentiary in a few days.—Chief.

HAMILTON.

Advices received by Mr. Spurlin from Fort Worth yesterday report the condition of Mrs. Spurlin slightly improved.

The Eye-Opener, that has been published in Hamilton for the past year by W. F. Lemmons and associates, and has been printed at this office, was moved this week to Celeste, in Hunt county, where Eld. Lemmons has purchased a plant and will hereafter print his paper as a weekly. Eld. Lemmons will not move his family from Hamilton.

A very lamentable accident

happened on Wednesday of last week that cost Will Morris his life. His home is about 14 miles south of Hamilton and he had been to town that day with his wife and baby, was returning home when the accident occurred. He was in a wagon and was intoxicated. When they got to Tom Baker's on the road home he was persuaded to get out while his family went on home. But after they left he got on a horse and overtook them. He jumped in the wagon and was just in the act of driving over a big bluff when John Atchley came along and restrained him. He still persisted in going on but they argued with him and would not let him proceed. Other parties were there also. Finally he was persuaded to turn the team over to them and his wife and child went to a tent near by while he went back a piece for his hat that he had lost in riding up. Atchley and the others thought when he came back he would get on the horse he had been riding and go on home. But instead of that when he got his hat and returned, they having gone down under the hill to get their other teams, he jumped in the wagon and struck out as hard as he could go. He had not gone far before one of the front wheels struck a tree and bounced around, throwing him over the front gate onto the double-tree. The team ran on about a hundred yards and straddling another tree, the end of the tongue struck it breaking the tongue into pieces, and one of the hounds of the tongue went clear through his leg. Help came and he was carried to Tom Baker's house and medical aid summoned. Thursday morning it was decided to amputate his leg. But that did not save his life, and he died Friday evening.—Herald.

SAN ANNA.

Jim and Joe Kelley left Monday for California, where they both have lucrative positions.

Frank Ellis sold his place on Spring Creek, consisting of 183 acres, to Eli Windom for \$2600.

F. F. Edwards sold last week three registered Hereford bull calves at \$50 each and three grade bull calves at \$25 each to Henry Galloway.

The San Saba-Colorado Irrigation Association met at the court house Saturday and several new members were added to the Association. A committee was appointed to confer with parties in regard to the best terms on gasoline for the next year, also the seed problem was discussed but not finally disposed of.

A. T. Brown, who was given a life sentence at the last term of the District Court for poisoning his wife, Saturday morning sent for the officers and made a full confession in writing and under oath about the crime. He admits his own guilt and gives the name of his accomplices. He says that the first plan laid was to let a gun go off accidentally and kill Mrs. Brown but afterward this plan was abandoned and the poison route was agreed upon. A complaint was sworn out Monday upon this evidence against Millie McClish, whose time has expired in jail on the previous charge, and an examining trial was held Monday and Tuesday in her case. Brown testifies that the poison used was strychnine and sugar of lead, mixed with Golden Seal powder to prevent detection.—San Saba Star.

Mrs. Gregor McGregor, of California, who has been Mrs. Tennis Hamilton's guest for a few days, has gone to School creek to visit relatives.

Mrs. W. F. Reed and daughter, Mrs. Arthur Noble, have

gone to Shive, Hamilton county, where they will visit Mrs. Cody Gooden for a week. The trip was made overland, from Goldthwaite.

W. H. Vernon, who has been in business at Hamlin for the past six months, is here to spend the holidays with home people. The Vernon brothers have sold their printing plant at Hamlin, and will probably seek a new field in which to work.

The nice home of Uncle John Moliboney was entirely consumed by fire Monday morning, and that practically nothing was saved. It was one of the most complete country houses in this section and could not be rebuilt for less than \$3,500 or \$4,000.

Dr. S. J. Horrell is confined to his home by two wounds, one on the face extending from behind the ear to near the point of his chin, this wound having been made by a knife or other sharp instrument. The other wound is in the foot or leg, and was made by bird shot from a shotgun. R. W. Ratliff is under arrest charged with assault to murder, and the matter will be settled in the courts.—Leader.

The corner stone has been laid at Blainey for a new school building to cost \$11,000.

Burglars blew open a safe at Grant, Okla., Saturday night and secured \$800 in cash.

There are more than 100 cases of measles in the town of Howe, but no fatalities have so far resulted.

Thos. Hunt, traveling passenger agent of the Queen and Crescent railroad, died at his home in Fort Worth Sunday.

Attorney General Davidson, the great "rust buster" of Texas, has announced his candidacy for a third term.

United States Senator Mallory died at Pensacola, Fla., Sunday. He suffered a stroke of paralysis Nov. 20 and never recovered.

Two prominent young men of New Orleans lost their lives on a hunting trip. Hawkins Norton was killed by gun shot wound and Walter Grima was drowned by the overturning of a boat.

It is rumored in Washington that Senator Bailey intends to resign at the close of the present session of congress and enter the primaries as a candidate for reelection.

The executive committee of the Farmers Union will meet with the Factory club of Fort Worth January 10 to confer regarding the proposition to establish a cotton factory in that city.

Judge John N. Henderson, associate justice of the court of criminal appeals of Texas, died at his home in Dallas Sunday night. He had been a member of the court for thirteen years.

Six persons were incinerated at Fort Smith, Ark., at an early hour Sunday morning, in a fire that destroyed a large hotel building. Among those missing is Jas. McVitie, a cotton buyer of Sherman.

Business property to the value of \$50,000, was destroyed at Athens, Texas, a few days ago by fire. It was only by efficient work of all the citizens that the entire business portion was not destroyed.

Senator Willacy announces that at the next session of the legislature he will introduce a bill to remove the tax from cash and from notes and mortgages as well. He says it is the tax on money that has made the financial stringency the last few weeks.

A suit has been filed against the Woods National bank of Laredo for about \$90,000, the amount of a draft bought by T. D. Cobbs which he used in payment for land and as the check was not paid he forfeited his contract. He also asks for \$11,000 damages. This suit involves the right of banks to place a limit on the amount of money a customer can withdraw at one time.

The announcement of Col. Bill Sterrett of the Dallas News as a candidate for congress was received with pleasure by the newspaper fraternity of the state. Col. Sterrett is one of the most popular and prominent newspaper workers in America. He will be elected, likely, and will make one of the most brilliant members of the United States congress.

The state teachers association is in session in Houston.

A resolution has been introduced in the Congress of the United States forbidding a president serving the third term.

The saloon keepers of Obata-nooga, Tenn., agreed among themselves to observe Christmas day by keeping their saloons closed.

Mrs. Nicholas Longworth, nee Miss Alice Roosevelt, has recovered from an operation for appendicitis, which she underwent Dec. 1.

Mrs. Bradley, who was acquitted a few days ago in Washington on a charge of killing Senator Brown of Utah, has returned to her home at Salt Lake City and will enter suit for the Brown estate. She claimed that the murder was in self defense.

Some of the friends here of Hon. C. H. Jenkin of Brownwood wired a petition to Governor Campbell Monday requesting the appointment of Mr. Jenkin to a position on the court of criminal appeals.

The union waiters in the restaurants in San Antonio, who recently went out on a strike, have determined to open restaurants in various parts of that city. It is said they have already secured \$6000 to invest in the business.

A jury composed entirely of women was empanelled in Denver, Col., a few days ago to determine whether or not a garment purchased from a dealer there fitted the customer. The jury agreed and more wonderful yet, agreed that the garment did fit.

Plans are being made in Colorado to have Mrs. Leavitt, nee Ruth Bryan, go to the Democratic national convention as a delegate and place the name of her father before the convention as a candidate for the presidency.
